

The students also visited area universities and colleges to understand the academic requirements, how technology is used in that setting, as well as learn soft skills such as resume writing, career attire and interviewing skills.

Metro Action received funding through the Tennessee Department of Human Services (DHS) to cover the cost of the camp, which included an \$800 stipend for each student. The partnership with the Nashville Digital Inclusion Program provided a laptop for each student to use during the program, which was then given to the student at the end of the program. Daily meals were provided through the USDA Summer Food Service Program, also funded by DHS.

National Summer Learning Day (NSLD) is an advocacy day to elevate the importance of keeping kids learning, safe and healthy every summer. NSLD is a partnership with the White House Summer Opportunity Project, which is designed to give young people access to their first job and encourage investment in programs supporting summer learning and meals for America's young people in the summer.
