Engage, Share, Create — Indeed we do!

What happened at Good Shepherd in December when a small group of parishioners sat in a meeting with Amanda Scott, a representative from LAMB Institute in Honduras, and heard of some of the needs of children there? Answer: a small idea began to bubble that perhaps, just perhaps, we could find a small way to help equip an under-construction residence facility for boys there. Since we could not travel with beds or chairs, then perhaps something soft and foldable and personal might be possible. Maybe something fun to decorate a wall or a window? Maybe a prayer or two about this question would be appropriate.

What happened from Good Shepherd to California when God got hold of this prayer? Answer: one "something fun" turned into 25 hand sewn dresses for girls at LAMB, 60 custom made pillow cases in boy and girl themes, and 28 quilts for the residents of the new facility for boys!!! God's answers are so much bigger than our prayers!!!!

Another 35 or so people stepped up. Today they are finished and paid for.

Just as those working on the quilts were expressing concern that the quilt project was for the boys only but feeling totally unable to take on more — the phone rang and a woman's voice said, "I am Gwen

How did this happen? The idea and the prayer about it were given wings — and it flew! A Good Shepherd group decided to make the Quilts for Honduras project happen. We were not sure how to tackle something of this size or how we would pay for it. But it began thanks to about 20 parishioners — those who quilted, those who did not, and those who never threaded a needle! But every single one was a





cheerleader with a willing set of hands. Today all 28 quilts are finished and ready to travel to Honduras in July. An appeal for sponsors for the quilts was made. Another 35 or so people stepped up. Today they are finished and paid for.

Just as those working on the quilts were expressing concern that the quilt project was for the boys only — but feeling totally unable to take on more — the phone rang and a woman's voice said, "I am Gwen from St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Wilkesboro, NC. We hear that you are going to Honduras this summer on a mission trip. We would like to send with you dresses we will make for the young girls there." They are completed and ready to travel.

In April a visitor from California came to Good Shepherd and learned of the quilt project. In June, an email arrived. "Been thinking about the quilt project. Would it be OK for some of us here to send pillowcases we will make for both boys and girls? By the way, how many are there of each?" A week later, another email: "Pillowcases all finished."

Thanks to each of you who participated in whatever way. And Thanks Be to God!

Stewardship

From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded; and from the one who has been entrusted with much, much more will be asked. Luke 12:48

Over the years I have heard many things said about stewardship and the practice of stewardship described in various ways. Most often, I have heard stewardship being brought out of the closet and dusted off for the annual giving campaign. It is time once again for people to re-up their pledge to the parish so out comes the idea of stewardship to make an appearance in sermons, parish announcements, newsletters, letters from annual pledge drive committees and so forth. During that season of stewardship, we often hear about something called a tithe and perhaps that the Biblical standard is a 10% tithe. Is that 10% of the gross or net, of earned income or all assets? I let all that wash over me without wondering if anything I knew about stewardship was correct.

Most fundamentally, stewardship is how we respond at all times to God's gracious gift of all we have. Yes, those gifts include our money and our time and our talents. But that is not everything. It also includes the people in our lives, our relationships, our own being, the things in the world around us, and all else we can imagine. Stewardship is about embracing all that God has given as unmerited gift and then responding to that deep understanding with the greatest degree of gratitude possible. As gifts given, as unmerited gifts given, we are challenged to use those gifts in response to God's love for us. A grateful person, one who embraces the fact that all they have is the product of God's grace, is one who gives freely and generously, not calculating percentages or the difference between gross and net income,

nor thinking solely in terms of time, talent, and treasure. Knowing that God is the source of our gifts, and trusting that God both has provided and will provide again, should be sufficient to overcome fears that if we are generous in giving we will not have enough for our own needs. The truth is that when our hands are tightly closed around the gifts we have received we can neither share



those gifts as they were meant to be shared nor can we receive the more that God is always pouring out upon God's people and all of creation.

We are a parish that has been given much and with grateful hearts gives generously to support this church and its many, many ministries. The words of scripture tell us that having been entrusted with much, much more will be asked of us. I invite all members of this parish to reflect in this post-Pentecost season of growth on the gifts they have been given and how they express their gratitude for those gifts. Developing an attitude of gratitude and increasing our generosity now will prepare us for the time when much more will be asked of us.



Oldtimer—Jeanne Russack

The Amplified Bible defines the word "blessed" as used in the Beatitudes as "happy, to be envied, and spiritually prosperous – with life -giving joy and satisfaction in God's favor and salvation, regardless of outward conditions." Jeanne Russack has been blessed all her life.

Born 88 years ago, Jeanne grew up in Chicago, a few blocks from the University of Chicago. She had a happy childhood, enjoying card games with her family, playing with friends in the alley between back yards, and selling lemonade or other concoctions on the street. One neighbor had a tennis court which was flooded for ice skating in the winter.

