the CLUBHOUSE Oh boy it has been a hot one! Many of you have been taking vacations, visiting family, friends, or just plain road tripping. One of my favorite places to visit in late

Oh boy it has been a hot one! Many of you August is Ocracoke Island, the home of

Black Beard! If you have never been to this island, it's charm and history will leave you mesmerized. One of my favorite things about Ocracoke is that it's beautiful beaches remind me of my home for over a decade, Nantucket Island. The soft sands and mountainous dunes are so picturesque that they deliver you to state of relaxation that once experienced you will want to come back every year! I also love the abundance of local seafood that is available on both Nantucket &Ocracoke.

When I lived on Nantucket if I was in a pinch for the best freshest catch, or did not like what I saw at the fish markets, it was time to pull the trump card. A quick visit to Hatch's or Island Liguors and a purchase of 1 to 2 cases of Budweiser cans insured you had the best currency to trade with any of the local boats who have come in for the day after fishing local waters. Their bounty would range from Summer Fluke (the best flounder you will ever experience), lobsters, stripped bass, blue fish & "false albacore" (a small variety of tuna that was exquisite!).

I don't use that same currency when looking for our new menu addition of the Fresh Catch, although I wish I had those connections up and down these coasts. I am proud to say that Kevin Caulfield, Libby Baker, and myself have been finding exceptional fishes. I have to say I really enjoy going to the many local fish markets from the Crystal Coast to Carolina Beach in search of the best and freshest fish. The best part is the positive response that we have received from you the membership. Because we are buying select whole fishes there is the chance that we will run out. We never like to run out of anything but when you are dealing with such high quality there is always limited availability.

Let's get back to the islands! I have dug for my own clams, snorkeled for scallops (Nantucket Bays best in the world, but that is a whole other story we can talk about at a later date), surf cast for striped bass & bluefish. Other than the Nantucket Bay scallops, the same bounty is available on Ocracoke as well. I am hoping to get some striped bass in the near future as the fresh catch. This is one of my favorite types of fish. It can be prepared in so many ways, grilled, baked, or even ceviche if you like.

My favorite common denominator between the islands are the local clams. I love fresh shucked clams, as far as I am concerned it is like a Tequila shot. Slurp the fresh bivalve, enjoy the burst of fresh ocean with a tiny chew, suck on a lemon and wash it down with your Bloody Mary....ahhh! Do it again!

There is a great Fisherman's Co OP on Ocracoke that sells all the best local catch. This has facilitated my clam addiction and made me come up with this recipe for a great snack that I would prepare almost every night.

INGREDIENTS:

1lb of fresh local little necks or cherry stones 4oz of EVOO (Extra Virgin Olive Oil) 6 medium garlic cloves smashed 2 medium shallots sliceed 4oz of 1/4 inch diced soppresatta a good sprig of fresh oregano as much as you can spare of the wine you are already drinking! Crusty bread for grilling or just dipping in broth such as a baguette

Heat your pan with the olive oil on medium heat Add clams

Add soppresetta let it render its fat & add garlic & shallotts Just before aromatics start to caramelize add 1/3 bottle of white wine (note to self buy extra bottle for clams !!!)

Season with fresh cracked black pepper & fresh herbs (oregano is preferred but thyme is ok)

Cover for a 2 minutes or 4 to steam the clams open

OPTIONAL ADD 2 tablespoons of butter (Con't pg. 5)



(Con't pg 4) Cover the clams so they can steam in the delicious broth, add lemon and be patient!!! Sometimes you might have to help a clam open, but it is just being stubborn!

Once they clams have given up their treasures in the pan, there should be a nice briny broth of all of the ingredients.

On Ocracoke I have cooked this dish over a grill in a cast iron skillet, but this can easily be done over your home stove, or grill for that matter.

There is a little something that we have not discussed yet. What to drink. BEER!!!. I would drink, first of all the similar wine that I was cooking with. When I was first cooking theses clams, I was drinking a white Cote du Rhone (one of my favorites), so that is what I used with the clams. You want to keep in mind that the clams will have a delicate salty flavor so a robust or full bodied white will overpower the delicate clam. I would really look for a nice Cava Brut (Spanish sparkling) or a nice Brut Rose from the Loire Valley. You could easily substitute beer for wine in this recipe. I would suggest a Lager, Kolsch or a Belgian white.

