THE LOVE OF CHRIST AT WORK IN PERU

Below is an email I recently received from Herb and Markie Burch (the NWD supports their work in Lima, Peru.) They gave me permission to share. I think the email speaks for itself. Please remember them in your prayers!

Dear Dwayne,

Yesterday was a day of miracles! One never knows when our great and glorious God is going to send an emissary to give encouragement. After meeting with the mission team, Herb and I had to call a cab to take us back to Los Olivos. We had large heavy boxes to take north, and we couldn't carry them on the bus.

When the cab arrived, we hopped in and Herb and the driver started to chat. We soon learned that this man lived in the southernmost tip of the city, and now he was taking us to the north. Instead of being disgruntled he was both a cheerful and skillful driver, and the journey got off to a good start.

When he learned that we were missionaries, he got very quiet. He soon asked if there would be pastors who would lose their jobs because of the new law passed by the Supreme Court allowing homosexual marriages. We had to confess that we didn't know. All we could say was that this was a very good question, and we were all wondering about how this decision will impact the future. We then discussed the difficulty of Christians reaching out and showing love to sinners, but not condoning sin-because of course, we are all sinners.

It was at this point that he gave his testimony and told about how Jesus had saved his life. He told of his past transgressions, and then opened his heart and shared how God had transformed him and now blesses him and his entire family. He thanked us profusely for being in Peru, and when we parted, we parted as friends.

Later that day we met another taxi driver, and in less than 15 minutes he too had shared his life's story and told us how he learned of the saving grace of Jesus through a visiting Baptist missionary when he was a youth. He said, "It is not easy to leave one's country, home, and children to work as missionaries in a foreign country." Then he added, "Thank you for being here, and thank you for what you are doing."



Herb and I were both teary when we left his car. What a day! I thought you'd like to hear about it.

RSTM Outreach Planning

Have you ever felt like you missed your chance? Have you ever wondered about the purpose of an event at your congregation or felt like you are just going through the motions when it comes to outreach events? You are not alone! Don't get me wrong here; I am a huge supporter of the annual chicken/chili/ fill-in-the-blank dinner. These are the places where you can get some of the best food and fellowship around. They are great times to celebrate all that the Lord has done in and among His gathered people. If we are already putting effort into these gatherings, why not focus on using these events to reach out to those in our community who may not know the love of Christ? Here are few ways through which we can do just that:

• **Be Strategic** – Often, we do events for decades without much thought. Make plans with outreach as the main goal. Plan out, step by step, how this will be accomplished. Who do you desire to reach? When is the best time to reach them? Where are they? How do we communicate with them? These are just a few questions to get started.

- Coordinate Your Efforts Perhaps one group has always been in charge of putting on a particular dinner. But the evangelism board is looking for a way to reach out. Have these groups get together for the planning process so the bases are covered. Also consider the idea of partnering with other congregations to make something happen that you couldn't on your own. Know your community calendar and try not to schedule your event at the same time as another local school, church, or community event.
- **Be Flexible** It doesn't have to be exactly the same as it has always been. Small changes in venue or timing can make huge differences in the number of people to whom we can reach out. Work together instead of against one another. As part of the strategic plan, have your goals in mind and have everyone working toward those goals, even if it makes us stretch our comfort zone a little.
- **Be Creative** Consistency and dependability are wonderful things. Looking forward to a familiar event can add to the charm. However, adding a little creativity to our events will often draw a bigger audience. Change up the menu, have some entertainment, do something different than usual. This will often help create excitement
- **Get the Word Out** We often assume when we have hosted an event for many years, that people will automatically know about it. This is fine if you want the same people to attend year after year, but then it doesn't count as an outreach opportunity. Signs, fliers and advertisements are good and should be utilized, but don't stop there. Consider writing an article about your event for the local newspaper. Pick a mission opportunity to support and tell folks why it is a good thing to support. (In doing this, you get to share the reason for the hope you have.) If you have a radio station nearby, see if they have an opportunity for an interview or a story. Above all, invite people! Invite your friends and family like always, but don't stop there! Invite your unchurched neighbors, coworkers, acquaintances and complete strangers. The quickest way to begin a relationship is by making a connection and this provides a great opportunity. If possible, plan to keep a certain number of tickets available to give away to those we so desperately want to reach.

- Be Welcoming Once you get the event planned and orchestrated, make sure
 everyone who attends feels welcome. Greeters should be ready to welcome, help
 with directions, get guests anything they need, and introduce them to others who
 are present. Don't let them sit in a corner by themselves, but rather integrate
 them into the crowd.
- **Share God's Word** Don't stop with food and fellowship. Use the event to plant seeds, tell the story, and/or share your own faith. It isn't a bait and switch scenario, just an honest way to take advantage of the fact that you have them there. Be creative. This could be through educating folks on the reason you are there, the reason for the event, or through the entertainment.
- Follow Up Now that you had the event and made connections, don't let it end there. Take the connections that you made and follow-up. A call, note or visit can go a long way! Invite them to future events. You don't have to be pushy, just concerned about maintaining and furthering that relationship. Who knows what may come of it!



Counselor Corner

THE EMOTIONAL PASTOR

When God created mankind they were destined to be emotional beings. Said differently, God didn't create stoics.





Pastors are more likely known for love and joy. It is expected that they will express these emotions, tied to their Biblical roots. Yet, the "dark" emotions are also found in the Bible. Even chosen leaders like Elijah, David, Jeremiah and Peter were subject to fear, despair and anger. Why would modern-day pastors presume themselves exempt from these emotions?

On this "dark"-side we find pastors dealing with anger, fear, and guilt. These emotions are fueled by the dynamics of ministry such as:

- A perceived or real lack-of support from members.
- The endless duties and responsibilities of parish ministry.
- The expectation that the pastor is infallible-he always has to be performing at 100 percent.
- Limited friends, or support system.

Each of the above is a potential stressor that has human impact. If a pastor attempts to ignore or "stuff" the related emotions, he does himself no favor. Accumulated, negative emotions can prove toxic and diminish ministry vitality.

In God's plan, such real emotions are meant to be addressed and expressed. Here is where a confidant, or support group can be very beneficial. Jesus' words have application here—"Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free" (John 8:32).
