
SAD NEWS OF THE PASSING OF ROLLIE GRAND
(TURTLE MOUNTAIN CHIPPEWA)

We are very saddened to hear of the sudden passing of Rollie C (Turtle Mountain Chippewa). We extend our deepest sympathy family and close friends at this sad time.

Rollie was an artist with the gift of capturing both beauty and purpose in his sculpture. A lifetime artist who sculpted for more than 35 years.
