Coming down?.....

Maybe not!

Demolition has stopped on the site of the former Farm Bureau Co-op grain processing complex in Noblesville. The work stopped because the Noblesville Preservation Alliance and Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development (HAND) have come forward with a proposal to redevelop the South 8th Street site for housing and the saving of portions of the old grain facility.

The unique idea is to save a section of the grain elevator and incorporate it with new multi-family. The plan does not have anything to do with the giant silos which are already largely demolished, only the wooden elevator structure which is well over 100 years old, and the possible moving of the original mill office facing 9th Street.

Nate Lichty, Executive Director of HAND, says plans are in the works to submit an application for rezoning and a development plan for the two-acre site. If approved by City Planning officials, an

application will be sent to state officials in November for a grant to purchase the site and build 30 to 60 housing units. He says state housing officials have been receptive to other such projects.

The multi-family housing facility would incorporate elements of the old grain structure either as an entry point or other feature of the design. Preservation officials say the old structure would serve as a visible reminder of Noblesville history when grain milling was the city's largest employer. The Noblesville Milling Company, started in post-Civil War times, was responsible for the name Noblesville Millers.

Lichty says the plan is an "exciting opportunity" to provide housing for folks employed in the downtown area or in the newly renovated Noblesville foundry. Both areas are within walking distance of the site. There could also be parking provided for those attending functions at the historic Model Mill just north of the proposed project.

He says the plans also fit with city efforts to redevelop South 8th Street and rejuvenate the Southwest Quad, something city officials have been considering since last year. Mike Corbett, an officer with Noblesville Preservation, says he hopes all groups involved can bring the plans to reality as rapidly as possible. He sees no reason to hold up remaining demolition of the grain silos and other clearing at the site with the exception of the elevator.

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Noblesville teen runs on to the field at Reds game

A Noblesville teenager lost a bet - and wound up winning many new fans on social media by making good on his portion of the dare.

Justin Buchanan, 19, ran on the field during a Cincinnati Reds-Chicago Cubs game Wednesday at Cincinnati's Great American Ball Park. Buchanan's actions made for a ton of Twitter fun, but he could also be facing some legal trouble.

Buchanan's field run was planned, and he didn't try to hide it on his Twitter account. In fact, one of his friends announced in a Tweet right before 5 p.m. that Buchanan was indeed going to make his run - after the first out of the eighth inning, so everyone knew when to watch.

At 8:53 p.m., Buchanan tweeted "Here goes nothing," and was off. His run was captured on video by two camera phones that were later posted onto social media - one by Buchanan himself.

The other video was from a fan in the stands, and it showed Buchanan leap over the left field stands and dash across the outfield. He appeared to stop for a second to greet Reds outfielder Billy Hamilton. In Buchanan's video, one can hear him say "What's up dog" to Hamilton; Buchanan later admitted to Cincinnati television station WCPO that Hamilton's response was "not the nicest."

Two policemen chased Buchanan, but he was able to climb over the center field wall and run out of the stadium. All the

while, the crowd was cheering, and a reporter from another Cincinnati TV station tweeted that the umpire was trying not to laugh at the situation.

Buchanan eventually found his way back to Noblesville - he didn't run, he was driven home - and seemed to bask in his newfound social media fame.

However, there is a serious side to Buchanan's field run. WCPO talked with Cincinnati Police Sgt. Greg Lewton, who is in charge of the Reds' security detail, and he said that Buchanan's run is a first-degree misdemeanor. In fact, Buchanan was charged with criminal trespassing, which is punishable by up to 180 days in jail and/or a \$1,000 fine.

For his part, Buchanan is owning up to what happened. He and his mother spoke with Sgt. Lewton, who said that the Cincinnati Police's investigator had "a really good conversation" with them. On Thursday, Buchanan traveled back to Cincinnati to turn himself in to police.

Sgt. Lewton told WCPO that his department doesn't want to spend too much time on the case, noting that Buchanan "seemed to have learned his lesson," according to the TV station's report. At the same time, a GoFundMe site has been set up to help Buchanan pay for his legal fees in the case. As of a few minutes after midnight Saturday morning, it has raised \$265; the site said that any extra money raised after the legal fees have been paid will go to charity.

Fishers Firefighters responded to a report of a garage fire on Creekview Lane around 11 p.m. Thursday evening.



Japanese wrestlers come to Carmel

Summers for the Carmel USA Wrestling Club have had an international flavor recently.

This summer alone, the Carmel Club has hosted two teams from different sides of Asia. In June, the CUSAWC welcomed a team from Turkey, and this past week, the club hosted a team from Gunma Prefecture in Japan. Prefectures are equivalent to states in the USA; Gunma is located in the central part of Japan.

The Japanese wrestlers, along with their coach, Shinji Morise, and an interpreter, arrived in Indiana at 5:45 a.m. Tuesday. Carmel coach Ed Podoski noted that the travel time was rather long: The wrestlers flew 10 hours to get from Japan to Los Angeles, then another four hours to make it to Indiana. Some of the Carmel wrestlers traveled to Japan last summer as part of the Indiana State Wrestling Association's Cultural Exchange, so they were aware how involved the travel is.

