Reporting directly to the Chief Administrative Officer (the late Dan Sweat), Commissioner Darnell was an architect of Atlanta's "Minority Participation Plan" for the expansion of "Hartsfield International Airport" featured in Henry Hampton's prize – winning documentary, "Eyes on the Prize." She also served as Atlanta's Director of Intergovernmental Affairs and Chair of the Grant Review Board. In this capacity, she participated in the planning, design and construction of the Martin Luther King, Jr. Center for Social Change, Mrs. Coretta Scott King, President.

Commissioner Darnell earned the Bachelor of Arts degree at Fisk University, Nashville, Tennessee where she was initiated as a member of Alpha Beta Chapter, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. She earned the Master of Arts degree at Teachers College, Columbia University where she was selected as a member of the Pi Lambda Theta Honor Society. She was awarded the <u>Juris Doctor</u> degree from the Howard University School of Law.

Citing her work in government as a "public moralist", in June 2000, she was awarded the Doctor of Divinity degree, <u>honoris</u> <u>causa</u> by the Board of Trustees of the Interdenominational Theological Center (ITC) Clark – Atlanta University.
