# Why We Chose Emmanuel

When Chuck e-mailed us about writing this piece, he asked why we *chose* Emmanuel as our parish. That particular choice, however, is not made once and never considered again. It's made every single week when we *choose* Emmanuel as the place we go to express our faith. Faith is a living, breathing, evolving concept to us, and that fact alone makes finding a parish to stick to that much

more difficult. Emmanuel has been more than up to the task.

Like so many others in this community, our roots are not solely in the Episcopal Church. For the most part, we grew up in the Catholic Church and our exposure was more or less limited to that for years. If you examine our path to Emmanuel, though, you can pick out some clues that suggest that this parish and this



faith were where we were headed the entire time.

The first clue is in Pittsburgh where Rachel and I were baptized by Scott, the energetic young rector at the local Episcopal church. We then moved to Rochester and were part of a Catholic church called Transfiguration led by Father Jerry. The way I remember Father Jerry is as a wise, cheerful, kind old man who at the time did NOT fit my definition of a priest. Father Jerry was the first one who made church fun for me and was beloved by his parish.

Our next stop was Buffalo, where we searched a little while before landing at the

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Newman Center of a local university. It was an eccentric parish, to be sure, but there were two factors that made the decision an absolute no-brainer. One was the community; people just like us that we could relate to and would eventually work alongside as we became increasingly involved in several parish ministries including music and education. The second was Father Pat. You could really write an entire page about Father Pat and not be halfway through, but suffice it to say that the man is the single most interesting person I think I've ever met. An Irish Catholic with an affinity for Greek literature and all things philosophical, Father Pat was a 69-year-old firecracker whose sermons may have been hard to follow, but were guaranteed to introduce an idea you hadn't considered before. Finding this community when I was six and Rachel was nine, the formative years of our faith were spent there and Father Pat became our ideal picture of who we wanted leading our services. When we moved here, we knew it was going to be hard to find a suitable replacement.

During this time we also experienced a shifting or perhaps an expansion of our views. An evolution, if you will. Certain teachings of the Catholic Church no longer resonated with us, especially when we ventured outside the Newman Center for Mass. At the time, we thought little of it. But it created a rift of sorts when we started feeling like square pegs fitting into a round hole.

Our search around Northern Virginia started in Catholic churches and we tried a few, some even for months. But after months of sitting in the same pew every week and never once being greeted, never making a connection to any of the priests, and otherwise feeling dissatisfied by the entire experience, we knew we needed to keep looking. We finally decided to give this little Episcopal church a try.

It took all of two weeks for us to realize we had found our parish. Re-examine the clues and it shows you why Emmanuel is an absolutely perfect fit: we need a rector who challenges us and makes us think while keeping it fun, we need a community we can be a part of, and we need the flexibility to allow our own faith to grow. Our first experience with Emmanuel was through Chuck's brilliant blog post about Super Bowl Sunday. Then we got to see his homilies in person. Check on the thought-provoking rector. Our very first week, we were approached by no fewer than six people welcoming us to Emmanuel, one of which was Meredith Wade who then made sure we met just about everyone in the building and also talked to us about God & Donuts. Check the community box, too. And as we met these people around us, we heard their stories and how they had come from all walks of life and all different faiths to land at Emmanuel and we knew then that this was a place that encouraged growth and transformation of faith. Checklist complete.

As a family of four adults all with different ideas about faith and religion, it's not an easy task to find something that satisfies all of our individual desires. In truth, we all get something different out of coming to church each week and it will probably always be that way. The one thing we can all agree on, though, is that whether it be for Chuck's quidance, the support of the community, or the accepting nature of the Episcopalians, there is no place better-suited for the continued growth of our faith than Emmanuel.

Ding dong merrily on high, in heaven the bells are ringing...I heard the bells on Christmas Day, their old familiar carols play...Silver Bells, Silver Bells, it's Christmas Time in the City...Jingle Bells Jingle Bells...Hark how the bells, sweet silver bells, all

seem to say, throw cares away...Door bells and sleigh bells and schnitzel with noodles, sleigh bells ring, are you listen'n? There are bells all around and I've been listening...since July! Choir directors, organists, singers, and music teachers, start planning early for holiday concerts and by Christmas we are usually full of stress and more than tired of those songs we loved months ago! Years ago I found myself in the shoes of Mr. Grinch as I prepared for all of the holiday services, concerts, and the events that are supposed to make us happy! I was all done with the merry part of Christmas and I knew there were certainly other people in my situation, so my colleagues and I came up with the idea of a Christmas Comfort healing service. I'm so happy that Emmanuel, for the 3rd year, will be offering a Christmas Comfort service on December 20 at 5:00 p.m. Those with a heavy heart, sadness, stress, depression, or suffering loss might appreciate a quiet time to come together with others who also aren't greeting the season with a smile. I just heard a song recently that I hope to include in the liturgy for that evening. Mary Chapin Carpenter wrote some striking lyrics in her song, Bells Are Ringing. "Wherever you're walking tonight, whoever you're waiting for, somehow by the stable's faint light, peace in your heart is