"We had today scheduled kind of free, because we knew going there, you're pretty tired after traveling for 20 hours," said Podoski.

But the Japanese wrestlers said they weren't tired.

"And so we went shopping, and then we went and had a pool party, and all the Japanese kids fell asleep at the pool," said Podoski.

Everyone was awake by the evening, and the Japanese wrestlers joined their Carmel counterparts for a practice at Carmel High School. Podoski conducted the class, while Morise observed and videotaped.

"I will distribute to their parents, because they don't know what's going on," said Morise through an interpreter. "And then we can show them how we practice in Indiana."

Morise said that participating in the Cultural Exchange is "a valuable experience," and that students will "learn a lot from this, and utilize the experience for their future." The students get a chance to sightsee around Carmel and the Indianapolis area, participate in a competition at Zionsville Community High School, and also stay at a host family's house during the week. Morise said that since they are houseguests, they must learn to communicate in English.

"In Japan, there's not a lot of opportunity to communicate in English," said Morise.

One of the Japanese wrestlers, Haruki Kanai, said that he enjoyed fishing during his first day in Indiana. After the Tuesday practice, he said he noticed that the wres-

ting techniques of the U.S. and Japan are different.

"It was a good learning experience for me," said Kanai.

Podoski believes his wrestlers are getting much out of the experience as well.

"This is an amazing learning experience, and I think in the last three years, I think this is the fourth cultural team that we've hosted, and we've traveled once," said Podoski. "The benefits of wrestling are good, but there are things that the kids will remember forever."

Busy with baseball and softball...

More than 260 teams at Grand Park this weekend

Grand Park's busiest baseball/softball week is finishing up this weekend with more than 260 teams playing at the park for the National Softball Association (NSA) "B" World Series Tournament, Baseball Youth All American Tournament, Baseball Youth National Championships and Bullpen 2017s/2018s Invite Only Tournament.

The NSA "B" World Series began earlier this week throughout Hamilton County with 265 teams ages 8U-18U from the NSA Northern Zone. Grand Park and Monon Trail Elementary are hosting 40 teams age 14U for the National Softball Association (NSA) "B" World Series. The Baseball Youth All American Tournament took place

earlier this week with 120 teams and the Baseball Youth National Championships continues through Sunday, featuring 130 teams ages 7U-14U from across the United States.

"We've already hosted more teams at Grand Park than in our entire first year of operation," said Westfield Mayor Andy Cook. "These types of large-scale tournament events are what drive the economic impact of Grand Park."

This weekend's field sports activities include 146 teams for soccer and lacrosse events. The 3v3 LIVE Summer Soccer Tour features over 80 teams ages 6 to adult. It is a qualifying event for the Disney 3v3 Soccer Champion-

ships event to be held in January 2016. Also taking place this weekend are the Midwest Lacrosse Challenge, which includes 22 teams and the NSCAA High School Summer Showcase event, which features 44 boys and girls teams from four states: Indiana, Ohio, Mississippi and Maryland. More than 2,500 spectators are expected to attend.

Hamlin posted the day's quickest speed during the first of three Sprint Cup practice sessions today at IMS in preparation for the 22nd annual Crown Royal Presents the Jeff Kyle 400 at the Brickyard on Sunday.

Six-time NASCAR Sprint Cup champion and four-time Crown Royal 400 at the Brickyard winner Jimmie Johnson turned the third-fastest lap at 181.796 mph during the first practice session, in his No. 48 Kobalt Tools Chevrolet.

The second-fastest time of the day came from 2004 NASCAR Sprint Cup champion and 2014 Indianapolis 500 Sunoco Rookie of the Year Kurt Busch in the third practice

Dale Earnhardt Jr. drove his No. 88 Nationwide Chevrolet to the fastest speed of the second practice session with a lap of 181.466 mph, and five-time Crown Royal 400 at the Brickyard winner Jeff Gordon posted his fastest speed of the day of 181.444 mph in his No. 24 3M Chevrolet during the first practice session.

2013 Lilly Diabetes 250 winner Kyle Busch was fastest overall after two NASCAR XFINITY Series practice sessions with a top lap speed of 178.717 mph in the No. 54 Monster Energy Toyota. Posting the second-fastest speed of 177.845 mph was 2011 Crown Royal 400 at the Brickyard winner Paul Menard in the No. 33 Richmond/Menards Chevrolet. Daniel Suarez produced the third-fastest speed, 176.810 mph in the No. 18 ARRIS Toyota.

NASCAR action at IMS will resume on Saturday with XFINITY Series qualifying beginning at 11:35 a.m., and Sprint Cup qualifying at 1:45 p.m. for the Crown Royal Presents the Jeff Kyle 400 at the Brickyard taking place at 3:30 p.m. on Sunday.
