"Donations to ReStore provide a number of positive impacts to our community," said David Hazel, associate director of ReStore for Greater Indy Habitat for Humanity. "Useable materials and goods avoid the landfill and demand for new products is reduced. ReStore provides low-cost solutions for people in need of materials to repair or improve their home. Finally, all of the proceeds of ReStore support Habitat's mission of eliminating poverty housing in Greater Indy."

In 2015, the three Greater Indy ReStores served more than 50,000 customers, completed 4,187 donation pickups, and helped an estimated 1,000 tons of material avoid the landfill.

ReStore is a home improvement thrift store that sells donated new and gently used merchandise at a significant discount to the general public. All proceeds benefit Greater Indy Habitat for Humanity.

Blue Horseshoe breaks ground on new building

It's a little area in Carmel, just north of the Renaissance Inn right now, but the plot of land at 11939 N. Meridian St. will soon hold a brand new building.

Blue Horseshoe, a software consulting company, broke ground on the building Wednesday afternoon. Rain forced most of the ceremony to take place under tents, but it couldn't dampen spirits.

Chris Cason is the co-founder of Blue Horseshoe and has served as its president since the beginning in 2001. The company has its current office just down the road at 116th and Meridian streets, but its growth necessitates a new building.

"We ran out of space within the building that we're in," said Cason. "We had done four expansions there since we had started. We are right now falling on each other, we're overloaded with people."

The new building will not only allow the current Blue Horseshoe employees to have a more comfortable workspace, it will let the company hire new employees as well. A building fact sheet said that "Blue Horseshoe will also

Food First to be shown at 10 West on June 16

As part of the Nickel Plate Arts Festival of events, Hannah Lindgren (owner of Deliberate Media in downtown Noblesville) will be screening "Food First" at 10 West in Cicero on June 16.

This event is a fundraiser for Nickel Plate Arts. "Food First" looks at how local food and other food-related movements are impacting Indianapolis, Indiana. The film is 70 minutes long and following the screening, we will have a panel discussion with local experts on the themes discussed in the film.

Two years in the making, *Food First* features more than 17 regional food experts and tells the story through local organizations that serve as change agents.

"While not a comprehensive list of all the exciting things taking place in the region's food movement, 'Food First' looks at the big picture and is meant to serve as a springboard for how to take it to the next level," said Lindgren, who directed the film.

The documentary and postscreening discussions will include topics such as the evolution of the local foods movement, the economics of agriculture, food production, infrastructure, education, access to and distribution of quality foods to all socio-economic levels.

"The scope of this film – like the topic – evolved dramatically during its production," said Lindgren. "We thought carefully how to communicate the many complex layers of the movement and kept adding interviews, viewpoints and topics."

With hundreds of hours of filming completed, Deliberate Media – Lindgren's company and the film's producer – finally decided to call it a wrap and release the film as a way of sparking ongoing discussions.

"The film is decidedly biased toward growing the movement," said Lindgren. "But I do think it clearly spells out what the challenges are and how complex the issues can be."

create 70 new jobs by 2020 with an average salary of \$83,000."

"We hire a lot of kids off campuses, so we have probably 10 people starting this July that need somewhere to sit," said Cason. The company plans to have construction complete on the new building by the first of the year.

Blue Horseshoe will co-own the building with Wagner Reese, a Carmel-based law firm and Citimark, a real estate investment and construction company. Blue Horseshoe plans to occupy the third floor and half of the second floor, with Wagner Reese on the first floor. The remaining office space will be available for lease by other interested tenants.

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INDOT accepting applications for local road and bridge matching grant funds

The Indiana Department of Transportation announced today that the agency is accepting applications from cities, towns, and counties across Indiana for matching funds for local road and bridge projects through Community Crossings, the State's local road and bridge matching grant fund.

On March 23, 2016, Governor Mike Pence signed HEA1001 which created the local road and bridge matching grant program. HEA 1001 provides \$186 million in state reserves for local road and bridge funding over the next two years, and provides \$277 million over the next four years by redirecting an additional 1 and 1/2 pennies of the gasoline use tax to local roads to be phased in over two years; \$100 million in funding will be available each year going forward providing long-term road funding for locals.

Projects that are eligible for funding through Community Crossings include road resurfacing, bridge rehabilitation, road reconstruction, roundabouts, and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliance in connection with road projects. Material costs for chip sealing and

crack filling operations are also eligible for funds.

Projects submitted to INDOT for funding will be evaluated based on need, traffic volume, local support, the impact on connectivity and mobility within the community, and regional economic significance.