restored. Bells are ringing all over the world, bells are ringing calling the light, bells are ringing all over the world." Bells have great significance at Christmas and all year long. In the famous book, Polar Express, the children know that if they can hear the bells on Santa's sleigh, that he loves them, is real, and is alive in their minds and hearts. Bells get our attention to share a message. Bells mark the passing of time, bells in school indicate when class is over and a new class will start, bells tell us when it's time to come to the dinner table, bells ring when someone is waiting at our door, bells ring on our phone to tell us a text message has arrived, bells ring when it's time to take something out of the oven, bells ring on the trolley to say, "look out!", bells have been used to indicate emergencies or bad weather, sometimes the bell in the elevator even tells us that someone is stuck and needs help. I invite you to listen to the song above on youtube or click the QR code below to listen directly. Maybe this year you will



ring your bell to share your joy and maybe this year you're finding it is difficult to hear that bell. Know that it's ok if you can't hear that joyous bell! Come to Christmas Comfort and find a meditative moment in a busy season.

Come to Christmas Comfort to listen to your heart. Come to Christmas comfort and ring your bell quietly to remember someone who is no longer with us, ring your bell to lift up a personal prayer, or ring your bell in the quiet darkness to indicate that you're still here! We're here with you!

# Reading Through Advent, One Day at a Time

I love Advent calendars — twenty-four little windows to open as we count down the days until Christmas.

Sometimes behind that window there is a little symbol,

a little toy, a chocolate kiss. But Advent calendars aren't just for children, they are for us grownups as well — at least Advent calendars of a different kind.

Advent is a season of waiting and expectation; yearning and longing, darkness and light. With a little holy reading, you can both deepen and enlighten those twenty-four days. Here are several little books to encourage you on your way — on your way to Bethlehem.

First and foremost are these two you will find in the foyer:

Joy to the World: Popular Carols for Advent and Christmas by Nancy Hopkins-Greene. At this hectic time of year, open your hearts to reflect and pray with familiar carols — a great way to navigate the season.

Joy of Heaven, to Earth Come Down by Margaret Bullitt-Jonas. This little book of daily prayer is grounded in reverence for the earth and living in harmony with the natural world. Includes photos and meditations for Advent.

And if you would like to go deeper...

Waiting for the Wonder: Voices of Advent places the reader in the


hearts and minds of the biblical characters — both real

and imagined — who played a role that first Christmas. It weaves together story and scripture that is both compelling and thought provoking. The author, Katerina Katsarka Whitley, is a native of Thesaloniki, Greece and a notable Episcopal author, and retreat leader.

Advent with Evelyn Underhill draws on the classic wisdom of this Anglican mystic. Underhill, born in 1875, considered herself an atheist, but became immersed in the liturgical life of the church. Torn between Rome and Canterbury, she found her true spiritual home as an Anglican. Each daily Advent reflection concludes with suggestions for meditation and prayer.

Come Thou Long-Expected Jesus: Advent and Christmas with Charles Wesley The great hymnist, Anglican priest and co-founder of Methodism recently celebrated his 300<sup>th</sup> birthday! Among the 9,000 hymns he wrote, many are heralds of this holy season. Can you imagine a Christmas without Hark the herald, angels sing? Paul Wesley (yes his middle name is Wesley!) Chilcote has compiled this lovely little book that weaves together Wesley's hymns, with scripture and prayer.

This five-week, Advent DVD-based study challenges us through story, art, and Bible study to discover what it means to be Christ's






## Epiphany / Baptism of the Lord

# Fred DeLuca's Twenty-Five Years of Service

On November 1, the Outreach team thanked Fred DeLuca for his dedicated service to a number of different community activities, presenting him a framed print of Emmanuel. In the period since he "retired" in 1988, Fred has served our Alexandria neighbors in need in a number of ways. For many years, Fred staffed the front desk of the Carpenter's



Shelter homeless shelter once a week; at first with his late wife Anita, and later alone, he delivered and served lunch at the Meade Memorial bag lunch program,

seven times a year; and from 1990 to 2015, he was a driver, and later coordinator of all Emmanuel's drivers, for the once-a-month Meals on Wheels delivery to needy seniors in Alexandria. Fred also chaired Emmanuel's outreach committee for several years.

What led to Fred's involvement in these activities? As a retiree, he had time available, but more importantly, it was a personal approach by late parishioner Bob Coombs. Fred recalled that Bob was "a great recruiter", and he emphasized that the most effective way to encourage participation in any activity is a person-to-person approach. In reflecting on his years of service, Fred pointed out that parishioners involved in one of our many outreach ministries will feel useful because they are able to help those in need, and will also be thankful for all that they have. We're all grateful to Fred for his example of Christian service.

