ered both in the courtroom and in the community.

CASA volunteers are asked to meet with the child regularly and are authorized to interview people in the child's life such as social workers, attorneys, and teachers. They attend court hearings with the child and report their findings to the judge.

"Without volunteers like yourself, many children do not have a voice in this courtroom," CASA Executive Director Lindsay Lierman said.

With more than 1,300 children waiting for a CASA volunteer, many more advocates are needed. There are no prerequisites for becoming a CASA volunteer except being at least

21 years old, clearing an extensive background screening and successfully completing 30 hours of training.
