



Since the program's inception, thirty-seven organizations/projects from across the province have been selected to participate, each receiving a \$1,000 grant to facilitate their proposed project. SaskEnergy's grant allowed each organization to "Share the Warmth" on our behalf. They each assisted clientele in coping with the challenges winter brings through special initiatives they would not have been able to undertake otherwise.

Share the Warmth days across the province varied but always featured winter necessities such as warm bedding, warm clothing, warm shelter and/or a hot meal. There were many creative minds at work in our province to ensure that this worthwhile provincial community investment initiative assisted as many people as possible.

For the 2016-17 program, we are looking for 30 enthusiastic organizations from across the province that provide daily care and services for vulnerable citizens in our communities.

AWARENESS

Will there be any public awareness of your project? If so, tell us how you will make that happen.

LEVERAGE

Will you leverage other resources to assist with your project? If so, please tell us about your plan to obtain additional financial or in-kind resources.

ACTIVATION ASSISTANCE

Please let us know if you would like us to be involved in your project and we will do our best to be there if our resources allow.

ANGELS 4 WARMTH

Regina

Angels 4 Warmth is a dedicated group of knitters who produce hundreds of scarves, mittens and toques every year and distribute them to over 20 charitable organizations to keep many hands and hearts warm. With a SaskEnergy Share the Warmth Grant, these angels purchased the necessary yarns for knitting articles to stock the emergency cupboards at shelters so that families fleeing domestic violence have immediate access to winter clothing. All of these hand knitted mittens, toques and scarves are lovingly created by volunteers who give their time to ensure that people in the community stay warm during winter's coldest months.



WARM CLOTHING DONATION PROJECT

These four organizations collaborated to expand an existing local event (Here Comes Santa Claus Day) by adding a warm clothing collection campaign for vulnerable families in the community. This event is always very well attended by community members, so it was a perfect place to collect warm clothing on a large scale. It also offered an excellent public awareness opportunity to promote the charitable

and environmental benefits of this clothing "reuse" drive. People in the community rallied behind the drive, and nearly 150 individuals received a supply of warm winter clothing as a result of distribution through each of the partner organizations.



CROCK POT CONNECTION

Fort Qu'Appelle Community Outreach Management Centre, Fort Qu'Appelle

Community Outreach was able to impact an entirely new group of vulnerable citizens in the Fort Qu'Appelle vicinity, who were interested in learning how to prepare low-cost but highly nutritious family meals. The result of careful recruitment allowed for a good cross section of minimum wage earners living below the poverty line to learn how to feed their families good food they could afford. Each participant prepared a variety of slow-cooker meals and shared with one another to make the most of the experience. Armed with a new crockpot of their own, and knowledge of how to take advantage of bulk buying, participants were well equipped for delicious, affordable meal preparation for their families.

FIVE STAR DINING EXPERIENCE

Salvation Army, Haven of Hope, Regina

The Salvation Army feeds vulnerable clientele daily on a shoestring budget. The normal fare is soup and sandwiches. With a SaskEnergy Share the Warmth Grant, the organization turned their soup kitchen space into a Five Star dining experience, complete with linen tablecloths and napkins, real floral arrangements and live music. An elegant meal of roast beef and Yorkshire pudding was served, complete with cheesecake for dessert - to the delight of those arriving for what might have been their only meal of the day. Attendees had no prior knowledge of the special "pop-up" dining event so were very pleasantly surprised at the meal being served and the white glove treatment when they arrived that day. It was a wonderful way for the Salvation Army to do something to help attendees feel valued and cared for by their community.
