Seeking to build upon the progress made through global efforts to achieve the Millennium Development Goals, world leaders have committed to a new set of global goals designed to achieve three extraordinary things – end extreme poverty, address inequality & injustice, and repair & protect the environment – all by 2030. The new targets, known as the seventeen Sustainable Development Goals, were formally adopted by the UN on Friday. Never before have world leaders

Canada: Faith Communities Speak Out on Climate Change, Poverty, and Indigenous Rights

Canada's faith communities issued a joint statement this week on Climate Change, Poverty, and Indigenous Rights – In our day, the causes and effects of global climate change are becoming more and more visible. (1) We still see and experience widespread poverty despite the abundant production of food and availability of the basic necessities of life in Canada. (2) Today we understand these twin challenges are linked by a spiritual, moral, and ethical human crisis that can be expressed in this question: How will Canadians act as a good neighbour in both the

natural and human communities since in the long run the health of one depends on the health of the other? (3) Read/reflect on full statement.

World Habitat Day - October 5

The United Nations, in designating the first Monday of October every year as World Habitat Day, invites us to reflect on the state of our towns

and cities and on the basic right of all to adequate shelter. Given this year's theme of *Public Spaces for All*, perhaps a greater focus should be put on the refugee crisis facing the world and how we as countries and communities are willing and able to provide a welcoming "space for all". Pope Francis reminds us that others can "no longer be seen as strangers, but as part of a "we" which all of us are working to create." *Laudato Si' 151*

Refugee Crisis

We are mindful of the ongoing refugee crisis in Europe as so many of our brothers and sisters flee violent conflict and persecution in Syria, Iraq and other places. As we reflect upon the Pope's historic visit to the U.S., we are spurred on by his message to be "neighbors' of the smallest and most abandoned." Follow Pope Francis' call and do what you can to be a 'neighbor' for Syrian refugees by starting with prayer. Conflict Drives 13 Million Children Out of School

Surging conflict and political upheaval across the Middle East and North Africa are preventing more than 13 million

children from going to school, according to a UNICEF report released September 3. The report, *Education Under Fire*, focuses on the impact of violence on schoolchildren and education systems in nine countries that have been directly or indirectly impacted by violence. Attacks on schools and education infrastructure – sometimes deliberate – are one key reason why many children do not attend classes. <u>Learn more</u>.

World Teachers' Day - October 5

Teachers are fundamental to achieving community education goals, yet they continue to face challenges brought about by staff shortages, poor training, and low status. The UNESCO Institute for Statistics estimates that to achieve the goal of universal primary education countries will need to recruit a total of 12.6 million

New Report Highlights Abuse of Migrants by Border Patrol

Over several months in early 2015 the Kino Border Initiative and Jesuits of the USA and Canada undertook an investigation of migrants regarding how they were treated by USA customs when apprehended at the border. A third of surveyed migrants reported having been victimized by U.S. Border Patrol. The report also found that current Border Patrol practices have led to the systematic separation of family groups apprehended while traveling north together, with 64.6% of migrants who traveled with immediate family members reporting having been separated from these family members. Respect Life - "Every Life is Worth Living"

October 4 is Respect Life Sunday, a day when the focus often centers almost exclusively on opposition to abortion. But respect for life has much broader dimensions. This day is also the feast of St. Francis of Assisi, whose love of the poor and of all creation was expressed in word and action. Pope Francis reminds us that "human life is grounded in three fundamental and closely intertwined relationships: with God, with our neighbor and with the earth itself" and "every act of cruelty toward any creature is contrary to human dignity". International Day of the Girl Child - October 11

First observed in 2012, the International Day of the Girl Child was established for promoting the rights of girls and addressing the <u>unique challenges they face</u>. It's a day when groups come together under the same goal to highlight, discuss, and take action to advance rights and opportunities for girls everywhere. <u>Learn more</u>, explore ways to get involved, take action, offer a prayer.

Last week, Pope Francis spoke to Congress about poverty: "The fight against poverty and hunger must be fought constantly and on many fronts, especially in its causes." This date was chosen because it is the birthday of Mohandas Gandhi, a pioneer of the philosophy and strategy of non-violence. The day represents an occasion to disseminate the message of non-violence and the desire to create a culture of peace, tolerance, and understanding. Quoting Gandhi, "Non-violence is the greatest force at the disposal of mankind. It is mightier than the mightiest weapon of destruction devised by the ingenuity of man." Foundation Day - SSND and the UN

Each year, October 24 brings to mind Foundation Day for SSNDs (1833) and the UN (1945). Since our beginnings SSNDs have been challenged by social and economic crisis of our times. *You Are Sent* reminds us (C26) to "recognize our obligation and opportunities to develop a world vision and a sense of global responsibility." UN Secretary- General Ban Ki-moon has said "At this critical moment, let us
