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Question: I keep hearing about 'Lean Office'; I thought Lean was for production lines. We don't make things. What does this have to do with me?

<u>My Answer:</u> Do you have good people working really hard but not getting consistently good results? The problem is likely that the process needs to be improved. You're correct that Lean started out in manufacturing, and much of the literature is based on that foundation. In manufacturing, Lean has a long track record of making significant improvements in lead time, cost, quality and employee satisfaction.

Lean is really a process improvement methodology that just happened to be applied to manufacturing at first. Even though they seem very different, it turns out that office processes have many of the same problems as manufacturing processes - errors, long lead times, lots of expediting - sound familiar? The Lean toolbox (with some enhancements) is very effective at identifying and solving these process issues.

At VMEC, we have more than ten years of experience doing Lean projects in non-manufacturing settings. We've worked in health care, government, higher education and other sectors as well as addressing office processes in manufacturing companies. We've worked on processes from billing to order entry to product development.
