From the CPC Pastor



Dear Friends.

Today I watched the arrival of the Pope with a couple of Catholic friends, Father Tom and June Kirk, at the Interfaith Peace Project in Antioch. It was after our Tuesday morning study group that Tom led on the Encyclical, and I hung

around to discuss a couple of things. Soon we found ourselves looking up the Pope's schedule while here in America and we watched as our elected leaders greet him on the tarmac.

It was a special moment as I could tell that Tom and June were taking in the specialness of this moment in history. There was a pomp and circumstance to the greeting, but most of all humility on the part of the Pope. He was very personal with both the Catholic religious leaders and political leaders, as well as the children there to greet him. The limited number in the crowds chanted a welcome. And then something more than symbolic occurred. The Pope got into a small four-door Fiat 500 car and waved as he left for the Embassy.

The Secret Service vehicles went before and after the little car, and the visual clash was surprisingly obvious. Instead of a decked out limousine carrying the flag of the Vatican, a little car half of the size of the black Expeditions was driving down the street with the Pope dressed in white waving out the back door windows of the tiny car. We discussed the church leader at one of the churches where Pope Francis – "Brother Francis" as Tom likes to call him – will be leading Mass. The priest found a high back chair that the Cardinal usually uses when he leads there, and June mentioned that Stephen Colbert put out a Pope chair on "The Late Show" and it was a folding chair with the word "Pope" written with a magic marker. What a contrast.

Of course, not everyone loves this Pope. Climate change deniers and defenders of Capitalism have shared some harsh words lately. Many Native

In a sermon he preached towards the end of his visit to Cuba, Pope Francis said, "We are asked to live the revolution of tenderness as Mary (the mother of Jesus) did."

Revolution of tenderness....

The words, "revolution of tenderness" carry such power. The pope completely redefined revolution in a country that has experienced a very different kind of revolution. What the pope is speaking to is a change of heart, a revolution in our own hearts. An older gentleman who was in the Cuban crowd listening to the pope said he was moved by the message. He went on to say, "Revolution isn't a political event. Revolution is evolution. That's what the pope is asking for, that our way of thinking evolves. He's opening up a lot of people's minds (and hearts)."

Revolution of tenderness...

Recently, stories of Syrian refugees fleeing their war torn country and images of victims of the California fires have filled our waking hours and haunted our dreams. Often the suffering appears overwhelming. Millions are fleeing Syria, thousands have been left homeless by the fires. Can we join the revolution of tenderness as we respond to the suffering we see.

Pastor Will continues...

Americans have rightly questioned the sainthood bid of Junipero Serra, the California Franciscan Priest who founded many of the Missions and has quite a mixed record in the way he treated First Nation peoples. Some conservative Catholics take umbrage at his informal way of focusing on the needs of people in the church and the poor – especially around Climate Change, preferring the previous Popes who focused on preserving the dogma and teachings of the church. I've heard it from more than one Catholic person that they fear for Pope Francis' life, especially during this trip to America.

Perhaps this is also why a number of people have fallen in love with Pope Francis (including my wife), because of his humility and ease around the people he meets. His theology is people centered as well, encouraging Priests to be pastoral and forgiving when serving in the confessional and welcoming the divorced back to the Eucharistic Table. It seems he operates more as a Friar, a Franciscan Brother, than a Jesuit academic. He loves mercy more than justice, while calling the Catholic church and the Church Universal to care more for the poor. I expect him to ask the American churches and convents to take in a family of refugees as he has called on the European churches to do. He even said that a congregation that refuses to take in a family shouldn't be a tax-exempt organization any longer.

In our Presbyterian Book of Order, a part of the Constitution of the PCUSA, we read about what the mission of the church is. Our present Book of Order describes Membership in this way in *G-1.0304 The Ministry of Members*.

"Membership in the Church of Jesus Christ is a joy and a privilege. It is also a commitment to participate in Christ's mission. A faithful member bears witness to God's love and grace and promises to be involved responsibly in the ministry of Christ's Church. Such involvement includes:

- proclaiming the good news in word and deed,
- taking part in the common life and worship of a congregation,
- lifting one another up in prayer, mutual concern, and active support,
- studying Scripture and the issues of Christian faith and life.
- supporting the ministry of the church through the giving of money, time, and talents,

- demonstrating a new quality of life within and through the church,
- responding to God's activity in the world through service to others,
- living responsibly in the personal, family, vocational, political, cultural, and social relationships of life,
- working in the world for peace, justice, freedom, and human fulfillment,
- participating in the governing responsibilities of the church, and
- reviewing and evaluating regularly the integrity of one's membership, and considering ways in which one's participation in the worship and service of the church may be increased and made more meaningful."

An older version included this phrase that I'm sorry doesn't remain in our latest version: "The Church is called to undertake this mission even at the risk of losing its life, trusting in God alone as the author and giver of life, sharing the gospel, and doing those deeds in the world that point beyond themselves to the new reality in Christ."

Perhaps this is what the Pope can remind us and the rest of the American Christian church about in this age of consumerism, individuality and political excess. Perhaps a new form of Christianity can arise from the public discourse of faith, beyond the intolerant voices found on television – perhaps we can reclaim a truer version of the purpose of the church – that of local and global service, humility and love, and extravagant welcome.

Thank you so much for your help in this mission to our community.