Community Crossings is open to all local government units in the State of Indiana. Cities, towns, and counties awarded grants will receive funding based on a 50/50 match. For example, a county that is awarded a grant for a roundabout project that is estimated to cost \$1 million would receive \$500,000 in funding from the State with the County providing the other \$500,000.

All application materials must be submitted via email to LPA_MPO@indot.in.gov by Friday, July 15, 2016 at 5 p.m. ET. Communities selected to receive funding for projects will be notified by INDOT in early August 2016.

at noon at Founders Park, 11675 Hazel Dell Parkway. It will be a kid-friendly event with snacks and activities. The event will be hosted by Members of Moms Demand Action Carmel, and a gun violence survivor speaker.

"I never dreamed something my friends and I came up with would inspire and empower so many people all over the country to get involved in ending gun violence," said Nza-Ari Khepra, founder of Project Orange Tree and co-creator of WearOrange. "Seeing the movement grow in states across the country and learning about all of the activity happening on June 2 this year brings me hope that we are making real progress to end gun violence."

Wear Orange was inspired by friends of Hadiya Pendleton, a 15-year-old Chicago high school student killed by gunfire, who decided to honor her life by wearing orange – the color hunters wear in the woods to protect themselves and others. On June 2, 2015, what would have been Hadiya's 18th birthday, more than 200 organizations and influencers asked people nationwide to join them by wearing orange to honor her life, the lives of the more than 90 Americans killed by

gun violence and the hundreds more who are injured every day. President Obama, Julianne Moore, Russell Simmons, Sarah Silverman, the New York Mets, MTV, Cosmopolitan, Motown Records, Michael J. Fox, Questlove and Katie Couric are just a few of those who answered the call last year, helping the #WearOrange message reach more than 220 million people in a

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


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State track and field meets...

County teams will again be factors

The IHSAA's annual state track and field meets are this weekend at Indiana University, and Hamilton County teams will once again be major factors.

The girls meet is Friday, with athletes from seven county schools all having the potential to earn a state medal. The boys meet takes place on Saturday, with defending state champion Carmel in a good position to win a second state crown in a row.

GIRLS MEET

There is strength in numbers, especially if a team has high numbers of runners in its strength.

If the team is Carmel, then its strength is in distance. The Greyhounds will send three runners to Bloomington in the 3200 run; all of them advanced via the three participant standard. Normally a school can enter just two in each individual event, but if a third athlete has produced a time/distance that meets or beats the standard, she or he is allowed a spot in the post-season.

The three runners are Christina Geisler, Sarah Leinheiser and Stacy Morozov. The trio earned 1-2-3 finished in both the Guerin Catholic sectional and the Lafayette Jeff regional. Geisler is seeded first at state due to her regional time of 10:43.90, with Leinheiser third (10:47.25) and Morozov fourth (10:47.83). If those three can run at their seeds, or even better, that could be enough to land Carmel a very high finish in the team standings.

Meanwhile, Fishers has enough firepower to get a Top 10 finish at state. The Tigers will be led by their relays, with the 4x400 seeded third, the 4x100 rated fourth and the 4x800 seeded sixth. Paris Carver is seeded fifth in the 200 dash for the Tigers.

Westfield will likely make some noise in the distance events, as the Shamrocks' 4x800 team is seeded first with a regional time of 9:21.03. Devon Leahy also has the county's highest seed in the 800 run, at third. Meanwhile, Westfield's 4x100 relay is rated 11th, just close enough to possibly get in the top nine and get a point or two.

Hamilton Southeastern's highest seed is third in the 4x100. Camille Christopher is rated sixth in the 100 dash and 10th in the 200 dash, so two individual medals for the sophomore are a possibility. Look out for Tierra Sydnor in the 400 dash; she has been improving as the tournament goes along.

Noblesville's young brigade of runners has an excellent chance to earn some medals. The Millers' 4x800 relay team has the highest seed at fourth. Freshman Shelby Tyler holds the seventh seed in the high jump, classmate Maria Anderson is rated eighth in the 400 dash, and sophomore Abi Little is seeded ninth in the 1600 run. All are capable of performing better than their seeds.

Guerin Catholic's Megan Slamkowski is rated sixth in the 800 run and has an excellent chance of earning a medal there. Sheridan's Brittany Welch is seeded 11th in the long jump after her performance of 18 feet, one-quarter inch at regionals. Another good jump could get her on the medals podium.

