The Importance Of Quorum On **November 2nd**

The second of the Seven Cooperative Principles, "Democratic Member Control," ensures that members have a voice in the governance of the Cooperative. There are several ways the members can exercise their democratic responsibilities. This time of year, two major opportunities are on the horizon: board elections and the annual meeting.

The most frequent democratic interaction between Co-op members and the store is through the Board of Directors. The Board is a group of nine volunteers who serve the Co-op by representing the Members' fiduciary interests. Much like in the United States' representative democracy, the Board makes decisions with a greater deal of frequency than is convenient for most members. The Co-op has 9 Board Members serving staggered 3 year

terms, with 3 directors being elected annually.

The second, more direct, opportunity for democratic participation in the Co-op is fast approaching. This issue of the New Leaf is serving as due notice for the Co-op's annual meeting where we're trying to achieve a quorum of our members. In the SRFC bylaws (and NY State Law), the requirements for quorum are 10% of membership or 100 members, whichever is smaller. For a Co-op of our size, 100 members is all it takes to establish a Jeremy DeChario, General Manager

quorum for our Annual Meeting.

Quorum at the annual meeting allows the Co-op's membership to conduct official business, such as voting on Bylaw changes and opening the floor for new business. The Co-op's ability to effectively operate depends on achieving quorum, at the annual meetings, and I encourage all interested people (member or not) to come to our Annual Meeting on November 2nd from 7-9pm at the Westcott Community Center to hear annual reports, help us achieve quorum and act on Co-op business.

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Five Fab Facts About Co-ops

Article From Co+op Stronger Together

We think co-ops are fabulous. Cooperation is, after all, a word that implies people working together towards the same end, mutually benefitting one another and the larger community. Both economically beneficial and socially responsible, these community-minded businesses make the world a better place—and that's a beautiful thing. Here are five fab reasons to celebrate co-ops:

1. October is National Co-op Month.

The cooperative model is unique. A co-op exists to serve its members, but the members are also the owners. With ownership comes an opportunity to participate in some co-op decision-making and to reap economic rewards for ownership, often in the form of patronage dividends. Globally, there are nearly one billion people who are cooperative member-owners. And in the United States, there are more than 29,000 co-ops, including—but not limited to—retail food co-ops, like the grocers that are members of NCG, the organization that brings you this website. Beyond your neighborhood food co-op, co-operatives exist in other areas such as brew-pubs, coffee, dairy farms, credit unions, electric, hardware stores, crafts, housing and chocolate to name a few.

Co-ops are positioned to respond directly to community needs and collaborate with other organizations, setting goals that extend beyond financial growth. By shopping at a co-op, you might be helping to support your community with hunger relief, nutrition education or environmental conservation. Steve McQueen would most definitely approve of these magnificent seven principles. **3. DOTcoop.**

Look up to the top of your browser. Find that familiar address bar and the notice DOTcoop at the end of our URL. As co-op fans, we like to brag about this little badge of honor that demonstrates major credibility. The .coop puts co-ops on par with the web domains like .org, .edu and .gov. Co-ops have their own domain so that when you're on .coop you can trust that you're working with a verifiable cooperatively owned business.

4. Employees Are Some of Our Favorite People.

Beyond offering awesome products and services, cooperatives are committed to the health and happiness of the people that fuel them. So it's no surprise they treat their hard-working employees right. According to a re-

cent study, the average food co-op earning \$10 million per year in revenue provides jobs for 90+ workers. And, on average, 68 percent of those workers are eligible for health insurance, compared to 56 percent of employees at conventional grocers. Food co-op employees also earn an average of nearly \$1.00 more per hour than conventional grocery workers when bonuses and profit sharing are taken into account.



2. The Magnificent 7.

Cooperative businesses proudly operate with seven principles. One of those principles is concern for community, working towards more sustainable communities through initiatives undertaken by management under
