Seminarians on the Move

Now that their academic year has ended, all three of our seminarians are on the move.

Jordan Casson graduated from the Anglican Studies program at Virginia Theological Seminary (VTS) on May 19. He will be ordained to the Sacred Order of Deacons (Transitional) at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Old Town on June 11 at 10:30 a.m. All are invited. Emmanuel is cosponsoring a reception after the service at St. Paul's. Jordan's last Sunday with us will be June



12. His lay committee (Suji and Katie Kelly, Jim Larsen, Bonnie Lilley, and Tom Suydam) will honor him at coffee hour following the 10:30 a.m. service in the parish hall. On July 1, Jordan will assume the position of Deacon-in-Charge at St. Michaels, Yeadon, a suburb of Philadelphia. St. Michaels is a multi-racial, multi-national parish which sees its diversity as its strength in coming to know Christ and making Christ known to others. God willing, Jordan will be ordained to the Holy Order of the Priesthood later this year or early next.

Gethin Wied has completed his middler year of study at VTS. Over the summer he has been selected to serve an intensive internship at St. John's Episcopal Church, McLean. He will be living in College Park, Maryland. In September, he will return to VTS for his senior year and will rejoin us at Emmanuel. He will continue to be supported by his lay committee co-chaired by Gail and Ron Eger and Sandy and Frank Esquivel.

Rick Bauer will not officially begin his first year with us until September but perhaps you've already met Rick at our 10:30 a.m. service. Over the summer, Rick will be completing the seminarian requirement for Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) at Goodwin House Bailey's Crossroads. Rick will begin his middler year at VTS in September. He, his wife Katrina and sons Ricky and Christian will also be moving to a home on the VTS campus. Tom Suydam will chair Rick's lay committee and we are seeking volunteers to serve with him. It is an educational, spiritual, and fun experience for everyone!

User-Friendly Dictionary

In honor of Jordan's ordination to the Diaconate on June 11, this month's word is.....TA DA...

Deacon!

Deacons are members of one of three distinct orders of ordained ministry. In the Episcopal Church a deacon exercises "a special ministry of servanthood" directly under the deacon's bishop, serving all people and especially those in need. This definition reflects the practice of the early church, in which deacons were ordained "not to the priesthood but to the servanthood [diakonia, "ministry"] of the bishop." In the ancient Greek-speaking world the term diakonos meant an intermediary who acted or spoke for a superior. Christian

deacons were agents of the bishop, often with oversight of charity. Since ancient times the liturgical functions of deacons have suggested the activity of angels. As they proclaim the gospel, lead intercessions, wait at the eucharistic table, and direct the order of the assembly, deacons act as sacred messengers, agents, and attendants. The revival of the order of deacons in the twentieth century has emphasized social care and service. Many bishops in the Episcopal Church expect their deacons to promote care of the needy outside the church. In addition to those ordained deacon as a permanent vocation, there are also "transitional deacons" (like Jordan will be) who are ordained deacon as a preliminary step toward ordination as a priest.

And a related word, diaconate, means the office of deacon, a person's tenure in it, or a body of deacons collectively.

We have been fortunate to have Jordan in our midst this year. And we knew he was an 'angel' all along — on June 11 it will just be made official!

Why We Chose Emmanuel?

Our journey to Emmanuel began in early 1987, when we started church hunting shortly after getting married. As Beth was raised Episcopalian and Bob was a Catholic, we spent time visiting two of those congregations in Old Town, but neither seemed to fit. One was too conservative and not accommodating of our blended faith family and the other was just too formal. So we kept looking.



Having purchased a major fixer-upper in the immediate neighborhood, we drove by EEC frequently and the idea of attending a small, friendly, neighborhood church, within walking distance, grew on us. We joined later that year, drawn by the welcoming parishioners we met,

the church's simplicity and straightforward approach to worship, and — with a family in mind — the preschool.

After the birth of our first child, Maggie, we knew we'd found a church home when the senior ladies of the congregation would vie to hold her at the 8:00 a.m. service so we could take communion. When our son, Jimmy, came along, Maggie was ready for preschool and EEC again welcomed us. We, and the kids, made some of our closest lifetime friends (and you know who you are) as a result.

