

HYMN WRITING CONTEST Press Release

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Macalester Plymouth United Church of Saint Paul, Minnesota is pleased to announce the winners of our church's 2014 hymn contest. Our nineteenth annual contest was a search for a hymn that celebrates God's presence in current social changes and changes in the church.

The judges this year selected a winning hymn and an honorable mention. The winning author will receive a prize of \$400 and the honorable mention author will receive \$100.

The winning hymn, A Hymn for Peace, was written by Christopher L. Webber. Christopher Webber is an author and a priest of the Episcopal Church. He has served in the New York area and in Tokyo, Japan but moved to San Francisco, California in 2013. He has written over thirty books ranging from The Beowulf Trilogy to a ground-breaking study of marriage. His most recent books are an important addition to black history titled American to the Backbone, the biography of James W.C. Pennington, a fugitive slave and leader in the abolition movement, and Dear Friends: St. Paul's Letters to American Christians.

Webber has climbed Mt. Fuji in Japan as well as the highest peaks in New York and New England. He is currently on the staff of the Church of the Incarnation in San Francisco and serves as Adjunct Professor of Liturgics at the Church Divinity School of the Pacific. 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A second hymn was chosen to receive honorable mention. God of Constant New Creation was written by William Allen Pasch. William Pasch serves as organist at First Presbyterian Church in Peachtree City, Georgia. Professor Emeritus of English at Clayton State University in south suburban Atlanta, he has also been a lifelong church musician, starting as organist at age thirteen in his home Lutheran congregation in Toledo, Ohio. He has continued as organist, singer, and choir director in various positions in Ohio,

Massachusetts, and Georgia ever since. He is often called upon as organist for festival services of the ELCA-Southeastern Synod. His choral anthems are published by Augsburg Fortress and St. James Music Press. His hymn texts have been published in Lutheran Forum and in CrossAccent (Association of Lutheran Church Musicians) and have won prizes in national and international competitions. He resides in Griffin, Georgia where his spouse, Katherine, serves as pastor of Saint John Lutheran Church.
