She also provides panelists with important updates in child welfare."

Incredibly, Edith's gifts of time and talent extend beyond her volunteer work with FFCR. Edith has also spent the last eight years helping homeless women through the <u>Camillus House Women's Shower Program</u>. She dedicates three days a week to providing hot showers, clean towels, freshly laundered clothing and toiletries to women who live on the streets of Miami-Dade.