INTO THE CUP: PRESSURE & THE with Larry George GAME OF GOLF

It is very interesting what produces pressure in golf! Water hazards, bunkers, wind, a short putt, people watching, tournaments, do these produce pressure? My opinion is they don't produce the pressure but our expectations do and these things are the trigger to take us away from our regular focus! Pressure is self-induced and defined by the individual!

Being your own cheerleading caddy is the most important thing you can do. Start practicing "positive self-talk" by analyzing your self-talk, what do you say/think to yourself? If you were a caddy for someone else and thought/said the same thing to another player would it be positive. If it isn't then you have to start getting rid of the negative self-talk and focus on the positive. Downplay any negative thoughts, they don't help or motivate, they take away your positive thoughts and imagery. No one succeeds when thinking they can't but still the pressure gets to us. If we haven't practiced preparing our thoughts with positive self-talk then we simply fall prey to poor judgment. Do you think the likes of Michael Jordan, Roger Federer, Jack Nicklaus, Michael Phelps, Serena Williams ever thought they couldn't be successful?

Remember, golf is a game of mostly misses. Very few shots come off just the way you visualize them. But you have to visualize each shot each time and then when you miss, you have to visualize the shot again. Many times the above-mentioned troubles prevent us from visualizing our shots and without visualizing our shots, how does the body know what you want it to do. Try playing catch with someone and after awhile tell them to close their eyes. Not too successful! The eyes and your imagination tell the brain what to do, without them your body is playing golf with very little guidance.

GOLF COURSE ASSETS – Please, Please, Please return any cart towels you may have accidentally taken home or left in your trunks.

DECORATIVE GRASSES – Please do not drive golf carts or push carts through the decorative grasses. There should never be any vehicles in the grass, this will not be tolerated.

BACK DRIVING RANGE - Please keep golf cart traffic limited to the cart path or beside the south practice tee. Our maintenance staff is trying to improve and beautify our practice area and the traffic elimination will help substantially.

HOPPING RIDES – Please remember it is against our rules to hitch a ride on a golf cart at any time during your round if you are walking. This unfortunately will result in both the walker and cart driver paying an additional cart fee.

SAFETY FIRST – Please wait for the golfers ahead of you to clear the landing area before you hit your next shot. It only takes 1 errant shot to change our community, are you really impatient enough to jeopardize someone's life. If you are, think about someone doing the same thing to your spouse, child or best friend. It's just a game!

REMINDERS

PRACTICE RANGE MATS – When the balls are set to hit on the range mats, please only hit on the mats. They are intended to protect and prolong the natural grass tee for all golfers.

GOLF SHOP VENDORS – Please know just because you don't see it in the golf shop doesn't mean we can't order it! We can compete and usually offer a better price on new product than most golf stores. Please ask a member of the golf staff for a price if you don't see it in the golf shop.

CIGARETTE BUTTS & TRASH - Please keep River Landing Green & Clean "No butts about it!"

We would like to inform all smokers we do have ashtrays for golf carts so please ask the staff for one and help us keep our golf courses free of butts!!!

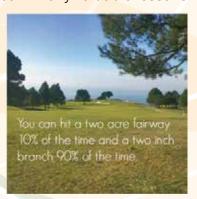

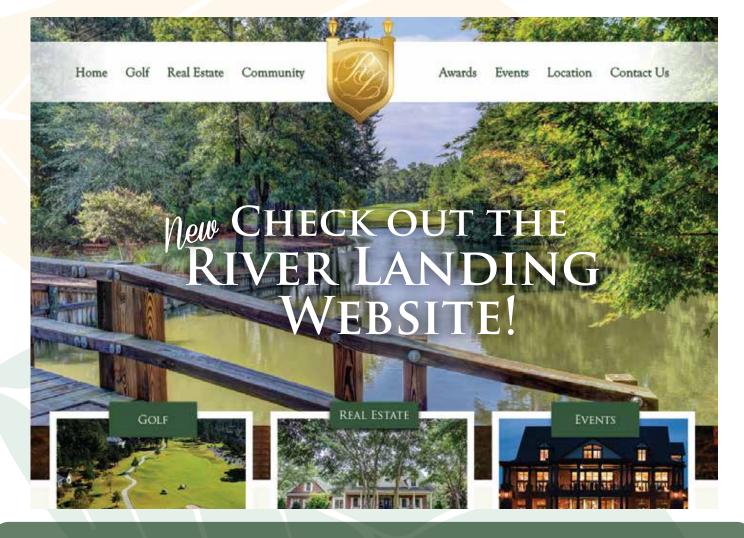
