- "Need to have a real sense of the justice aspect . . . supporting the actual needs of the community rather than what feels good to the congregation"
- "Epiphany is a changed and changing congregation. I feel it has lost its core value in spiritual education and focused on changing the congregational mix. The result is a blessedly more diverse congregation but one that seems to have little center other than to celebrate its diversity."

Preaching Ability to make scripture relevant to people's lives through clarity in preaching.	48.6%

Social Justice Ministry Ability to help parishioners become aware of, understand, and address social issues, including advocacy for greater systemic change.	41.4%

What we most enjoy about Epiphany -- A summary of comments

There were 124 comments offered – an 82% response rate

Overall Comments

Social Justice/Outreach (11 comments): "commitment to helping the underserved in the community" "ministry to the downtown poor and homeless" "social justice"

Christian life (9 comments): "At its best it is what church is all about" "We are challenged to walk the talk" "agape"

History, sense of place, building (9 comments): "beautiful, historic place" "central location in the city" "sense of place"

What we least enjoy about Epiphany -- A summary of comments

There were 85 comments offered – a 56% response rate, however, many of the responses were "Nothing I don't like." Or "nothing"

In many cases, the things which we least enjoy about Epiphany were related to what we like:

Organizational Issues (19 comments): "lack of cohesion" "poor communication – really hard to figure out what's going on" "unilateral decision making"

Inclusion/Diversity (15 comments): "Behavior and hygiene of some of our homeless guests" "chaos on Sunday morning" "odiferous" "lack of respect for the sanctity of the space"

Welcoming/Acceptance (7 comments): "Have had difficulty making friends, connections and a place to serve" "snobs"... "a lot of profiling and judging" "hard to break in (been coming for 5 years and people still don't really know me)"

History, sense of place, building (6 comments): "parking" "hard to find the bathrooms" "old" "distance from home"

Music and Worship (5 comments): "hymns" "loud, pretentions music" "limited music choices"

Resource Issues = Financial and Human (5 comments): "lack of financial resources" "struggling numbers and over--committed core leadership" "involvement not broad enough" "stretched financial resources – we do good work, I wish there was greater parish AND diocesan support"
