Record Heat in 2015

Global climate scientists have reported that 2015 was the hottest year in the historical record by far, breaking a mark set only the year before. While an historic El Niño weather pattern played a role, the bulk of the record-setting heat was a consequence of the long-term planetary warming caused by human emissions of greenhouse gases. Enlisting Religious Groups to Fight Food Waste

The Environmental Protection Agency recently launched the Food Steward's Pledge, an initiative to engage religious groups of all faiths to help redirect the food that ends up in landfills to hungry mouths. It's one piece of the agency's larger plan to reduce food waste by 50 percent by 2030. Food waste is reportedly the single

biggest material in U.S. landfills. As food waste decomposes, it releases methane, a powerful greenhouse gas with 25 times the global warming potential of carbon pollution. 
International Day of Prayer and Awareness Against **Human Trafficking**

Global Migrant & Refugee Crisis

We are currently witnessing the largest and most rapid escalation ever in the number of people being forced from their homes. Millions of people are fleeing conflict in Syria, Iraq, Afghanistan and Ukraine, as well as persecution in areas of Southeast Asia and Sub-Saharan Africa, creating the highest level of displacement since World War II. Undocumented Population Declines

In this new report, the Center for Migration Studies of New York (CMS) finds that the U.S. undocumented population has fallen below 11 million for the first time since 2004. The report also offers evidence that the Mexican-born undocumented population continues to decline, falling by more than 600,000 since 2010. The paper further describes trends in the undocumented population over the past few years for selected countries of origin and states of residence.

HRW - World Report 2016

In their 2016 report, Human Rights Watch (HRW) reviews human rights practices in more than 90 countries highlighting how the 'politics of fear'

threatens the rights of all. In his introductory essay, Executive Director Kenneth Roth writes that the spread of terrorist attacks and the huge flows of refugees spawned by repression and conflict led many governments to curtail rights in misguided efforts to protect their security. "The wisdom enshrined in international human rights law provides indispensable guidance to

governments that seek to keep their nation safe and serve their people most effectively," Roth said. "We abandon it at our peril." <u>Learn more</u>.

Peace and Non-Violence

Educating Children in Conflict Zones

Nearly 24 million children living in crisis zones are out of school, according to UNICEF. South Sudan is home to the highest proportion of out of school children with over half (51%) of primary and lower secondary age children not accessing an education. Education continues to be one of the least funded sectors in humanitarian appeals. UNICEF warns that unless the provision of education in emergencies is prioritized, the development of these children and their countries will be severely stunted. Learn more. World Day of Social Justice – February 20

Through the World Day of Social Justice, the UN promotes poverty eradication, full and productive employment, and social integration. Access to safe, productive, and fairly compensated work is a basic human right. Yet it is estimated that three quarters of workers are employed in jobs that do not provide livable wages or income security. In addition,

unemployment numbers are projected to increase globally in the next two years. The UN has identified the creation of quality jobs as one of its Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Consider this SSND Solidarity Prayer Reflection on sustainable development and the SDGs.
