On October 20, Virginia Secretary of Agriculture Todd Haymore will officially welcome a new 501(c)(3) organization to the state: the Virginia chapter of American Agri-Women. Any woman with a passion for agriculture is invited to attend the event and consider joining Virginia Agri-Women.

Loudoun's Agricultural Development Officer Kellie Boles will be the vice president of VAW. "The purpose of this group is to facilitate connections between farmers and resources, offer networking and educational events, educate the public, and support legislation that promotes agriculture," Boles explained.

According to the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, about 17 percent of Virginia's primary farm operators are women. The USDA's most recent census showed that more than 1,000 women run farms in Loudoun.

"Our chapter will strive to promote opportunities that advance the welfare of our members regarding important issues surrounding agriculture," Boles said.


Sign Up to Be in Holiday Brochure

The awards ceremony kicked off this year's Epicurience food and wine festival, and was hosted by the Loudoun Winery Association.

"Our goal is to showcase the breadth and depth of quality of Loudoun County wines, while providing an opportunity for ongoing quality improvement," said LWA Chair Mark Fedor, co-owner and winemaker of North Gate Vineyard. "This program satisfies that goal in a unique way, combining winemaker education and the perspective of wine consumers with traditional professional wine evaluation," Fedor said.

Zephaniah Farm Vineyards' 2012 Three Captains Red was the top-scoring wine, winner of the Chairman's Grand Award. Bluemont Vineyard's 2013 The Ram Merlot was the top-scoring wine made with 100 percent Loudoun-grown grapes, and won the Chairman's Reserve Award.

Gary Hornbaker Honored by Virginia Cattlemen

Loudoun Economic Development's Rural Resources Coordinator Gary Hornbaker received the Industry Service Award from the Virginia Cattlemen's Association at a surprise ceremony attended by a host of VIPs, including Virginia Secretary of Agriculture Todd Haymore, Virginia Tech President Timothy Sands, and the Executive Director of the Virginia Cattlemen's Association, Jason Carter.

In presenting the award, Carter read an overview of Hornbaker's achievements, going back to his work as an animal science specialty extension agent with the Virginia Cooperative Extension Service in 1982. "He was one of the first extension agents to conduct multi-county beef education meetings," Carter said.

"Perhaps Gary's greatest service to the Virginia cattle industry – besides the producer education – is his representation of traditional agriculture to local, regional and state boards," Carter said.

"I'm honored and humbled to receive a service award for supporting and helping Virginia cattlemen. It's what I enjoy doing, and to be recognized for that is very nice but unexpected," Hornbaker said.

Loudoun Economic Development Director Buddy Rizer noted the importance of the beef and dairy industries to the economy. "Agriculture is Virginia's largest industry, and has a \$52 billion economic impact. The combined annual sales of cattle, calves and milk alone are \$954,000,000."

Rizer added that he's pleased that Hornbaker's work not only contributes to Loudoun's economy, but to the entire state as well.

Equine Facility Study

This summer, Loudoun's Board of Supervisors voted to partner with Fauquier County on a study to find out the feasibility of creating an equine quarantine facility. Such a facility would increase the viability of bringing international horses to world-class events in our region, and also make it more attractive for international businesses to work with breeders and trainers in our area. The project is expected to help grow the equestrian industry and increase equestrian-related tourism in the region.

Loudoun's equine industry is the largest in Virginia, with total sales of more than \$70 million that generate nearly \$2.9 million in tax revenue. We are closely followed by Fauquier County. The equine industry has the greatest economic impact of all agricultural sectors in Loudoun, and employs more than 1,000 people.

Equine events also attract tourists, who contribute to the local economy by spending at restaurants, hotels, and other entertainment venues, generating more than \$44 million in sales.

The equine facility study is expected to be completed this fall.