Family weekends usually involved a trip to the country. Her father had always wanted to own a farm, and finally bought one, although he had to hire a farmer. He was unable to do the work himself, due to a weak heart from which he died at the young age of 53. Jeanne has an older sister, but they were never close, and she usually didn't participate in family activities.

Summers usually included a summer camp in Colorado, where she became an excellent competitive shooter. Once, for some reason she can't recall, she shot her initials in their neighbors' new car. She kept waiting for her father to say something to her about it, but not a word was mentioned. Finally, after she'd gone to camp, she got a letter from her dad, in which he said, "Well, I guess you've had enough time to think about what you've done." And that was all he said. He was wise: for Jeanne the weeks of waiting for the other shoe to drop was punishment enough.

Jeanne attended an experimental public school near the University which benefitted from all the latest educational theories, excellent teachers, and a wonderful music program. In high school, the first of her lifelong issues with cancer surfaced, and due to her health, she completed her last two years of high school at a small girls school. Since then, she has had more than 40 operations to remove cancers, most of them unrelated, but one so serious at the age of 36 that the doctors gave her only a few months to live. Happily, her cheerful personality and positive outlook prevailed.

Jeanne graduated from Depauw University, majoring in "having fun." Or possibly Home Economics.

Her first job was as a teacher in a high school level correspondence school. She tried her best to provide encouragement and direction to students she would never meet and whose circumstances she didn't know. She enjoyed trying to imagine what they were like and never returned a paper without a comment along with the grade.

She began married life with Harry Wilson in Terre Haute, though they lived many places. In 1952 while in Connecticut, Jeanne began selling real estate and discovered she loved it! She and Harry had two

daughters, Anne and Joan, but divorced when Joan was in college. Jeanne eventually married Larry Russack, a fellow real estate agent, but shortly after they were married they learned he had severe emphysema. They moved to Florida for his health, where she also became a caregiver for her

mother and step-father who lived in a life care facility. Both mother and husband died around 1985.

Her experience led Jeanne to facilitate a class on death and dying at the Presbyterian church she was attending in Pompano Beach. The group bonded so well they didn't want to break up when the series was over, so she began organizing trips for them. For over twenty years, she led this group and anyone else who wanted to come (ranging from 30 to 60 people!) on trips around the world. Jeanne remembers this time of serving as tour guide for her friends as one of the most enjoyable things she has done in her life. Her daughter Joan remembers the trips fondly, too, because she got to go along on many of them!

Although Jeanne's daughters lived in Florida much of this time, they gradually migrated to the mountains. Jeanne had been happily living for 20 years in John Knox Village, a wonderful total life facility, but she wanted to be better acquainted with her children as adults. So Jeanne gave away her car and moved in with Joan in January 2015. Their plan is that, when the time is right, they will move together to a similar facility in Blairsville.

Besides travel, music has been a great joy in Jeanne's life. She has sung all her life wherever she has been and is looking forward to singing in the Good Shepherd Choir. Her favorite hymn is *Holy, Holy, Holy*. Denomination hasn't been important to her and she has attended many churches. However, she says, "This has been the most friendly church, second to none."

Her advice to children? "Be aware, be friendly, think before you act, and always love, whatever you do."

Newcomer — Joan Norris

I am 63 years old and widowed. I now have my Mom, Jeanne Russack, living with me and am thoroughly enjoying that. I was blessed with two wonderful daughters, Jeanne age 30 (Nashville, Tn.) and Katie age 27 (Asheville, NC). I have a wonderful grandson, Korbin, who is 3 and frequently comes to church with me.

I have lived in Hayesville since 1999. We camped and fell in love with this area when the girls were growing up outside of Atlanta. We bought a log cabin to use as rental property and eventually moved here permanently. My sister and her family did the same thing and now live in Hiawassee.

I spent 4 years in the US Army during Vietnam, at the Burn unit in San Antonio, Texas, to get my GI Bill. I was then able to go to nursing school. After graduation I did an internship program at Jackson Memorial Hospital in Miami, FI, specializing in Neonatal ICU. That was a real advantage when my oldest daughter was born at 6 ½ months and

weighed 2 pounds 11 ounces. My youngest daughter was adopted. I also worked in Home Health, but I began having a number of physical problems and had to stop working in my early 40s. I have kept busy with volunteer work, as well as learning and teaching Paper Crafting, and traveling whenever possible.

I grew up in the Methodist Church and later joined the Congregational Church. When my children were small we went to a small Christian church, but after a major disappointment there I had a long gap with no church. Last summer I was invited to Good Shepherd by my neighbor and was shocked at how friendly everyone was. I decided to go the next week too. At that point I knew I had found my place at Good Shepherd. The people are amazing; the sermons every Sunday are awesome. I had never felt this anywhere in my life. Not to mention I can share my Paper Crafting and other talents here! I plan to be here for a very long time.
