## Tips for tree planting

The time is right for planting trees. The Peachtree Corners Green Committee has provided some tips for successful tree planting this season.

- To help avoid disease and infestation, it is best to choose a **native species**. There are a variety of oak and pine trees native to Georgia, as well as maple, beech, hickory, poplar and others.
- Spot selection is critical for trees to thrive. Most large trees require full sun to grow.
  Consider the soil condition, sunlight and topography. Tulip poplar, black walnut, red
  maple, bald cypress, river birch and willows are common in wet areas. Along stream
  banks or near storm water drainage ditches, also consider understory varieties like
  rhododendron, mountain laurel and oakleaf hydrangea. Dry areas are better suited for
  persimmon, some pines, sassafras, and some oaks.
- Research has shown organic amendments to the hole are not required for good soil
  preparation. In fact, compost, peat moss and other organic amendments may hold too
  much moisture, leading to root rot. Dig a hole that is two times wider than the root ball,
  loosen the roots on the root ball and place the top of the root ball level with the ground.
  Break any dirt clods. After setting the tree, backfill the hole with the original soil and
  water the tree when finished.
