#### **New Oak Grove** homes on agenda

New development could start up soon in an established Brunswick neighbor-

The Glynn County Mainland Planning Commission will consider at its regular May meeting the approval of two preliminary subdivision plats, consisting of 34 new home lots in Oak Grove Island Plantation.

The commission convenes at 6 p.m. Tuesday at the old Glynn County Courthouse on G Street with only one item up for discussion and possible approval.

The group will consider approval of two preliminary plats; one for an 18-lot subdivision on 11.8 acres and one for a 16-lot subdivision on 10.1 acres, both located in Oak Grove Island Plantation. Robert "Bud" Myrick, agent of Oak Grove Island Limited, LLLP, is making the request.

The parcels are currently zoned planned development, meaning no zoning changes are necessary. The land is currently vacant, with single-family residences planned for the subdivision.

# Development authority, county close on bonds

The head of the Brunswick and Glynn County Development Authority says the authority and the Glynn County Commission are sending a strong message to industries looking for a place to expand or build.

The closing of bonds Thursday to fund improvements at the Brunswick Golden Isles Airport tells industries "we're open for business," says Mel Baxter, interim executive director of the authority.

"It shows that we're all on the same team and presents a united front," Baxter said. "It shows that we are all committed to economic growth in Glynn County."

The process to secure \$8.7 million from bonds to fund airport expansion took roughly 18 months from start to finish. The county, which funds the authority, agreed to partner in the process, allowing for up to \$10 million in bonds to be issued for the project, which will include construction on the north and east sides of the airport.

Baxter said the move will allow the authority to offer more options for industries looking to relocate or expand. That will be key for aviation related industryieslooking for facilities near a viable airport.

"We can advertise this expansion to those people out there looking to make a move," he said.

square feet of ramp space on the north side near Stambaugh Aviation. The project will allow Stambaugh to expand and add 100 jobs to its employment roster.

Another company, which the airport has not identified, has agreed to locate in the area and bring 50 jobs.

Money from the bond sale will also be used to fund the east side terminal project.

It's been a long time coming since the plans were originally proposed. In October, the board of the development authority approved a proposal to spend \$500,000, previously earmarked for construction of an industrial spec building on infrastructure improvements at the airport.

'We had that money set aside for a spec building for about four years," Baxter said. "We never felt comfortable moving forward on that so we moved it out of the budget over to the design and engineering work on the airport."

Work on the north side of the airport is expected to begin in the fall, most likely in October or November.

Work on the east terminal project will not begin until after the airport's master plan, an FFA requirement, is completed. That is expected by year's end.

The east terminal project will take around a year to complete once construction begins.

"East of the terminal, in that area, we want to expand because we anticipate further growth of the aerospace industry," Baxter