Dear Pastors & Congregation,

Good Samaritans - 21st Century Style

I pulled into an Antioch gas station to fill my car with gas before starting back to Brentwood. On this scorching hot September day, my son and I looked forward to relaxing in our air-conditioned home. After Kendall filled the car with gas, I turned the key and heard a horrible tinny sound. My car would not start! The service station attendant looked at it and said he thought it was the "battery." Thank heavens for triple AAA. I phoned AAA and soon a tow truck arrived. The tow man did something to the battery and it started! With a grateful heart I left the gas station thinking the problem was solved.

Because there was so much traffic on Lone Tree Way, I turned my car away from the congested road and into a court so I could turn around and get my car headed in the right direction. When the turn was just about completed, the car stopped again! When I tried to start the car, I heard that familiar tinny sound. Kendall tried to push the car enough to turn it around. As I watched Kendall's futile efforts, I saw a blond-hair boy of about ten or eleven scamper across an unkempt yard. He reminded me of Jody, the boy who goes from childhood to manhood, in the book *The Yearling* by Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings. In a few minutes two men with tattoos decorating their arms came to the car (I realized the boy was running to get help). I got out of the car and told them it was the battery, and as I talked men I noticed the houses looked shabby, tired and worn, some needed painting. I began to feel a little uneasy with these large men tattooed men but tried not to show it.

After the men looked at the battery, one man said, ""I've got cable jumpers, and I'll jump the cable if that's all right with you," said the large sandy-haired man in a soft voice.

"I would really appreciate that," I replied. When I looked into the man's face, I saw kind eyes and a generous smile. What ever happened to those tattoos? I didn't see them at all. The man got his car and attached the necessary cables to his car battery and my battery. As the men disconnected the charging cables, I said, "I would like to pay for your kind help," and tried to give them money. They pulled back, "We don't want any money, glad to be of help. Now this battery needs charging so run it at least 45 minutes before you turn it off." Kendall and I got into the car, I turned on the car and did not hear any tinny sounds! Before leaving the court, I turned and waved to the men. Kendall and I rode around for about an hour before we turned into our garage, exhausted but grateful for the help the men had unselfishly given us. I did not suspect the car saga was not over.

I jumped out of bed the next morning, eager to see if the car would start. Grabbing my keys from the kitchen counter, I ran toward the garage, slid into the driver's seat, and turn the keys. I heard that tinny sound and knew I still had problems. Is there something hugely wrong with my car? Am I facing a big repair bill? Lord, let it be the battery. I would appreciate not having to deal with anything worse. I beg you, Lord, hear my prayer. With heaviness in my heart, I drudged back into the house.

I don't know any automotive repair shop in Brentwood, and the man who used to do our car work has retired. Who should I call? I'll call Big O Tires because it is the only car business I know in Antioch. I took a shower, dressed, woke up Kendall, and ate breakfast. Then I called Big O in Antioch to see if they could handle battery problems. They could. *Thank you, Lord.* I called triple A again and explained I needed a tow truck to carry my nonworking car to a repair shop. By eight-thirty I was sitting in the cab of a tow truck with my car securely fastened on towing equipment on back of the car.

I settled in a chair in the Big O waiting room and began reading a book while waiting for my car to be fixed. In a short period of time, I heard a man call my name. I answered and identified myself.

"There is nothing wrong with your battery or alternator." said the mechanic.

"Nothing?"

"Not a thing," replied the man as he handed me my bill.

"Thank goodness," I replied. As I took the bill and headed toward the counter to pay it, I remembered the tow truck man securing the battery by turning some things (screws?) attached to the battery. Could he have solved the battery problem? As I got close to the counter, I looked at the bill and saw only zeros where there should have been the cost of examining the battery. As I reached the counter, I asked the man who I think is the manager of the business, "Is this right? There is no charge for checking out the battery?"

"Yep, we didn't do anything to your car."

"Thank you, I appreciate it."

The man just nodded his head.

As I walked toward my car, I prayed, Lord, thank you for the three Good Samaritans who so graciously ministered to my need. May Good Samaritans minister to them when they are in need. Amen. My car started the minute I turned the key, and with a feeling of thanksgiving I headed home.

Pastor's Report: Tuesday morning studies and regular committee meetings. LGBTQ film night. Multi-Faith Action Coalition clergy breakfast. Helped Dave and Ian install the monitor cables. Poverty Simulation Sunday. Theology Pub. Women's Fellowship. Vacation with family in Utah. SF Presbytery meeting. Worship. Personnel. Minister/Musicians meeting.

Presbytery Meeting report: Presbytery meeting was September 8 at Calvary PC, San Francisco. Mary and Myrdell attended as commissioners. Mary reported on the meeting, focusing on the conflict between High Street PC and Primera Iglesia Presbiteriana Hispana in Oakland. Will led an Open Space discussion on the fossil fuel overture going to 2016 General Assembly and talked about presbytery's new priority encouraging congregations to collaborate on regional mission projects.

Some of us have participated in all three World Café gatherings. Some have found them to be enlightening and enriching. Some, not so much. In light of the many global issues and crises, we have much to ponder and understand. Since we are a progressive group of worshippers who have chosen to use our minds as well as our hearts, we will inevitably have varying positions on many of these issues. Perhaps a bit of the back-story behind World Café will assist in making this a more valuable experience for all.

<u>World Café</u> is a process of creating a hospitable space where participants feel safe and open to creative thinking, speaking and, most importantly, listening.