As the children reached adolescence, however, their Emmanuel peer group was small and the youth group was struggling. We watched as many friends left the church to find one that would better serve their kids, and we wondered if we should do the same. But for some reason, we felt compelled to stay at EEC and decided, instead, to "double down" and make it work by becoming more, rather than less, invested in the church. We took on a variety of roles from teaching Sunday School and coordinating acolytes to Altar Guild and stewardship.

Then, in 2009, EEC rector Dan Eckman asked Beth, an organizational consultant by profession, if she would lead a strategic visioning and mission process for the church. We didn't recognize it at the time as a "call" from God, but that is what it was. We talked more as a family and with our friends about faith, our responsibility as Christians, and how God works in our lives over the three years of EEC's transformation than we had ever before.

When Martha Wallace came to EEC as our interim rector, she challenged this congregation to decide if it wanted to be a "country club" or a church. With a lot

of discernment and hard work by many committed, optimistic, and courageous parishioners, the current mission and vision for Emmanuel emerged. But the story doesn't end there.

Jump to today. Chuck McCoart is our rector and EEC is growing in faith and health, thanks to our dedicated church and preschool staff, Joani and our seminarians, and an increasing number of volunteers helping the church thrive. Our kids have left home and are on their own. Beth leads a non-profit in Philadelphia during the week and Bob's in Alexandria hoping to retire next year.

Before then, however, and before Bob steps down as Senior Warden in January, he has another hope for this parish that he seeks to pay forward: to strengthen EEC's programs for children and youth by revitalizing the acolyte program. This mission is something near and dear to his heart, not just for what it did for our children, but because he was the longest serving altar boy at St. Mary's Church in Upstate New York and has continued as one of the oldest serving acolytes here at EEC. So watch for a few newsletter and bulletin notices about those plans at the end of the summer.

As we approach our 30th year in this parish, we are extremely happy to have found and stayed at Emmanuel. This church has come a long way since the time when we questioned whether to stay or go. Doubling down on an investment is always a lot scarier than folding your cards. In our family's life, it was a good bet to follow God's call and to reinvest in EEC. We look forward to the next 30 years together!

Vestry Highlights

At its regular meeting on May 11, the Vestry heard several reports:

- Ressa Jones, Preschool Director, noted that the spring fundraiser was a success and its financial goal was met. She discussed a long-term goal of the school's strategic plan which is to revamp the playground by raising funds through fundraisers and working toward the goal with the church. Another long term goal is to create an outdoor classroom space.
- event review of the Shrine

 Mont Retreat. It was on par in attendance with last year's numbers but with fewer families and more individuals. He reviewed feedback received from attendees and noted some issues needing attention for next year, particularly childcare for families with small children during the program periods.
- Kelli Corts, administrator, provided her assessment of how EEC's line-item budget has fared in the first four months of the year and noted that pledge fulfillment for 2016 was on target. A few items of the budget (particularly snow removal) have exceeded their budgetary limit, but all in all the budget is in good shape thus far for 2016.
- Chuck discussed the 2016 picnic. Due to our inability to secure space at the Seminary for the event and complications with the leadership team, the Vestry decided to cancel the event this year and focus on next year. A date has been reserved at the Seminary for 2017.
- Adam Schildge reported on the feedback provided to date from the Ministry Teams for strategic planning purposes. He indicated that a number of teams had provided feedback and more responses were expected. The strategic planning working group will review the feedback and will be able to provide the Vestry with a synopsis of what was received and the next steps in the strategic planning process at its June 11 meeting.
- Bob Carragher led a discussion regarding the date of the Vestry's next quarterly planning session. It is hoped it can be scheduled in June.

God & Donuts: A Weekend of Discovery

Two teachers, two chaperones, and five students grades 6 to 9 were embarking on a new experience. Over the next 36 hours we would discover much about each other and about ourselves. News from Region IV

In my new role as Dean of Region IV, of which our church is a part along with seven other Episcopal parishes in Alexandria, I meet quarterly with representatives from each of the eight parishes in Region IV. We met recently to, among other things, review the financial status for the Region and approve an Outreach Budget for 2016-2017. The allocated funds include:

Child & Family Network Program. Established over 30 years ago by concerned mothers whose children had failed kindergarten, the Region designated \$100 to show continuing support for their work.