The clear favorite for the team title is Warren Central, which has the top two seeds in the 200 dash: Bryeana Birdsong and Mikeisha Covington. The Warriors also used the three participant standard to get three runners down to IU in the 100 dash. Byrdson is rated second, Ashley Baker fourth and Covington ninth. Warren also has the top seed in the 100 hurdles in Kayland Jackson, as well as in the 4x100 relay.

BOYS MEET

Carmel's boys team has everything it needs to defend its state championship. The Greyhounds have a superstar distance runner in Ben Veatch, plus enough depth in other events to get the necessary team points.

Ben Veatch is the top seed in the 1600 and 3200 runs, and is the clear favorite to win both events. Veatch's 3200 regional time of 9:05.40 is almost 10 seconds ahead of the second seed. The Carmel senior will have tough competition in the 1600 from Southeastern's Gabe Fendel, the second

seed. Veatch's 1600 seed time is 4:08.96, and Fendel's is 4:10.22.

The Greyhounds also hold the top seed in the 4x400 relay, the fourth seed in the 4x100 and the fifth seed in the 4x800, all of which will help immeasurably in their team title quest. Also, look out for Carmel's pole vaulter twins, Mitch and Ryan Lipe. Ryan is seeded eighth with a regional vault of 14-6, but he won the sectional with an effort of 16-5. Mitch is seeded sixth at 15 feet even.

So who is the top seed in the pole vault? That would be Southeastern's Ethan Bray, who leaped 16 feet, 6 inches to win the regional. He and Fendel are the Royals' highest seeds, but also watch out for Ben Wagoner, seeded sixth in the 3200, and HSE football star Aaron Matio, rated ninth in the 100 dash.

Hamilton Heights' Michael DeFoe has an excellent chance of not just medaling in his two events, but of winning. DeFoe is seeded second in the 200 dash with a time of 21.89, but that's just .02 second behind the top seed, Portage's Jeremiah Ratliff. DeFoe is also seeded third in the 110 hurdles.

Westfield's highest seeds are the 4x800 relay, which is rated second, and Alec Hartman, who is seeded fifth in the 800 dash.

Fishers' Noah Rogers is participating in two events, the high jump (where he is seeded 13th) and the long jump (in which he is the 17th seed). In both events, he is close enough where a solid effort will earn him a medal.

Noblesville's 4x800 team is rated 12th, but only 2.10 seconds away from the ninth seed. The Millers are very capable of moving into medal territory in that event.

State's best set to converge at IU

The state's best in high school track and field converge in Bloomington this weekend as the IHSAA conducts the 43rd Girls State Finals on Friday and the 113th Boys State Finals on Saturday. Both meets will be contested at the Robert C. Haugh Track and Field Complex on the campus of Indiana University with field events beginning at 3 pm ET and running events at 4:15 pm ET.

The boys meet, the oldest event in any sport sponsored by the IHSAA, features six defending state champions in various events while the girls meet has two individuals that won four events between them.

Lynna Irby continues her charge through the record books. The Pike junior swept the 100, 200 and 400 races for the second straight season last year and would join North Central's Maicel Malone as the only sprinters to sweep all three for a third straight year if she pulls it off again Friday night. Irby

broke Malone's 100 meters state record time last year in 11.50 and is the top seed in the 100 and 400 this year and third in the 200. She is also expected to anchor the Red Devils' second-seeded 1600 meter relay team. Only one other individual - LaShanda Harper of Harding - has won four events in the

same year. And Harper did it twice winning the 100, 200, Long Jump and 400 relay in 1995 and 1996, the first two years an athlete could enter four events.

Victoria Farley of Portage is the other defending champ having won the shot put a year ago. Her throw of 45- 6.5 at last Tuesday's regional has her seeded second this weekend.

Last fall's girls cross country champion, Sarah Leinheiser, is the third seeded runner (10:47.25) in the 3200 meter race and is part of a stacked Carmel front that features three of the top four seeded runners led by classmate Christina Geisler (10:43.90).

On the boys side, the Greyhounds have two top-seeded individuals who are also defending champs.

Ben Veatch won the 3200 race a year ago and is nearly 10 seconds faster (9:05.40) than the next competitor in this year's field. Veatch also won the cross country state title the last two seasons.

Junior teammate Jalen Walker is the defending champ in the 300 Hurdles and enters Saturday with the third-fastest time of 38.51.

