# Monitoring the Special Session in Topeka

Thursday, July 23, 2016

For the past few months, the Legislature has been charged with passing a school funding plan that meets the requirement in the Kansas Constitution that public schools be funded *equitably*, or with fairness regardless of zip code. (Another decision is pending, to determine if school funding meets the constitutional test for *adequacy* -- that is, if school districts have the money they need to educate their students.) In February the Kansas Supreme Court gave the Legislature a deadline of June 30 to pass a constitutional law, or school districts would be forced to close. This special session gives legislators a final opportunity to avoid a school closure.

If the Legislature does not pass a constitutional funding law by June 30, schools could potentially close. If this happens and causes any disruption to regular business taking place in the Emporia Public Schools, details will be provided as quickly as possible.
