Be Part of the Local Heroes STEAM Pop-Up Saturday May 14th



BE THE STEAM VORTEX AT LOCAL HEROES



Your scouts belong at **Local Heroes STEAM Pop-up** if after watching shows like Bone Detectives, CSI, Curiosity, Dr. G Medical Examiner, How Do They Do It?, How Its Made, Mega Disasters, Mystery Diagnosis, NOVA, Numbers, The Works, etc., you thought wow this story could become a scout STEAM activity. Act on these great ideas by encouraging your scouts to bring a STEAM activity the Local Heroes STEAM Pop-up.

Envision creating activities that showcase scouts STEAM knowledge. Empower Scouts to brainstorm. Enable them by sharing jumpstart ideas like flying a surveillance drone; building and demonstrating a search and rescue

robot; presenting fire safety monitoring devices; creating infographics that show how DNA is used to solve crimes or identify victims; applying chemistry knowledge to determine how fires start or to analyze clues; demonstrate best of class safety apps.

Bring STEAM Activities that introduce new career paths by showcasing technology skills that scouts learn that could help them become Certified Emergency Medical Technicians, Emergency and Disaster Professionals or earn Firefighter Certifications.

Consider creating MakerSpace hands on activities that help visitors learn about and experience



how STEAM knowledge is applied by Local Heroes to keep us safe.

STEAM activities that help Scouts complete an advancement requirement are encouraged. Using the EDGE method to teach Cyber Safety or showing visitors how to create a database to keep track of serial numbers for their possessions are examples.

Artist scouts could demonstrate how forensic artists create composite drawings. The possibilities are endless.
