# NATIONAL HUNGERAWARENESS AND HOMELESSNESS AWARENESS

November was Homeless Awareness month. This note may seem to be a little late. But, if you are in a position to help a homeless person, it isn't too late. There is still time for that.

In Contra Costa County, there are nearly 4,000 persons in need of housing. This includes 237 veterans, 1,075 families and 763 disabled persons. One of the pressing needs is for landlords willing to rent to them. Many of these homeless individuals and families receive financial and social support through veteran service or the Contra Costa County Landlord Engagement Access and Placement Program (L.E.A.P.) The L.E.A.P program provides support in the form of 24/7 response to landlord and tenant concerns. There are also financial benefits that come with participation in the effort to house these people: Lower turnover, first and/or last month's rent, security deposits, coverage of property damage and vacancy payments to eligible tenants.

Specifically, it is my understanding that at this time, there are some 60 homeless veterans in the county who are fully qualified for housing subsides who have not found a home. If you are a landlord or know someone who is landlord who might be interested in assisting in the effort to provide needed housing please contact Pastor Will at <a href="willymac4@me.com">willymac4@me.com</a>. Housing these veterans is an urgent priority of the County L.E.A.P effort.

#### **VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!!**

Winter Nights is a temporary family shelter project organized by the Social Justice Alliance of the Interfaith Council of Contra Costa County. We are providing the shelter and a few nights of volunteers while several partnering congregations are helping us on different nights with food, friends and volunteers.

The partnering congregations are; Clayton Valley Presbyterian Church, United Methodist Church of Pittsburg, St. Ignatius Parrish of Antioch, Holy Rosary of Antioch, and the Islamic Center of Antioch.

## The Dreaded Month

January, the month I dread, has come bringing with it the attribute I hate---freezing cold weather. January is the dormant time of year for some plants and animals such as the bear. At times I envy the bear's ability to sleep through cold weather. It would be wonderful to awake from a long snooze that eliminates the month of January from my life. Dressing is a chore. Putting on three layers of cloths to fortify me against the bone freezing cold takes too much time, and when I'm finally dressed I feel like I am wearing a bulky snowsuit. Ugh!

Another reason I don't like January is that Kendall and I frequently come down with some illness during this formidable month. As I write this article, Kendall has been sick all week with an infection that has brought with it temperature and coughing that is driving both of us crazy. Since Kendall has had this infection, I probably will come down with the malady if the illness chain in our family follows its pattern.

Yesterday morning as I went through my three layers of clothing ritual, I thought of people who have no layers of cloths and freeze to death. I envisioned people who have inadequate housing and snuggle together to keep warm. I thought of the people who come to the church on Saturday to get a free lunch because, for whatever reason, they do not have money for food.

Then I remembered words from a poem I learned in high school.

"I cried because I have no shoes until I met a man who had no feet."

That line of poetry corrected my negative attitude. I have feet with shoes on them. I have a home to shelter me from the cold. I have access to good medical care. I have food to sustain me through the month I hate. Recognizing the reality of life prompted me to thank God for my many blessings and to ask for forgiveness when I complain about the coldness of January.


