We Prepare For a Forty Day Journey: The Journey of Lent

Forty is an important number in the Bible. The Hebrews spent forty years in the wilderness before crossing into the Promised Land. Jesus spent forty days fasting in the wilderness, preparing for his ministry, before the temptations of Satan. And so, we begin a forty day (not including Sundays) journey from Ash Wednesday, on February 10, to Easter, on March 27.

Forty days is also important because a period of forty days marks how long (roughly) it takes something to become a habit.

Traditionally, many Christians give up something for Lent. Unfortunately, what once was a purposeful, intentional season of sacrifice has often become little more than a new self-help program. Articles abound in both Christian and non-Christian sources about how you can give up fattening foods and drinks for Lent. They approach Lent as if it is a season to kick-off your weight loss goals. Vaguely spiritual gurus will encourage you to give up things like anger and resentment for Lent. While these may be lofty goals, the intention again is to help you be healthier and happier. The magazine *Christianity Today* has for several years tracked the most popular things given up for Lent. This list is depressing for anyone wanting to maintain the importance of the season. (Twitter, Lent, Homework, Religion, Sobriety, Catholicism, Breathing, and God all rank in the Top 50.)

The purpose of this journey is not self-help, weight loss, or making a better you. The purpose of the Lenten journey is to focus our hearts and minds on God this season. The tradition of giving up something for Lent is intended to cause an intentional sacrifice. Then the time, money, energy spent on whatever was given up should be focused on repentance and your faith. That is the purpose of Lent—to prepare our hearts for the Easter miracle.

I invite you to take a forty day journey this Lent. I do not care what it is. Pick a new spiritual discipline. Read a forty day book focused on your faith. Commit to reading the Bible in forty days. Give up a vice, and spend that time in prayer and that money in mission. Commit to a new devotional practice every day. Commit to a new expression of your faith (one year, I received a handwritten letter from someone who was committed to saying "thank you" to all those who had influenced her faith in Lent—what a powerful practice!). Commit to something that will help you center yourself on God during this next season.

Then let me know what that practice is. You can e-mail me, text me, or tell me at church how that discipline has strengthened your faith. I will be praying for you throughout your journey.

Let us not waste these forty days, but use them to focus ourselves on what is truly important—our journey with Christ to the cross.




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Special points of interest

Living Legacies

This is the first in a series of articles prepared by the Stewardship Committee and designed to communicate the role of First Church's generous stewards who help advance the mission of our church. How can stewardship be defined and how can each of us become better stewards?

What is a "steward"? The UMC General Conference defines stewardship as the devout investment or use of money, time and ability. In biblical times, a steward supervised a household or an estate. Today, as God's children, we deem God to be the source of all we have, seek to hold it in trust for God and desire to be "good stewards of the manifold grace of God". (1 Peter 4:10a)

Here at First Church we have many who give of their time, money and ability. This article focuses on one member who described her former self as "land rich, money poor". In 1881, Bob Hamilton's grandparents were married and the bride's father gave 80 acres of land to the young couple as a wedding gift. Five generations and 132 years later, Gladys Hamilton, Bob's wife, and their son Craig made the difficult decision to sell the family farm. A monetary gift to the church was the result of this (financial) decision by Gladys and her son. Gladys was very aware of the Trustees' "wish

list" and was determined to provide the means necessary to meet those needs. As stewards of the church's property, the Trustees manage a long list of necessary maintenance and improvement needs. Gutter leaks, mold in the kitchen, stained glass window updates, and interior and exterior painting were just a few of the many items on their list.

How does Gladys feel about her decision? She is "tickled pink"! She feels good about being able to see her gift at work. Knowing what needed to be done is one thing, but actually working with the Trustees to check items off their list has created a sense of contentment and satisfaction for Gladys. She enjoys knowing that her gift has directly contributed to the longevity of our church structure.

Craig and Gladys are living legacies and we thank them for their stewardship.



KENTON FIRST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH MISSIONAL BUDGET 2016

Our Plan of Ministry

A. To provide passionate, meaningful, life-changing worship every week of the year (WORSHIP).

In 2015, we worshipped together 113 times. We hold two worship services every week, averaging 183 (and as high as 205) people in worship. Our music program continues to be a blessing. The music provided by our praise band, bell choir, and chancel choir is worshipful and inspiring. Our Christmas Eve services continue to be a highlight of many families' Christmas celebrations.

In 2016, we expect to hold approximately 115 worship services. Our goal is to average 200 in worship, across both services. We want to hold at least 10 baptisms and 10 first time commitments of faith. We continue to invest into our music programs, and into our technology, to make worship accessible to a wider number of people.

WORSHIP BUDGET = \$87,529 (28% of TOTAL)

(This total includes portions of pastor and staff salaries and compensation, music ministries, office supplies, cleaning supplies, utilities, and building expenses.)

