Join New York acclaimed photographer, Gigi Stoll as she chronicles her photographic journey. Gigi is a former fashion model turned photographer and will talk about her photographic projects which include Mission India, Operation Kids, Shadow Series/Nudes and Lingerie and more. Gigi will be discussing different cameras, formats, lighting and other aspects of her photography.

2:00 – 2:50 PM **Capturing Iconic New York in High Res Digital – Tom Grill** *Morgan Suite*

This presentation will describe the best viewpoints and methods for capturing dramatic images of the New York City skyline and the city's most iconic architectural elements and locations. Topics include calculating the best time of day, best time of year, what equipment to use, and techniques and locations for night photography. It will also demonstrate techniques for obtaining the highest quality digital images with a Leica M 240 camera to achieve resolution high enough for super-sized panoramas and even wall-size prints. The Leica M series is usually thought of as a photojournalist's camera. I use it for creating large scale landscape and cityscape images due to the unprecedented quality of its optics and sensor.

The Ear Inn

326 Spring Street (bet Greenwich & Washington

One of the oldest of all the bars. Opened by an assistant to George Washington.

White Horse Tavern

15 East 7th Street; One of the most famous old bars in the city. Only serves one beer, McSorley's Ale in dark or light, no other drinks.

The Old Town Bar

45 East 18 Street (Park and Broadway)

The Tammany Hall politicians kept this bar open during Prohibition so they would have a place to go and drink.

Pete's Tavern

129 East 18 Street on Irving Place

Disguised as a florist shop during Prohibition, this tavern has been operating continually since 1864.

O. Henry lived down the street and wrote "The Gift of the Magi" here.