Church of St. Clement Hypothermia Shelter. A winter shelter operating from January to March, providing an overnight place for men screened through Carpenter's Shelter. The Region continued with a \$1,500 donation to the shelter.

Hunger Free Alexandria. A relatively new initiative response to an April 2014 report highlighting obesity as an issue due to lack of food. This ecumenical effort spans different denominations and houses of worship in Alexandria. The Region approved \$400 and actively encourages church involvement.

Meade Memorial Bag Lunch Program. This program provides lunch to approximately 50 individuals six days a week. Various Alexandria churches make the bag lunches. Hosting the program has a large impact on utility costs and cleanup. The Region approved continuing the \$2,000 donation for support.

West End Lazarus Ministry. Hosted by Church of the Resurrection since September 2015, this extension of the Lazarus Ministry begun by Christ Church and St. Paul's now ministers to the needy in Alexandria's West End. Operating Thursdays between 3:00 and 6:00 p.m., financial counseling and emergency funds are available to assist residents within the West End region. The Region designated \$1,000 for this ministry.

There are other opportunities to support those among us in the City of Alexandria which we could not fund now, but hope to eventually. If you have questions about any of these initiatives, or wish to get involved in some way, please let me know.



Saturday, July 23 and every 4th Saturday after that




Building on our existing Wednesday night dinner ministry at Carpenter's Shelter, we are adding a new breakfast ministry! Beginning July 23,

Bibliomania, A Ministry

This past month, I made a big decision to leave my job at Bishop Payne Library. It was a labor of love but it was time to go. And I have decided to make Emmanuel — my beloved spiritual home — the primary focus of my ministry.

I am a bibliomaniac. For the past seven years, I did collection development for the library at Virginia Seminary.
Spending other people's money on books was delicious. Reading as many as I could was delightful. Bibliomania is one of my gifts. And now — bibliomania will be part of my ministry here at Emmanuel.

A two-pronged ministry:


The first I call **Good Book**. Weekly I will post on Facebook an informative: provocative/inspiring/delightful book related to faith in the broadest sense of the word. It will include a link to publisher and brief excerpt. For example!

Good Book #1. <u>The Bonobo and the Atheist: In Search of Humanism among the Primates</u> (which I currently am reading)

"Veneer theory used to be the dominant biological view of human nature...genuine kindness was either absent or an evolutionary misstep. Morality was a thin veneer barely able to conceal our true nature...entirely selfish. In the past decade, Veneer Theory has succumbed to overwhelming evidence for innate empathy, altruism, and cooperation in humans and other animals."

The second is the **EEC Free Library**.

Once upon a time parish libraries were a good idea. They helped circulate good books, promoted discussion, and built community. But in the digital age, these days are long gone. Parish libraries are usually places where dated books go to die. People



often give their unwanted books to churches and though they don't want them, they expect to see them on the church's shelves. Not a good plan.

So I have revamped the parish library in the Memorial Room. I have "weeded" the current shelves of ancient and obsolete materials (there were VHS tapes there!). I will "curate" our little collection from used book sources that I have access to — keeping the shelves lean and mean and relevant. (I am not seeking donations from parishioners. We don't have space to store or collect boxes of books. If any books are donated they should be given "unrestricted" meaning they could be "recycled.")

Rather than a borrowing system there is a "reference section" of books we keep and a "free book" section. The free book section is organized and bundled together by category: scripture, spirituality, ethics, history etc. Book bundles are free for the taking. (No swapping, no returns.) I did this at VTS and books are "marketed" to move quickly. I will replenish the books along the way.

Weekly I'll highlight a few choice "book bundles" from the free library on the EEC Facebook page as well.

When does this start? Right away! On Sundays in June, come down to the Memorial Room between the services or after the 10:30 a.m. service, and I'll show you around. But feel free to check it out anytime you're at church. And feel free to help yourself to a good book anytime.

Might this spark interest for an EEC book group? Don't know! But let me know if you are interested. E-mail me with your thoughts.
