What is the DC Arts and Humanities Education Collaborative?

The DC Arts and Humanities Education Collaborative works to strengthen and promote the arts and humanities as basic and integral to a high-quality education for all students in DC public and chartered public schools. Comprised of more than 70 arts and cultural organizations, DC Collaborative initiatives include: Arts for Every Student, Professional Development for Teachers and Arts Educators, and the Arts Education Initiative.



Professional Development Workshops (PDW) are offered through the DC Collaborative member providers to DC public and chartered public school teachers. These workshops offer teachers the opportunity to learn innovative ways to invigorate classroom instruction by using arts techniques. Teachers work with experienced arts educators to learn to use dance, music, theater, visual arts, and the humanities to teach academic lessons and address Common Core and other state standards. The Professional Development Workshops can be submitted to OSSE for Professional Learning Unit (PLU) credits towards relicensure. Teachers may receive up to 3 workshops per year!

This year teachers who sign up for designated Professional Development Opportunities will be selected at random the day of the **PDW** to receive a field trip for their school through the **Arts for Every Student Program!** Please note: a teacher is eligible for one **AFES** trip per year through Professional Development Workshop initiatives. Programs that include this offering will indicate **“Free AFES Trip Available”** in the description.

Arts for Every Student (AFES) provides increased access for all DC public and charter school students to attend arts and cultural events offered by our member providers. Through this program, DC public and charter schools are eligible for free tickets and transportation to local cultural events, supported by the DC Collaborative. Schools with PreK-K and secondary grade students may select a free in-school performance as an alternative to a trip to a cultural venue. Please see the separate Catalogue for **AFES** program information.

Professional Development Workshop Teacher Partner Responsibilities

Participation in **Professional Development Workshops** is easy! Here’s a quick snap-shot of what’s expected from partner schools:

- Designate a Key Communicator to serve as the main contact for the school for the AFES program.
- Key Communicator should attend the **AFES** School Orientation at the beginning of the school year.
- Key Communicators should instruct teachers interested in **PDWs** to register an email and password with the Online Registration system at, www.dccollaborative.org or contact the DC Collaborative offices 202.879.9327 or info@dccollaborative.org.
- Registrations must be made by the teachers attending the **PDW**.
- Key Communicators should instruct teachers about cancellation policies and procedures for **PDWs**.
- Select **PDW** events during registration week (week of September 9th) with your colleagues.
- Attend the **PDW**.
- Complete event evaluations.

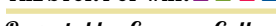
