This year in addition to the many awards offered annually, there are two special contests being run.

The first is an effort to expand the use of wonderful "heirloom" plants that may have been mainstays of your grandmother's garden, but have been forgotten in the rush of new plants annually turned out by the garden industry. New can be good, but these heirlooms are proven, dependable performers. The Historic Preservation Committee has selected eight plants that they think are worthy of a place in your garden. You might choose one or two, maybe go for all eight, but the goal is to preserve these plants by incorporating them into home gardens and club maintained civic sites. Go to GCFM.org, click on the Awards tab and go down to the contest on the bottom of the list. You'll be pleased with how easy it is to put your club in the running for the nursery gift certificates to be given out next year to the winning small, medium and large clubs.

Our second contest is **Plant a Native.** Too many people think natives are weed-like plants best left for untended meadows and roadsides. But you probably already have many natives in your garden—rudbeckia (black eyed susan), monarda (bee balm), heuchera and tiarella (foam flower), the red and yellow columbine. Looking for shrubs that are low maintenance—fothergilla and itea offer spring blooms beloved by pollinators and fall color that out does burning bush. Want a shrub that always stands out—try Phystocarpus (Devil's Nine bark) with one of its spectacular colors—purple, red orange, gold and more. All of these plants are a food source for native pollinators as well as a delight in any garden. Plant these beauties in your garden or civic site and your club qualifies to win the cash awards that will go to the small, medium and large clubs with the highest percentage of native plants in your home and civic sites. Again go to GCFM.org, click on the Awards tab and look for the native pollinator contest at the bottom of the list.
