## Speakers

**Dena Chasten-Ellis** got her start in genealogy as a twelve-year old adoptee seeking her roots. Ten years later she met her birth family. By incorporating DNA into traditional research, she is now able to successfully trace her lineage back to colonial times. Ms. Chasten-Ellis is a member of the Association of Professional Genealogists and the Delaware African American Historical and Genealogical Society.

**Shamele Jordon** is an active genealogist, lecturer, writer and podcaster (*Genealogy on Demand*). Her biographical highlights include: researcher for the PBS series *Oprah's Roots: African American Lives I and II*, former president of the African American Genealogy Group in Philadelphia, and faculty at the Institute of Genealogy and Historical Research.

**Dr. Craig Stutman** is an associate professor of History and Policy Studies at Delaware Valley University where he specializes in the history of race and ethnicity in the United States, the Civil War and Reconstruction eras, and the intersection of social justice and social policy. In addition, Dr. Stutman is the co-chair of the Toni Morrison Society's Bench by the Road project, and he is a board member of the Germantown Mennonite Historic Trust and at Eden Cemetery in Collingdale, Delaware County.

**Syl Woolford**'s interest in history began with the study of his own family, which he has traced back 200 years in Newark, Delaware. He recently discovered a connection between his Woolford line and Harriet Tubman's legendary Underground Railroad activities. Syl is an active researcher and lecturer and holds leadership positions in various organizations such as the Friends of the Delaware Public Archives and the Wilmington University History Advisory Committee. He has presented for the 2012 Tribute: Black History Month and received the Delaware State Education Association's Human and Civil Rights award in 2014.
