Spiritual DNA

In the present case I advise you: Leave these men alone! Let them go! For if their purpose or activity is of human origin, it will fail. But if it is from God, you will not be able to stop these men; you will only find yourselves fighting against God. Acts 5:38-39

In the Book of Acts, we find a lawyer Gamaliel speaking to the Temple elite, telling them to take no action against the apostles and their nascent faith community. Gamaliel reminds them that, as has been the case of the many leaders and movements that came before the Jesus movement, if this new movement is not of God it will die. I would add that if a community does not remain in God's purposes it will also die.

Every faith community has a genesis moment in which its "spiritual DNA" is created and its foundational character and purpose are established. God is up to something new when a faith community first gathers and takes root, working his will in and through the lives of his people in a particular place. Reflection upon that genesis moment and the subsequent development of a church are important matters for church leaders and church members. Remaining true to or deviating from its spiritual DNA may explain much about whether a particular church thrives or fails to thrive.

Good Shepherd is no different in this matter. Its genesis moment was the coming together of Clay country residents who had been traveling to Murphy for Sunday services and their friends. It was founded by a mixed group of Episcopalians and their non-episcopal spouses who found comfort, support, and welcome in their small Clay county gathering. Initially meeting in each other's homes, they planted in Clay county a faith community whose spiritual DNA is encoded for showing welcome and hospitality to



all seeking to belong regardless of prior religious affiliation. This faith community will continue to thrive if we continue to embrace and continue to live into the full implications of our spiritual DNA. We must not take for granted that we are and will remain welcoming, but we must be intentional in looking for and greeting those among us who are new, those who are visiting, and those in the community who have not yet found us. We must widen the circle of those who feel at home among us. May God continue to give us the opportunity, the will, and the courage to accomplish his purposes for this church.

Developing the 2016 Church Budget

The process of developing the annual budget to some seems like a deep dark secret known only to a few. That is definitely not what the Finance Committee wants it to be. We feel the more you know about it the better you will respond to the needs of the church.

First, after much prayer and work, the Good Shepherd Vestry developed a Vision Statement to guide us into the future. The Vision Statement focuses on three major goals for us--Boldly engaging God's word; Sharing God's blessings; and, Creating Heaven on earth. Then, in August, all the ministry chairpersons were requested to submit their financial requirements and plans, if any, to support these goals in 2016. Also, in August the Vestry met to discuss and set the church's overall goals for 2016 in line with the Vision Statement.

In September, the ministry budget requests will be reviewed and consolidated by the Finance Executive Committee (Father Bill, the Senior Warden {Suzie Herbert}, the Treasurer {Elizabeth Rybicki} and the Finance Committee chair {Jim Reynolds}). Then, the ministry budgetary needs will be presented to the Finance Committee for their review and input. The Finance Committee consists of: Father Bill, Andy Dickert, Betsi Wilson, Dave Gribble, Doug Stuart, Elizabeth Rybicki, George Heilner, Jane Oliver, Jim Harrison, Jim Reynolds, Lou

Lanwermeyer, Pat Fox, Pat Mahon, and Suzi Herbert.

After the Finance Committee review, a description of what the ministries plan to do in 2016 to help fulfill the Vision Statement goals and the cost of doing that will be written. The preliminary budget compiled at this point is based on what the ministry heads would love to accomplish if funds were unlimited. This information is made a part of the Annual Stewardship Campaign.

In early January, the preliminary budget is adjusted based upon funds pledged for 2016, the church's year-end financial status and the priorities set by the Vestry. A draft budget for 2016 is developed that goes to the Finance Executive Committee and the Finance Committee for review. Because the Parish Annual Meeting happens before the January Vestry meeting, this draft budget is shown in our Parish Annual Report. The draft budget is submitted to the Vestry for its review and approval. Upon approval, it becomes the official budget for the work of Good Shepherd in 2016. At that time, the official budget is made available to the congregation.



Oldtimer — Jim Harrison



When you visit with Jim Harrison, the twinkle in his blue eyes and boyish grin bears witness to the mischievous boy who grew up in Gainesville, Georgia in the '40s and '50s. Living downtown between Brenau College and the square, he felt he had the best of any childhood. He and his two older brothers could walk everywhere, knew everyone, and had great fun spying on the girls at Brenau. They always watched the annual Mayday parade and the girls

in their fancy dresses around the maypole.

The boys played football, basketball, and baseball with the neighbors, and threw dirt clods for distance! They knew all the back alleys, and he especially remembers a high retaining wall, which was useful if one was being chased. They would make the jump, but any pursuers usually backed off as too risky. Of course, since everybody knew everybody, whenever they did get in trouble, whoever was home already knew about it, because "Miss Jane" or somebody had already called to say, "You know what he's been doin'?" Jim's advice to young folks is, "Always tell the truth: It's easier to keep up with." If his father found out a boy wasn't telling the truth, "you were in for a licking."

Bimbo Brewer was Jim's best friend as he grew up, and they were like family, in and out of each other's houses until they grew apart in high school. Jim's best subjects were math, football, and recess! The family attended the Methodist church, though most of the neighborhood youth participated in the Baptist youth group, regardless of denomination. He sang in the choir (though he claims he only mouthed it). Jim's favorite hymns are *The Old Rugged Cross*, and *Morning Has Broken*.

Jim married his high school sweetheart Connie and graduated from the University of Georgia. He worked for three or four years with Citizens & Southern Bank (nicknamed "Catch 'em and Squeeze 'em"). He must have been pretty good at it: He is proud of having put together the Atlanta bank's largest transaction. He is also fond of the moment he proved it to a skeptical Chase banker who was convinced Jim didn't know what he was talking about.

Jim left the bank to go into real estate. He owned his own company for a few years, then sold it to Northside Realty, Georgia's largest independent real estate firm, and worked for them as managing broker for nearly 12 years. He found it challenging but enjoyable to deal with the nuances of the daily changing real estate market to figure out what they needed to be doing.

Jim has two boys and a girl from his first marriage, which ended in 1991. Friends in the real estate office had a vacation house behind Deer Lodge, south of Hiawassee, and it only took one visit for Jim to decide to build a cabin here, too. Jim met Becky at work: "The best thing that ever happened to me," says Jim. "She's my favorite subject, without a doubt. I could talk about her all day long, but she wouldn't like that." Becky had a boy and two twin girls who were about 13 when she and Jim were married in 1995. Teenage twins could have been a recipe for disaster, but Jim says they had a good time together. Hiawassee became their primary home, though they still had a house in Gainesville where Becky continues to work in real estate.

Jim had been deeply involved in the Episcopal Church when he lived in Cumming, Georgia. He served there in almost every capacity, including vestry, senior warden, grounds keeper, etc. As he and Becky searched for a church in Hiawassee, they started going to the Methodist church, then tried Christ the King Anglican Church as the closest Episcopal service. They were already friends with Maggie and Julian Carnes, who invited them to Good Shepherd, and the rest is history. Jim has served here as a Stephen Minister, Usher, Lay Reader, and most recently he served on the Discernment Committee which recommended Fr. Bill Breedlove.

Fishing, hunting, and traveling have been Jim's primary hobbies, but to share them with family and friends is what he likes best. A visit to the Holy Land is the only goal he hasn't achieved. Jim enjoys people and appreciates differing personalities and points of view. "I care about what each person brings to the table," he says. "It's how I learn." Bottom line, though, it's Becky who gives meaning to his life.

Jim would like to be remembered as a caring person. His advice to young people today is to always tell the truth and to stand behind what they. As a person of integrity himself, Jim does his best to live out his favorite scripture: "Love one another."
