CALL TO ORDER

• Chair Ruth Evans called the meeting to order at 12:09 p.m.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATES

Christina Hall of Congressman Tom McClintock's office told us that her boss is attempting to fast-track the EIR process to deal with trees that need to be cut down in National Forests because of wildfire concerns with the drought. Nathan Alonzo with Senator Vidak's office talked about budget week hearings in Sacramento and a deadline of June 15th to adopt it. Chelsea Kemple of Assemblyman Jim Patterson's office invited everyone to a drought workshop her office is putting on in Clovis on June 26th. Shannon Major of Senator Berryhill's office spoke about SCA 7, a bill that keeps transportation dollars in transportation. Raj Rakkar of Assemblyman Perea's office updated the GAC about three supported bills that are moving through the Senate after passing through Assembly. Rudy Mendoza of Congressman Devin Nunes' office talked about an ABC Tax Plan that is a legislative priority for his boss.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Randy Dhindsa made a motion to approve the minutes of the April 8th and May 13th meetings. The Motion was seconded by Larry Fortune and passed unanimously.

ISSUE PRESENTATION

TPA/TPP and Export-Import Bank – Jennings Imel, U.S. Chamber of Commerce

Jennings Imel of U.S. Chamber of Commerce updated the GAC on Trade Promotion Authority (TPA) and its progression through Congress. It passed through the Senate a few weeks ago and is set to be voted on by the House on Friday, June 12th. Jennings expects that IF it passes, it will only be by a couple votes. Valley congressman are supportive, including Congressman Jim Costa, who has taken a lot of heat from labor unions over it. TPA has divided both parties for different reasons. It allows the President to publish the

Trans Pacific Partnership (TPP) agreement to the public for 60 days and gives Congress a chance to vote up or down (no amendments). Some republicans say it gives the President too much authority and some democrats say TPP is a bad deal for the U.S. The Fresno Chamber is supportive of both TPA and TPP. Jennings believes if TPA passes, TPP could be finalized by the end of the year. The trade deal has been in the works for four years and represents 40% of GDP.

Export-Import Bank is a department that assists exporting businesses in securing insurance when private companies can't do it. Ex-Im authorization runs out on June 30th. It's controversial among leadership in the House with John Boehner supportive and Kevin McCarthy opposed. Some republicans say if Ex-Im didn't exist, private sector companies would fill the void. Supporters say it would hurt exporters to lose a critical safety net, especially why every other exporting country currently has their own version of Ex-Im Bank. Randy Dhindsa mentioned that his RaboBank customers use it routinely when the private sector can't be of service.

Lorraine Salazar made a motion to support Export-Import Bank. Randy Dhindsa seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

LEGISLATIVE ITEMS

 - This bill was removed from the agenda because it failed to advance and is now considered dead.

 Larry Fortune made a motion to approve staff recommendations for items B-D. Brian Domingos seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

TRACKING UPDATE

The GAC has taken support/oppose positions on four City of Fresno issues, two Fresno County issues, 55 State issues and six Federal issues. Of the 14 Cal Chamber identified "job killer" bills the GAC opposed, six are dead and eight are still alive. The bills we will continue to fight include: an increase to minimum wage, extensions of greater greenhouse gas limits and related taxes, and an expansion to the family rights act.

CHAIR'S REPORT

Ruth Evans spoke about the Fresno Chamber's trip to Sacramento May 27th and thanked the offices of Assemblyman Perea, Assemblyman Bigelow and Senator Cannella for meeting with our group. She reminded people about Eggs & Issues with Assemblywoman Kristin Olsen and State of the County on September 29th.

ITEM A

HR 2898 (Valadao) Western Water and American Food Security Act of 2015

Source – Office of David Valadao, Congress.gov

Summary – HR 2898 would require federal agencies to use current and reliable data when making regulatory decisions, which in turn would provide more water for communities in need. It would also provide federal regulators with direction and flexibility to capture water during periods of greater rain, which could be used to dramatically increase California's water supplies. Finally, it would cut the red tape holding back major water storage projects that have been authorized for over a decade.

Background – This is the second water bill David Valadao has introduced in two years. Last year's bill (HR 3964) passed the House but was never taken up by the Senate. Without rain, this bill can't and won't provide relief from the drought, but when it does rain, it ensures more water will be captured and utilized for communities and farmers.

Extremely dry conditions have persisted in 4 the State since 2012, and the drought conditions are likely to persist into the future. The water supplies of the State are at record-low levels, as indicated by the fact that all major Central Valley Project reservoir levels were at 20–35 percent of capacity as of September 25, 2014. The lack of precipitation has been a significant contributing factor to the 6,091 fires experienced in the State as of September 15, 2014, and 13 which covered nearly 400,000 acres.

