

FROM THE PRINCIPAL:

Dear Parents,

Teachers and students have completed the first nonfiction unit of study this school year in Reading Workshop. Our entire school focused on how to read, comprehend, interpret text features (captions, headings, bold print, maps, tables of contents, glossaries and more), and to devour nonfiction texts. Students read books, magazines, and online articles, viewed video clips, learned to take notes with bullets and boxes, and have begun to recognize various ways that authors choose to structure nonfiction writing. Many were surprised to discover that they LOVE reading about REAL topics! What some previously considered BORING is now considered **ENGAGING!**

At nearly all grade levels, students are expected to develop research skills across content areas with a strong focus on nonfiction, including literary nonfiction; essays; biographies and autobiographies; journals and technical manuals; and charts, graphs, and maps. These skills will benefit them through their academic careers as well as beyond school!

Are our students excited about nonfiction? Books about natural disasters, pets, people, and sports have been FLYING off the shelves of the Learning Commons! Our students have even reached out and have had THEIR enthusiasm go viral – writing to give the Atlanta Hawks advice on how to triumph over Lebron James! How can you help and support your child as they navigate the world of reading Nonfiction?

Tips for Parents in Supporting Children in Reading Nonfiction Books

Before Reading:

- Read the title of the book and look at the cover together.
- Discuss what the child already knows about the topic.
- Encourage your child to ask questions about the topic.
- Do a walk through the book together before reading it.
- Discuss the pictures, read the captions together.
- Point out and discuss any text features (table of contents, headings, diagrams, tables, glossaries, etc.).
- Point out any difficult vocabulary words. Read the sentence that contains the difficult word and discuss its meaning.

During Reading:

Ask your child to read the text aloud to you. Stop along the way and discuss what the two of you are learning. 2. Continue to ask questions you want to find out and encourage your child to do the same. Point out when the answers are found.

After Reading:

Discuss the main ideas and key details revealed in the text.

If there were unanswered questions, talk about where you could find the answers and then explore finding them together.

Optional - Writing Extensions:

Readers of nonfiction often want to share what they have learned. This is an excellent opportunity to encourage your child to write about his/her new learning. Perhaps he/she could write a few sentences and draw a picture of a key idea or write a short picture book to share with a younger sibling or friend. This would also be a great opportunity to create a multi-media presentation, a public service announcement, or a presentation!

Thank you for your continued support! We are excited to be providing the gift of reading to our Buccaneers! It is surely a gift that will impact them for the rest of their academic careers!

IDENT-A-KID

A representative from Ident-A-Kid Child ID Program will be at Mt. Bethel on February 3. This program provides parents with an identification card including your child's picture and vital information. The Ident-A-Kid card is designed to provide parents and law enforcement officials with crucial information should your child become lost or missing. The driver's license-like card contains your child's photograph, fingerprint and description. Parents keep the card with them at all times and, in an emergency, can provide law enforcement with it for immediate response. In addition, the United States Government's Social Security Administration recognizes the Ident-A-Kid Card may be usable in supporting either secondary or third level identification, should it be needed. 

Is your Child at Risk of Having Duck Syndrome? By: Kellie Oakes

I came to work at Mt. Bethel as a school counselor in 2008. I was thrilled to have the opportunity to come back and work at such an amazing school because I went to Mt. Bethel, Dickerson, and Walton. I was excited to give my own children the opportunity to go to the same great schools. We are very fortunate to live in this community and I am thankful that my children can learn from such amazing teachers. However, as a school counselor I am also able to see the struggles our kids face today in our high achieving society through a different filter.

Many things have changed in the last 20 years since I graduated from Walton. School has become highly competitive, kids are using social media at a young age, and often they are not equipped to deal with the stress and anxiety that they face. I have heard many early elementary kids compare themselves to their classmates. It's sad when the self-esteem of an elementary child is already deflated because she sees her classmates reading at a higher level or solving math problems with ease. I recently read an article by Tim Elmore in which he mentioned "Duck Syndrome." He explained that when we see ducks gliding effortlessly across the water they appear beautiful and calm, but they are actually paddling like crazy under the water just to stay afloat. He compares this to the façade that we see in high schools and colleges all across our country.

With the increased competition in our schools, students feel they need to do it all - advanced classes, extracurricular activities, and clubs all the while making it look effortless, but at what cost? Straight A's on a report card and a strong college resume do not equate to good mental health. For some reason students begin to feel like failures at a young age if they aren't the best of the best or the top of the class. I do not mean to imply that there is something wrong with making good grades and being actively involved in extracurricular activities. However, as parents and teachers we need to be mindful of the messages we are sending to our children and students. We need to be watching for signs of stress and help our children manage their stress in a healthy way. If your child begins to show signs that he or she is stressed, talk to him or her and decide together what can be done to alleviate some of the stress.

I write this article now when our children are in elementary school because I encourage you to read more about Duck Syndrome and learn from the mental health challenges high school and college students face so you can make a difference in your child's life. There are things we can do as adults. Tim Elmore states, "we must model what it looks like to embrace hardship, to work, to fail yet be resilient, and most of all, to not hide our struggle." In her article "Are We Stressing Out Our Kids?" Marian Wilde offers the following suggestions for parents:

Strategies for parents of younger children:

- ♦ Listen and notice any expressions of anxiety.
- ◆ Talk with them about their feelings.
- Brainstorm with them to find things they can do to feel better.
- ♦ Make sure they are getting enough sleep. The National Sleep Foundation recommends 9-11 hours for children 5-12 years old.
- Make sure you are not over scheduling them.

Strategies for parents of older children:

- Make sure they are not over scheduling themselves.
- Make sure they are getting enough sleep. The <u>National Sleep Foundation</u> recommends 8.5-9.5 hours a day for adolescents.
- Look at your assumptions about what constitutes a good college and what you are communicating, perhaps unknowingly, to them.

Strategies for parents of children of all ages:

- Look at how you define success and how you communicate that to your children.
- ♦ Limit media time.
- Increase family time, especially eating meals together as a family.