B. To provide intentional, nurturing faith development for persons of all ages (DISCIPLESHIP).

We believe that a commitment of faith is the beginning of your journey, not the end. In 2015, we offered 18 different small group experiences to grow in faith. This includes Sunday School classes, women's groups, Bible studies, youth small groups, Kids' Club, and more. We also offered a Vacation Bible School that brought more children into our churches. Over half of our Kids' Club and Middle School small groups have no affiliation with the church.

Our goal in 2016 is to offer 20 small groups, and enroll approximately 120 people in some type of faith forming group. We hope to create a Life Group for young adults and families. We start confirmation classes in January. We hope to create a new Sunday School class for young adults. We aim to expand our youth and children's ministries by working with other churches in our area, and reaching out to families not connected with the church.

DISCIPLESHIP BUDGET= \$98,139 (31% of TOTAL)

(This total includes portions of pastor and staff salaries and compensation, youth ministries, children's ministries, office supplies, cleaning supplies, utilities, and building expenses.)

C. To witness to our faith in risk-taking, world-transforming mission and service beyond our walls (MISSION). We take seriously Christ's commandments to be his witnesses to the ends of the earth, and to love others as we love ourselves. In 2015, we sponsored a mission trip to Good Works, Inc. Our missions team also supported Love, INC, Imagine No Malaria, United Methodist Committee on Relief, Hardin County Hospice, and other ministries. Our church continues to be faithful in its connection giving to the larger body of the United Methodist Church. In 2016, we plan to offer another mission trip. We will continue to be 100% faithful in our connectional giving. We ambitiously aim to raise more than \$10,000 in second-mile missional giving (above and beyond normal church giving).

MISSION BUDGET = \$67,289 (21% of TOTAL)

(This total includes portions of pastor and staff salaries and compensation, connectional giving, office supplies, and building expenses.)

D. To provide radical hospitality and care for all persons, within our church and without (CARE).

We believe that part of the mission of the church is to provide love and mercy to all, within our church and without.

This includes, but is not limited to, visiting members in care facilities, praying with those in the hospital, officiating funerals and weddings, offering counseling services, and engaging in the lives of children and youth. While our pastor and staff often engage in these activities, other groups also engage in care, and we encourage everyone in the church to be engaged in care and mercy ministries.

CARE BUDGET = \$22, 722 (7% of TOTAL)

(This total includes portions of pastor and staff salaries and compensation.)

E. To be faithful stewards of the blessings and resources God has blessed us with (ADMINISTRATION).

Part of good stewardship is responsible handling of the resources we have been given. This includes, but is not limited to, legal requirements, upkeep of our facilities, denominational requirements and reporting, church communication, budgeting, and human resource work. We continue to function in a way that is above reproach, so that our stewardship of our resources does not give cause to question our faith.

ADMINISTRATION BUDGET = \$41,588 (13% of TOTAL)

(This total includes portions of pastor and staff salaries and compensation, utilities, cleaning supplies, building expenses, office supplies, and compensation for our annual conference delegates.)

Our total budget required to complete our planned ministries and to continue to be a multi-generational community of faith, growing disciples, and transforming our world is:

TOTAL BUDGET = \$317,261

Other Items (Outside of General Budget)

The following three items exist outside of our general fund. They are funded by alternative sources, and therefore are not part of our general budget. However, they are vitally important to our mission. Because they are funded from alternative sources, the actual funds available may vary greatly year-to-year. Therefore, the budgets included here are approximations.

A. First United Methodist Christian Preschool

Our preschool has been in existence for over 50 years. We continue to provide excellent education, rooted in our faith, for three- and four-year olds. There are currently 24 students enrolled in Preschool. In the past year, the preschool hired a new teacher and invested in new technology for the classroom, including a SMART Board and new laptop. The preschool offers classes four days per week.

The preschool is funded from tuition, fundraisers, and generous gifts from donors.

APPROXIMATE PRESCHOOL BUDGET = \$30,000

B. Trustees of the Kenton First United Methodist Church

The Trustees care for the buildings and property of the church and parsonage. In the past year, the Trustees repaired the water lines in the front of the building, undertook significant landscaping changes, made several repairs to the parsonage (in anticipation of the pastoral transition), replaced the sewer line in the church basement, renovated the church kitchen, and installed the handicap-accessible door at the parking lot entrance. The Trustees also oversee the scholarship funds of the church.

The trustees are funded by income from church-owned investments and property, as well as memorial and legacy gifts given by the church.

APPROXIMATE TRUSTEES BUDGET= \$27,000

C. OneFund

OneFund is the primary fundraising vehicle of our youth ministry. OneFund finances youth trips such as WinterJam and Lakeside for Youth. Without OneFund, many of our trips would be too expensive for youth to attend. OneFund offsets the cost of admissions, provides transportation, food, housing, and other needs. OneFund is funded as needed, and helps offset the costs, so that the price to our youth is affordable for most families.

One Fund is funded by generous gifts from the church family, including the Lois Taylor memorial gifts.