According to a study released by the University of California, Davis in July 2014, the drought has led to the fallowing of 428,000 acres of 17 farmland, loss of \$810 million in crop revenue, loss of \$203 million in dairy and other livestock value, and increased groundwater pumping costs by \$454 million. The statewide economic costs are estimated to be \$2.2 billion, with over 17,000 seasonal and 22 part-time agricultural jobs lost.

Support – HR 2898 has the support of the entire California Republican delegation. McCarthy, Calvert, Nunes, Lamalfa, Denham and McClintock are co-authors of the bill.

Opposition – None on record, but environmental groups have opposed similar legislation in the past

Status - Introduced on June 25, 2015

ITEM B

AB 410 (Obernolte) Reports submitted to legislative committees

Source – Leg info

Summary – AB 410 requires a state agency to post on its web site any report it is required by law to submit to a committee of the Legislature. Specifies that a "report" includes a study or audit, or a budget change proposal that has been approved by the Department of Finance, and submitted to the joint Legislative Budget Committee, the Assembly Committee on Budget, or the Senate Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review.

Background – According to the author, under existing law, legally mandated reports submitted to the legislative committees by a state agency are considered public information and subject to the CPRA. However, only reports submitted to the Legislature as a body must be posted online. There is no requirement that a report submitted to a committee of the Legislature must be posted online. This costly and time-consuming process in place to obtain these documents is an unnecessary barrier to public information. California Public Records Act. The CPRA, passed by the Legislature and signed into law in 1968, requires inspection and/or disclosure of governmental records to the public. When the Legislature enacted the CPRA, it expressly declared that "access to information concerning the conduct of the people's business is a fundamental and necessary right of every person in this state." By promoting prompt public access to government records, the CPRA is intended to promote accountability of government by the public. Most of the exemptions to the CPRA are specific to certain records or types of records, but there is a general exemption where, on the facts of the particular case, "the public interest served by not making the record public clearly outweighs the public interest served by disclosure of the record."

Support – CalChamber, California League of Food Processors, and Family Business Association are among the roughly two dozen organizations in support of AB 410.

AB 797 (Steinorth) Regulations: effective dates and legislative review

Source – Leg info

Summary – Would improve communication and transparency by requiring a copy of each major regulation submitted to the Secretary of State (SOS) by the Office of Administrative Law (OAL)

to also be submitted to the appropriate Legislative policy committees responsible for the subject matter of the regulation for review.

Background – The author says that the bill improves transparency of the rule making process and accountability to ensure that major government regulations, those with a fiscal impact on California's economy of \$50 million or greater, face careful scrutiny by elected officials. Currently, the OAL publishes all adopted regulations, including major regulations, in the California Regulatory Notice Register. Additionally, the Department of Finance posts a list of major regulations on its website.

Support – AB 797 passed the Assembly nearly unanimously, with only three legislators abstaining from voting on the issue. CalChamber supports the bill

ITEM D

SCA 7 (Huff) Motor vehicle fees and taxes: restriction on expenditures

Source – Leg info

Summary – SCA 7 would amend the state constitution to prohibit the Legislature from borrowing revenues from fees and taxes imposed by the state on vehicles or their use or operation, and from using those revenues for other programs. It would delete the provision that provides for use of any fuel tax revenues allocated to mass transit purposes to be pledged or used for payment of principal and interest on voter-approved bonds issued for those mass transit purposes, and would instead subject those expenditures to the existing 25% limitation applicable to the use of fuel tax revenues for street and highway bond purposes.

Background – California has 175,499 miles of public roads and \$59 billion in accumulated deferred maintenance. 87% of county roads have an average pavement rating of "at risk" or "poor". In fact, the average California driver pays \$832 annually for the increased cost of vehicle maintenance, tire wear, and increased gas costs because California streets and roads are in such disrepair. In 2002, the voters passed Proposition 42, with 69% of the vote, which purported to guarantee transportation taxes and fees would only be used for transportation purposes, but during the fiscal crisis beginning in 2009, taxes and fees being paid by California's drivers were diverted to the state General Fund and not used to repair or maintain California streets and roads. To keep the Proposition 42 promise to the voters that transportation taxes

and fees shall only be used for transportation purposes and not diverted to the General Fund to pay the cost of general obligation bonds, and to ensure that any future transportation fees or taxes are used only for transportation purposes, the voters should be given an opportunity to close the Proposition 42 loophole.

Support – Two-thirds of the Senate and Assembly agree on this issue.
