

M1: 12:30-2:00 pm

PROSE OR POETRY Silent No More - Unlocking Voices of Older Writers.

This course continues a popular series on the craft of writing both prose and poetry.

Author **Peter Saunders, Ph.D.,** is a life-long writer and a late-life poet. He is one of the longest-serving teachers in the Learning Series program.

GARDEN PLEASURES

Karen Moore returns to talk with us about what we should be doing to prepare our fall and winter gardens for perennials and annuals as well as vegetables and herbs. Karen, who has been in this business for over 40 years and owned a flower shop in Chatham for more than 20 years, is a gardening consultant and works with her husband in the family landscaping business. M3: 10:00-11:30 **WHY NOT WINE?**

This class is intended for the casual wine drinker who would like to know more about what's in the glass. What is wine, how is it made, and where does it come from? How do we choose the right wine



for occasions great and small? What wine goes with what food, and how do we cope with a restaurant wine list and a snooty sommelier?

English-born **John Ward** first encountered wine during his student days in Paris and has been drinking it ever since. Since coming to Cape Cod, he has organized the Wine Aficionados of Nauset Newcomers and has spoken twice at OYC's Holiday Wine Tasting. M4: 1:00-2:30

BIRDING CAPE COD IN THE FALL

Interested in knowing more about birds and their behavior? Like to know what birds are at your feeder? Lectures, props, and slides will answer these questions.



Week 1: Why Bird? - Where to find the birds and how to best use binoculars and field guides.

Week 2: Winter Birding - Why is the Cape so attractive as a migration destination? How do birds survive the winter?

Week 3: Migrants / Breeders - What are the four categories of migrants, and what are the right conditions for migrating.

Week 4: Birding Field Trip - Bring binoculars and field guide for a local birding trip (to be held at a different time and place, probably at 8:00 am).

Phil Kyle is a past President of the Cape Cod Bird Club, the Head Naturalist at the Cape Cod Museum of Natural History, Brewster, and the Head Naturalist at the Green Briar Nature Center, Sandwich. He has taught courses and has led Cape Cod birding trips for fifteen years. He has also taught in the Life Time Learning program at the Snow Library Orleans, for the last two years. 4-WEEK COURSE starts Monday, September 14, with the concluding field trip on October 5.

AT THE MOVIES WITH CAROL YINDRA: TIMELESS COMEDIES

TUESDAYS

T1: 1:30-2:30

THE ROARING TWENTIES

Historian Nathan Miller characterized the 1920's as "a decade full of drinking, dancing, hedonism, and crime." It was that, but much more as well. In those tumultuous ten years American society changed significantly. This course

will examine the persons, events, and movements that caused that change. Part I will be offered in the fall and Part II in the spring.

Our presenter, **John Kennedy, Ed.D.**, has taught history at every level from high school to graduate school.

6-WEEK COURSE starts Tuesday, September 29.

T2: 10:30-12:00

A WORLD UNDONE: WORLD WAR I

This course will examine the Great War from 1914 to 1918, and the policies of the victorious allies at Versailles which sowed the seeds of an even greater conflict twenty years later. The course will cover the major campaigns of the War and examine the successes and failures

of both civilian and military leaders.

Michael McNaught earned degrees from Oxford University (where he specialized in Military History and the Theory of War), and an MA from Columbia. An independent school teacher and administrator for 44 years, he retired to Falmouth in 2004.

STUDIES IN MODERN MYSTICISM

In this two-part course, we will study and discuss *Cosmic Consciousness: A Study in the Evolution of the Human Mind* by Richard Maurice Bucke, M.D., the classic investigation of the development of man's mystical relationship to the infinite.

In Part 2 we will read and discuss selections by Julian of Norwich and other female mystics.

THE SURPRISING NATURAL WORLD OF CAPE COD

The Outer Cape provides a view to a unique natural history, intricate biodiversity and extraordinary beauty throughout the seasons. Focusing on marine ecology, knowledgeable experts will share the latest findings that provide surprising insights about the inhabitants of our coastal region.

T5: 10:30-12:00

BRINGING IMAGES TO LIFE

This two-session course will explore two very different ways of bringing pictorial images to an audience and providing viewers with a richer experience.

Session 1: BEHIND THE COVERS AT THE NEW YORKER WITH BOB STAAKE – Did you know that many of the New Yorker's most famous covers were created in a little studio on Main Street by Chatham's own Bob Staake? This internationally-regarded artist's decade-worth of *New Yorker* covers have visually commented on everything from presidential politics to gay rights, from racial unrest to natural disasters – but now we learn the deeper stories behind his iconic images.

Session 2: CLASSICAL MUSIC IN THE MOV-IES – Inspired by Hank Holden's years of producing the Handel Christmas concert, this course will explore the role classical music plays in popular movies. The survey will begin with Melies' 1902 film, A Trip to the Moon, which featured music from Rimsky-Korsakoff's Sheherazade then move through familiar and some not-so-familiar films to the last clip from The Tree of Life, featuring Smetana's The Moldau. A devotee of classical music and good movies, Hank Holden has also taken voice lessons with a member of the Metropolitan Opera Chorus. He often finds himself humming classical refrains and notes, "Once the music enters your head, it never leaves."

IMMORTAL GODS, HUMAN LIVES: Mythology of Greece and Rome

We will study the struggles of men and women of Ancient Greece and Rome as they interacted with their gods and goddesses. The timeless stories of the Classical Age include some of the world's great loves, tragedies, and adventures and have inspired artists and writers through the ages.

An assignment sheet and class notes will be available

with selected readings from the Classical writers, including Ovid, Virgil, and Homer.

Professor Frank Smith, a Fulbright Scholar and former lecturer in the Classics at Harvard's



Graduate School of Education, was Massachusetts Teacher of the Year in 1985. He was also one of two educators featured in the PBS television documentary "Great Teachers of America." He has performed as Michelangelo and Leonardo da Vinci on university campuses and has led many acclaimed study tours throughout ancient Italy. 6-WEEK COURSE starts **Wednesday, October 14**.

GENEALOGY— DISCOVERING THE PAST

You will learn how to bring the past to life and make it part of your present. The lives and times of past relatives can inspire us in many ways. We will start with an introduction to genealogical studies – keeping records etc. – and focus especially on research techniques.

Arthur Bedard is a retired High School Biology teacher and a genealogy enthusiast. He is presently a member of the Florida Genealogy Society and the Cape Cod Genealogy Society.

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTIONS: The Unique Way We Choose Our Leader

A look at some important questions about how we choose our president. Why do we have an Electoral College system? Why Iowa and New Hampshire? Why not have a direct election of the president? What role does outside money play in the elections? What are the restrictions on money, and who gives to presidential campaigns? Well look at campaign commercials

throughout the years, talk about presidential debates, the role of political consultants, and the role of the national political parties.

Dennis Johnson is professor emeritus from George Washington University's GraduateSchool of Political Management. He has written or edited nine books on campaigns and elections and public policy. He was editor of books on the presidential election of 2008 and 2012, and soon, 2016. A third edition of his *Political Consultants and American Elections* (Routledge) was published in July 2015, and next year his *Democracy for Hire* (Oxford University Press) will be published.

annually as well as some international events for "Brass era" cars.

Dave Wilber is a "sequential collector" – one car at a time. He is devoted to 1932-1948 Fords and currently owns a hot rod and goes to "Cruise nights" in Dennis and national events sponsored by the National Street Rod Association and Goodguys.

Craig Kappel has collected Mercedes, Packards, and one classic Auburn over the years. His cars have won awards around the nation, and his latest acquisition will be going to the Pebble Beach Concours D'Elegance in 2016.