Bluffton's D'Wayne Eskridge is the defending winner in the 200 meters where he is seeded fourth (22.05) this time around. The senior is also seeded fourth (10.85) in the 100 meters and second (23- 7.75) in the long jump. After some research, only one individual in the 112 previous state finals has won those three events in the same year - Noblesville's Paul Walton in 1913 won the 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash and the long jump when the meet was held at Earlham College in Richmond.

Other individuals back to defend their titles include: Brownsburg senior Hari Sathyamurthy seeded second (1:52.65) in the 800 meters, Center Grove senior Cameron Tidd who is sixth (172- 9) in the discus, and Ben Davis

senior Christian Powell who is fourth (22- 11) in the long jump.

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

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Strong second half gives Indy Eleven win

Indy Eleven used goals by Omar Gordon and Eamon Zayed 10 minutes apart in the second half to post a 2-1 win over USL squad Louisville City FC in the Third Round of the 103rd edition Lamar Hunt U.S. Open Cup at IUPUI's Carroll Stadium.

The win for Indy Eleven, which avenged a loss to the same LCFC side in the same round one year ago and kept the NASL squad undefeated through nine games in 2016, advances the "Boys in Blue" to a Fourth Round contest at Major League Soccer's Chicago Fire SC in two weeks' time. Kickoff at Toyota Park in suburban Bridgeview, Ill., on Wednesday, June 15, is set for 8:30 p.m.

The opening 20 minutes would see neither team seriously threaten goal, al-

though Louisville's Greg Ranjitsingh was the more active of the goalkeepers in clearing his penalty area of crosses sent in. The lack of a clearance in Indy Eleven's back third would lead to Louisville City's opener in the 21st minute, as a pair of defenders couldn't decide who would go after George Davis IV's spinning through ball near the arc. The rolling ball would finally be run onto by Chandler Hoffman, who beat Indy 'keeper Keith Cardona from 12 yards out to give the visitors the early 1-0 advantage.

An infraction called on Indy Eleven defender Cory Miller's sliding challenge against Hoffman on the endline caused some confusion amongst both teams around the half hour mark, as referee Brandon Artis looked to initially signal a penalty kick, only to change his decision to an indirect free kick a few yards inside the area. Louisville's ensuing free kick to the six did create a shot, but it couldn't make its way through heavy traffic near the Indy Eleven goalline, the chance eventually dying on a LCFC foul seconds later.

Indy Eleven's best look of the opening half came in the 43rd minute when Marco Franco's wall pass with Don Smart freed the Indy right back into the area. Franco's bouncing square ball missed its intended target of Gordon, but Duke Lacroix did get on the end of it, only to find his shot from 15 yards deflected out for a corner.

An increasingly physical game saw another appeal for a penalty for LCFC, this time in the 56th minute when Davis IV went down under the challenge of Omar Gordon in the top of the area, but Artis adjudged it to be a fair shoulder and play went on. Two minutes later it was Gordon equalizing for Indy, as he collected a failed clearance 20 yards out, took a touch inside into space and fired low and past Ranjitsingh to level things at 1-1.

Just a couple minutes later Louisville had a great chance to go right back ahead, but Davis IV's free kick from 22 yards out flashed just wide of the near left post. On the other Indy midfielder Dylan Mares was slipped into the top of the area on a nice 1-2, but a sliding tackle by Ben Newnam stopped him from an open look on frame. Those opportunities marked an entertaining 10-minute period of end-to-end chances, setting the pace for a frantic finish.

Hoffman nearly doubled his account in the 67th minute when substitute midfielder Ilija Ilic slipped him through the central defense, only to see his shot from 20 yards skip off the top of the crossbar. It was another second half substitute that would give Indy the lead a minute later, as Zayed finished off a well-worked break orchestrated by Mares and Lacroix, the latter supplying the final cross for an easy redirect from six yards out.

A bungled clearance by Indy Eleven in the 88th minute nearly saw Hoffman equalize, but Cardona was alert off his line, diving in to take the ball off the charging attacker's feet 10 yards from his line. A 22-yard free kick that sailed on Hoffman at the onset of four minutes of stoppage time would mark the last chance of any quality for LCFC to even up in the dying moments of the match.

The undefeated Indy Eleven (3W-5D-0L, 14 pts., 2nd in NASL) will return its focus to league play and renew its chase for the NASL's Spring Season title this Saturday, June 4, with its second visit in as many weekends to the Sunshine State, this time to take on The Miami FC. Kickoff from FIU Stadium in Miami is set for 8:00 p.m. ET, and the match can be seen live in Central Indiana on WISH-TV and across the nation online via ESPN3.



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
