Using a contemporary voice and a variety of media formats, all students participated in a program celebrating the Forbidden City and the study of architecture, imperial life, and Chinese cultural history.

Science

Grade 1: After assembling a world map, first grade students compared and contrasted the world's



eight bear species and their locations in the world. **Grade 2**: Second graders learned about the giant panda and its habitat and created a diorama of the panda in its temperate forest home. **Grade 3**: Students learned about the endangered status of the giant panda and created brochures to highlight its plight. **Grade 4**: Using iPads and the National Geographic program, <u>Giant Pandas</u>: Into the Wild, students designed a giant panda wildlife reserve.

Hebrew Language

Grade 1: Following directions given in Hebrew, students created

an adorable panda craft to take home. Speaking in Hebrew, students then described their pandas to their classmates. **Grade 2:** Students practiced counting to 100 in Hebrew while using chopsticks to manipulate food items. **Grade 3:** Students participated in a scavenger hunt designed around the Hebrew expression relates to the discussed how this expression relates to the book and their own lives. **Grade 4:** Students participated in a shiur led by Rabbi Koslowe pertaining to the halachic quidelines of putting oneself in danger.



Students in grades 1–4 enjoyed a varied and delicious Chinese menu.



Tai Chi Students in grades 1–4 participated in a Tai Chi session presented by Cari Shurman, founder of Tai Chi for Kids.

According to Ms. Shurman, Tai Chi can improve balance, concentration, flexibility, focus, attention and learning.

Art To raise awareness of the dwindling panda populations, French artist Paulo Grangeon created an exhibition of 1600 paper mache pandas, representing the number of pandas currently in the wild. Inspired by Grangeon, third graders added pandas to Giacometti-styled sculptures and created an exhibition visited by all classes.

Chinese Theatre Works

Our Grand Finale was a presentation of the eclectic Four Treasures, of Chinese music dance and opera, including the Double Swords Dance, Long Ribbon Dance, Guzheng (zither) music, narrated by Kuang Yu.


