Divrei Torah by Eighth Graders for Parshas Bamidbar and Shavuot

"... שאו את ראש כל עדת בני ישראל..." (א:ב) Lift the heads of *Bnei Yisrael*

In this week's parsha, Hashem is telling Moshe to count the heads of Bnei Yisrael, and to do so in a very specific way. Hashem was teaching us not only a way to count, but a way of life! Counting can be used in a good way, to make others feel that they matter and that they're worth something, or in a derogatory way, making them feel small and unimportant. Here we are taught an extremely important lesson which we can apply to our day-to-day life. We should try to make others feel important and cared about, and we should put every effort into doing things that bring happiness and comfort to the world.

This was and is especially significant in our lives, especially in the past seven weeks. During the Omer, we particularly focus on בין אדם לחברוש because Rabbi Akiva's students were not respectful to each other, resulting in their deaths. Now that we are in the שלשת ימי הגבלה , or even into שבועות , we still need to keep that in mind as a part of our obligation to Hashem and each other. (inspired by the Artscroll Chumash)

Rav Simcha Bunim says that immediately after *Hashem* gave over the Ten Commandments, He had *Moshe* tell everyone to go home. *Hashem* wanted everyone to go home so that they could begin using the *Torah* in their homes.

The *Torah* was not given to us to only use in *shul*; rather, we should bring it into our lives and use it every day. Once, one of Rav Gifter's students asked him how he was able to retain *Torah* so well even though he learned it many years ago. Rav Gifter answered that, when he sailed from Europe to America right before World War II, he was running low on food and all he had left were a few drops of whiskey and a few crumbs of bread. Every time he took a sip or ate a crumb, he savored it, not knowing when he would get more. So, too, we should savor every bit

of Torah we learn so it lasts us a lifetime.

We are finishing part 4 of our Neta book. As chapter 18 introduced vocabulary about clothes, we talked about different types and styles of clothing and the girls' preferences. We discussed historical clothing styles and different kinds of people according to their clothes. Chapter 19 developed our understanding of past tense verbs. The girls drew on this to speak about their families, where they came from, and their family history. We also conversed about youth movements in Israel. Now, we are learning about the future tense and the girls' short-term and long-term plans. It was great to get to know the girls, to learn about their families, and delightful to hear about their clothing preferences. I wish them בהצלחה in the future. Guest Speakers

Power. Peace. Purpose: three key elements Rabbi Elimelech Goldberg shared with our middle school students. In separate sessions, Rabbi Goldberg, founder of Kids Kicking Cancer, explained the **power** of being connected to a tremendous source, *Hakadosh Borachu*, and that one's *neshama* makes one powerful. Through prayer and connection, one can channel strength from G-d. Rabbi Goldberg compared the two Hebrew words for soul, *neshama*, and for breath, *neshima*. He taught the children the power of breathing to relieve pain, stress, anger, indeed any challenge, based on his martial arts background. He instructed the students, "Breathe in and then, when you don't think you have room for any more air, breathe in a little bit more. Hold it for three seconds, and release." Breathe in the light, blow out the darkness; breathing can bring **peace**. Our **purpose** is to teach the world. Rabbi Goldberg also asked the students, "Who are we to bless G-d, when we say *Baruch Hashem*?" The answer is that everything in life comes from *Hashem*. When we say *Baruch Hashem*, we are accepting the power of G-d, and accepting the challenges that He gives us. Through Kids Kicking Cancer, Rabbi Goldberg teaches



children facing painful and frightening procedures how to breathe and use relaxation techniques to help control their emotions and fear. He then tells them that it's their mission to share their knowledge. Kids Kicking Cancer has helped over 5,000 children in four different countries. Rabbi Goldberg is also the author of the book, <u>A Perfect G-d Created An Imperfect World Perfectly</u>. Thank you to Mrs. Landman for helping us to bring Rabbi Goldberg, who will be the Scholar-in-Residence at Congregation Beth Jacob this Shavuos, to TDSA.
