If you are a new graduate, or a career changer, your experience examples for new occupation choices may be brief. Give yourself credit for all involvement in the information categories: volunteer work on campus, in your community, in your homeowners' association; jobs while you were a student, which demonstrate discipline, and communication and interpersonal skills in all roles; work you've done in past careers that transfers to your new options. If you are highly experienced and/or an expert in particular functions or content areas use examples that will emphasize in-depth responsibility and accountability.

O*NET, a government-sponsored web site (online.onetcenter.org) is one tool that will give you a comprehensive profile of occupations. O*Net is a good beginning research tool to develop your occupational profile; supplement these details with those you find through reading, professional association meetings and informational interviews.
