A snapshot is fine, as long as it's in focus and shows your family members close up and clearly enough to be identified. When submitting your photo, please keep in mind the following requirements:

- ① File types accepted for photographs are BMP, JPG, TGA, or PCX.
- ② Either black and white or color photographs are acceptable. Make sure that the image is in focus!
- ③ If you prefer to submit a professionally-taken photograph, you must get written permission from the photographer to include the photo in Emmanuel's directory.
- Identify (left to right) the names of everyone in the photograph, using the names as you want them to appear in the directory (including those of any included pets you consider members of your family).
- 5 Complete a "Parishioner Information Sheet".
- Submit your photo and <u>information sheet</u> by e-mail to <u>Karen</u>, via mail, or place in labeled basket in the back of the sanctuary.
- ① Submit photo and contact information by Labor Day.
- If you would prefer to have one of our Emmanuel photographers take your picture for the directory, please let <u>Karen</u> know and we will schedule a photo session for you.

Why I Chose Emmanuel

This month's message is a different take on *Why I Chose Emmanuel*. As I celebrate my 10th year at Emmanuel, I want to share with you how I came to Emmanuel and why I've stayed.

In the spring of 2005, I received a call from Gene Lange asking if I'd be interested in working as a part-time bookkeeper for his church. I gratefully accepted. I had been working for a trade association with Gene's law partner. As a single mom, I had pieced together several part-time jobs so I could remain involved in my kids' daily lives. At the time, my son Brandon was entering middle school and Leah was just getting into competitive gymnastics.



After two years of working from home for Emmanuel, I was hired as Parish Administrator working in the office 20 hours a week. My responsibilities were the financial administration for both the church and preschool, building use, website maintenance, and property and equipment/contract management. Over the next few years, responsibilities and hours rapidly increased, and eventually I became full-time.

I have been blessed to work under the leadership of three incredible priests. Dan, in his relaxed and laid back ways, welcomed me fully understanding my need for flexibility. He provided me the opportunity to create and live into this new position. And I loved the way he called me "Kel." We still have Dan's desk chair in our home office. Initially, I had fear about working with Martha. Fear that was certainly not justified. She taught me so much. She was patient and caring. I still miss our regular "staff meeting" lunches at Los Tios or Cheesetique. And now I have the fortunate opportunity to work with Chuck. What more can I say about working for and with Chuck?

In addition to the priests, there have been numerous music directors, preschool directors and staff, nursery staff, Christian education directors, sextons, seminarians, and priest associates. As with any staff, we've had our challenges, but there is not one person I have worked with here at Emmanuel that I haven't appreciated and learned something from.

I truly enjoy going to work each day. My job is not only administrative, it is a ministry. I am gladly available to listen to those who are lonely, have recently lost a loved one, or just need to talk. I can still hear Eileen Thompson when I'd answer a call from her "Kell-lee is that you?" I'll never forget the day that Judy Carlton called me when she went into Hospice, and asked if I would visit her. Every Thursday for the next few weeks, she and I enjoyed her "craving of the

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day" for lunch at her home. I was grateful for Judy's call and that I was able to spend those last few days with her.

I have come to love many of the children and families who attend our preschool. I've been the recipient of many hugs, Valentine's cards, and drawings for my office. My office is often a safe retreat for a teacher to bring a child who is having a rough day.



As I continue my journey here at Emmanuel, I am at a different stage of my life. Both of my kids are in college. Brandon will be a junior at MIT pursuing a degree in mechanical engineering. Leah has just begun her freshman year at the University of Mary Washington planning to study chemistry. When I was helping Leah set up her dorm room, I noticed only one book on her shelf — the Bible that the Emmanuel community gave her for her high school graduation. What a gift to know that she was not going to leave home without it.

I'm learning to embrace life as an empty-nester and even more dedicated employee. In my longed-for spare time I hope to learn more about gardening and cooking. I'm also hoping to go on a mini spiritual journey next fall.

While teaching my children the importance of saying thank you, I've not always followed through myself. So let me finish by thanking each and every one of you for accepting me into the Emmanuel family, providing me the opportunity to be a full-time mom along with being a full-time employee, allowing me to learn on the job, trusting my decisions, listening to my woes and my joys, and sharing your community with me.

All Families are Asked to Register. We are currently registering for the 2015 – 2016 school year and ask that every family who has children planning to attend Sunday school OR God & Donuts register using this form. It is important that we have a good idea of whom to expect so that the teachers have the best chance of being prepared to provide an awesome experience for your child. Also, it gives us important contact information, allergen awareness, etc.





Adams' science fiction phone book remains a best seller — a hilarious, self help star chart to help you find your place in the cosmos.

Now we Episcopalians are the People of the Book: Two



remarkable books actually — the Bible and the Book of Common Prayer. In worship every Sunday we use both — just printed on different paper.

While scripture is always primary, it is

"Silence: A Christian History" by Diarmaid MacCulloch

I am not by nature a quiet person. Third child in a household of six, I had to speak up loud and clear to be noticed. An extrovert par excellence, I feel compelled to fill awkward silences in awkward conversations. An Anglican, I love the "out loud" prayers of the Book of Common Prayer.

Silence does not come naturally to me. I am a "noisy

Christian." But even in me there is a contemplative streak and space for spiritual quiet.

Recently I picked up Diarmaid MacCulloch's book, "Silence: A Christian History". I got it from the sale cart at Bishop Payne Library where I book jockey Monday through Friday. The title leaped out at me. Chuck preached on meditation just the Sunday before. The Adult Spiritual Formation team, of which I am a part, had also just decided to pursue the topic in our fall schedule. And the book was free!

It's good — very good! The book is scholarly, engaging, and a joy to read — just under 250 pages.

The practice of silence came late to Christianity. Yahweh is a God who speaks. His people "make a

joyful noise" and lament aloud. Just read the psalms! The prophets speak truth to power. God's wisdom is proverbial. His Son comes to us as Logos — "In the beginning was the Word." Jesus speaks in parables. Only briefly for rest does he withdraw into silence. His disciples are sent out to preach good news. The Evangelists write the Gospels. Paul writes letters.

Noisy Christians.

But when Jesus didn't come back as the early Christians had hoped, it seemed that God himself was silent. This time is aptly known as "The Great Disappointment".

These disappointed Christians developed a different kind of spirituality. This is the spirituality of the Desert Fathers and Mothers, the aesthetic practices of philosophers — both of which led to a more mystical

brand of theology.

In 20 centuries of Christian history, the practice of silence has been both used and abused.

"There are many forms of religious silence, both positive and negative, from contemplation and prayer to repression and evasion. Diarmaid MacCulloch's book takes us on a guided tour of the role of silence in Christian history and tradition. He considers Jesus' strategic use of silence, the lessons of the first mystics in Syria, and the long arc of monastic tradition. He discusses different views of silence in Protestant and Evangelical circles and confronts more sinister institutional forms of silence within the Catholic Church."


"In a deeply personal final chapter, MacCulloch brings a message of optimism for those still seeking God
