## **Integrity of Creation**

### Laudato Si' Reflection - Mercy

Pope Francis says that the call of Jesus pushes each of us to never stop at the surface of things, especially when we are dealing with a person. We are called to look beyond, to focus on the heart to see of how much generosity everyone is capable. In this Holy Year of

Mercy, "we need to strengthen the conviction that we are one single human family. There are no frontiers or barriers, political or social, behind which we can hide, still less is there room for the globalization of indifference." (*Laudato Si' 52*)

## Historic Agreement - UN Climate Conference in Paris (Margaret Swedish)

Last month's historic UN Climate Conference agreement was significant for acknowledging the urgency of action, and for getting governments to commit for the first time to clear ceilings for global temperature rise (2 degrees Celsius, with 1.5C as an

"aspiration"). However, it fell short of setting binding, enforceable limits on carbon emissions, gives no clear direction for how to reduce emissions (e.g., words like "fossil fuels," "oil," "coal," are never used), and leaves each country to decide on its own how to do its voluntary part. So we can applaud the progress, and use

it as leverage, while still noting that it is not enough. Overview of agreement.

# National Migration Week - January 3-9

In the Gospel of Matthew (25:35), Jesus tells his disciples, "I was a stranger and you welcomed me." That call to welcome the stranger challenges us as Christians today as the world faces a crisis in meeting the needs of millions of migrants forced to flee their homelands. The U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops offer some insight about the European refugee crisis, a bilingual prayer card, and a sample prayer service that can be adjusted to fit your needs.

We need to respond in some way. How can we, how will we offer welcome and support to these strangers among us? Consider reflecting on Pope Francis' message for the World Day of Migrants and Refugees (1/16), the LCWR statement on Welcoming Syrian Refugees, and the SSND CP

Province statement <u>In Solidarity with Syrian Refugees</u>. Consider <u>contacting your elected officials</u> about not turning our backs on Syrian and other vulnerable refugees. Even if they have already done so – repeated messaging is important and effective!

## **State and Local Immigration Policies**

Civic engagement by immigrants and their allies has been effective in moving inclusive state and local policies and in defeating virtually all of the significant anti-immigrant proposals filed in state legislatures during the past two years, according to a new report by the National Immigration Law Center. The report Immigrant-inclusive State and Local Policies Move Ahead in 2014-15 demonstrates that the groundwork built by immigrants' rights groups has helped preserve, implement, and gain new ground for inclusive state and local immigration policies.

Human Trafficking Awareness Month Human Trafficking is a form of modern slavery where people profit from the control and exploitation of others. There

are 27 million slaves today which is more than in any other time in our history. High profits and low risks motivate traffickers to lure and ensnare people into forced

labor and sex trafficking by manipulating and exploiting their vulnerabilities. It is easy to be unaware of the <u>victims</u> in our midst. Check out this <u>animated documentary</u>. # Slavery in the Seafood Industry

Burmese men, women, and children are being sold to factories in Thailand and forced to peel shrimp that ends up in products sold by many U.S. retailers, restaurants, and pet stores. The Associated Press has released an exposé on the use of slave labor by Thai

shrimp peeling factories. It turns out almost half of shrimp exports from Thailand are shipped to the U.S. to places such as Krogers, Wal Mart, Whole Foods, Dollar General, Petco, Olive Garden, and Red Lobster.

#### No One Left to Speak

January 14 is the anniversary of the birth of Martin Niemoller, German theologian and Lutheran pastor, an outspoken foe of Adolf Hitler and critic of so many German leaders complicit by their silence in the Nazi imprisonment, persecution and murder of millions of people. His quotation, First they came for the Socialists, has been edited often to include more recent examples of persecution of African Americans, Muslims, and immigrants, but the core message is still relevant. We must be willing to stand up for anyone whose basic human rights are being denied.

### Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr – January 18

A champion for civil rights and human dignity, Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was instrumental in securing the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965. Awarded with the Nobel Prize for Peace for his work, Dr. King is one of only three people who have a U.S. national holiday

in their honor. During Pope Francis' <u>address to the U.S. Congress</u>, the Pope highlighted Dr. King as one of the four Americans of good will who shaped fundamental values that will endure forever in the spirit of the American people. <u>Reflection resources</u>.