## ALIVE!

Since we are entering the season of feasting, this month we'd like to highlight ALIVE!'s Last Saturday Food Distributions. Since food subsidies, which begin the beginning of each month, often do not provide enough food to last through the end of the month, ALIVE! works with congregations, grocery stores, and the Capitol Area Food Bank to provide a 5-day supply of surplus fresh produce and staple foods on the last Saturday of each month. Through this service, ALIVE! serves about 600 families referred by social service agencies and ALIVE! congregations.

Here are four ways you can contribute to this terrific ministry.

 Bring food donations to church on Sunday. Leave your donations in the basket. It doesn't get any easier! We will box them up to be picked up by ALIVE! All



nonperishable foods are appreciated, but there is an ongoing need for cereal, peanut butter, jelly, and canned meat.

- Make a tax-deductible donation directly to the food program. Either drop your check (made out to Emmanuel Episcopal Church with "ALIVE! Food Program" in the memo line) in the weekly plate or online.
- Friday workout with time for dinner and drinks afterward. Volunteers unload food from the ALIVE! truck at Cora Kelly Recreation Center, 25 West Reed Avenue, in preparation for the last Saturday distribution. You can pitch in the last Friday of every month, January through October, and the second Friday in December from 6:30 p.m.to 8:00 p.m. (This event does not occur in November.)
- Distribute food on the last Saturday. Make this your New Year's Resolution! Volunteers bag and distribute food at three locations in Alexandria: Cora Kelly Recreational Center (25 West Reed Avenue), Ladrey Senior Residence (300 Wythe Street), and Church of the Resurrection (2280 North Beauregard). The distributions occur on the

last Saturday of every month,
January through October, and
the second Saturday in
December from about 8:30
a.m.to 12:00 p.m. (This event does not occur in
November.)



## **Preschool News**

On Wednesday, November 18, the Preschool hosted a Parent Art Exploration Night. It was a fun evening of learning, observing, and trying our hands at various kinds of drawing. Kathryn Coneway, our artist-in-residence, shared a bit about the developmental stages of drawing. We learned that children begin with exploration of a given material using all of their senses. They then move to the energy stage, in which they like to cover as much of the paper as possible with their paint, crayons, or other materials. Children then start making controlled scribbles, followed by shapes and stories. In this latter stage children start to make connected enclosed shapes, and stories about their drawing increase. Once children are drawing shapes, they often start to make more complex designs with symmetry, divided space, and radials. Finally, children

progress to creating representational forms. This information is helpful when looking at children's art, as it allows us to value and understand the purpose of what they are doing at each stage.

After hearing from Kathryn, we explored different drawing materials and practiced for ourselves. At one station we used black felt tips pens



to make observational drawings of natural materials. At another station we experimented with oil pastels, discovering how to use them, trying them out on black paper, and using them to fill mandala circles. (A mandala in this sense is a circle to be filled with color or designs in whatever way the drawer chooses.) The third station gave us the opportunity to build with blocks and then use pencils to observe and draw what we had built.

I personally found it to be a relaxing evening that allowed me to use parts of my brain that I don't use enough! Providing these opportunities for children is extremely valuable as well. Kathryn shared with us that research has shown that giving mandala circles to children in special education classrooms at the beginning of the day helps increase their focus and improve behaviors. All of the types of drawing presented at the Parent Art Exploration night can easily be done with children at home. For reluctant artists, drawing something that they have built can add a new element and dimension to the idea of drawing. Oil pastels let children experiment with rich color and blending. And creating

Priority Applications are due December 17. observational drawing of natural objects gives children the chance to slow down, notice detail, and pay attention to form and texture. Drawing, just like yoga, is a practice, to be repeated and tried many times in many ways.

## **Red Twos Class**

The Red Twos is the youngest group of students at Emmanuel Preschool. On Thursday and Friday mornings, we provide routines and structure that allow the students to grow and learn while feeling safe and comfortable. Students in the Red Twos are given opportunities to explore and learn through age appropriate toys and projects. Children are encouraged to use their words to express their needs and wants. Activities in our classroom are chosen to create learning and social experiences through play, projects and activities. In the month of December, we will create sensory explorations and group activities around the theme of Christmas. We will continue our ongoing art exploration of clay. The children enjoy digging into this dense material, rolling it into balls and coils, tearing it into small pieces and smashing the clay into flat pancakes. Their imaginations take over and they create stories to go with their creations. The picture shows a dragon battle! When our clay time is over, the children work together to clean up the space — rolling the clay into large balls and spraying it with





water so we can use it again and cleaning up the table with large sponges. They are learning cooperation and to take responsibility for our materials and classroom. In the second half of December, we will begin an art exploration of drawing with oil pastels, including using different materials and textures to draw on and using different surfaces such as boards, tables and the floor to draw on. So many fun things are lined up for the Red Twos this month and we are happy to share them with you!
