At the outset, the Waterloo Rotary Club was left out as one of the few Clubs that had a net gain of 4 members by the end of December 2014, as reported in the January Grapevine. My apologies to Waterloo Club for the omission!

A few days after the January issue of the Grapevine was published, I received a request for a copy of the **Resigning Member Questionnaire**. It is encouraging to find out that Rotarians are reading the District Newsletter. Instead of sending a copy of the Questionnaire, I suggested to this Rotarian to go to the Rotary International (RI) website. The feedback that I got from this Rotarian was that he found other Membership tools at that site. If there are other Rotarians who are interested in getting a copy of the **Questionnaire** or see other tools, I suggest that they go to the RI website by following these steps:

1. Go to [www.rotary.org](http://www.rotary.org)
2. Sign in to **My Rotary**. You need a password - if you do not have one, register and follow the prompts.
3. Once registered, click **Learning & Reference** at the top of the page; then, **Learn by Topic**; then **Membership**.
4. Scroll down until you see **Club Assessment Tools**. Click on that and you will find Manual with several Tools for Club and Membership Assessment.

I hope that the Rotarians who visit the site will find the various tools in this Manual helpful.

On February 4, I listened to a Rotary webinar entitled "**Simple Ways to Innovate Your Club**". At this webinar, the presenter discussed 3 simple ways a Rotary Club can do to stay relevant and appeal to new and potential members. The three ways are the following:

1. Rethink your Club meetings.
2. Improve your Club appearance.
3. Foster fellowship in your Clubs.

### Rethink your Club meetings

- ⇒ Evaluate your time and location.
- ⇒ What is the return they get from their investment? What compels them to come?
- ⇒ Imagine each Rotary meeting as someone's first meeting. Would they return?

### Improve your Club appearance

- ⇒ Evaluate your club's online appearance - your website, Facebook, Twitter, etc.
- ⇒ Align with RI appearance, using the Rotary new "brand" in your newsletter, thank you notes, Promotional flyers, banners, etc.

### Foster fellowship in your Club

- ⇒ Most people join for service but stay because of friendships and connections.
- ⇒ Balance business with fun in your club.

Historically March has been Literacy Month. As you can see this "Area of Focus" will now be recognized in September. But, like any Area of Focus, literacy happens twelve months of the year. ### A District Committee

The group started in 2006 and many of the original members still work to promote literacy projects in our district. Their mission is "to be a source of ideas and inspiration, and a resource for materials designed to help clubs address the literacy needs in their communities."

They accomplish this by holding a seminar each Fall, a session at the District Training Assembly, and by giving awards to clubs that have met the criteria. Each year the focus changes from preschoolers to adults, from Treasure Boxes to Blue/Red book boxes around the community, from reading to children, to supplying books.

This year the title of the seminar was "Cradle to Age 8." The criteria for an award includes some project addressing that. There is also room in the criteria for donations of school supplies and books to children in needy areas, and promoting literacy in other countries. The number of projects increased this year from five to six.

## Leon Fontier - Working on Global Grant in the Congo

Note: from DRFC Jeff Krans on Leon Fontier:

**Leon Fontier**, a Penn Yan Rotarian, is Lighting Up Rotary as he begins a project in which he is personally Being a Gift to the World! He just sent the following after his first week at work in the Congo. I couldn't give a better description of the beginning of his project to bring safe water and sanitation facilities to the Bolenge School near the village of his birth some sixty years ago! Leon will be working on-site until the grant project is completed this coming September. In October, he has to be home as it is then he will be walking his daughter down the aisle for her wedding!

"What a crazy wild week this was. Just last Saturday I descended on the tarmac here in Mbandaka and in one week I launched a construction business. Monday it was all meetings, first at the headquarters of the CDCC with the management followed with meeting with the Bolenge school managers. Tuesday morning I selected my crew from candidates preselected by the school and told them to be ready for work next day. That afternoon I went to town and bought all the necessary tools and was ready for my crew to show up. I had a crew of 5 to start with, my right arm - the crew supervisor and 4 laborers. They cleared the site for latrines and cisterns and started digging the latrines pits. All the while I was running to Mbandaka 9 miles away chasing materials and supplies and discovering how different things are here. For example we need close to 11000 cement blocks for this project, there are small family outfit along the road that sells cement blocks but as I was investigating who could supply the quantity I needed....well there is none. One must hire a brick maker that comes to your site with his molds and produce the bricks right there for you. I got 2 brick maker crews coming Monday, they get paid by the number of cement bags they use and produce 30 blocks per bag and a good crew of 2 will produce 300 cement blocks in a day.

Needless to say that all of sudden I was chasing huge quantities of cement bags. That was not the hard part as cement is a common commodity and there is competition for the business. A cement block is mostly sand and little cement. Here they use river sand and I went to the river bank where the sand is unloaded and

started negotiating. I just sat in the shade and called a crew that load the truck with shovels ( forget front end loaders in this part of the world) then another crew saw that there was business to be made and they started bidding each other down on prices. I just sat there and waited. Every night this week I went to bed completely depleted of energy and slept so well,"

## The International Fellowship of Birdwatching Rotarians

The Birdwatching Fellowship commenced in 1991, with its presence at the Mexico convention. It is now one of more than 120 Global Networking Groups within Rotary. The initiator of the Fellowship was PP Dick Tafel of North Bay, Ontario, Canada. In June of 2002 he was superseded as president by Mike Lakin of Botswana, Africa. The third President was PDG Steve Leonard of Indiana USA who served in that role for six years up until June 2013 when he was succeeded by PDG Julie West from District 6630 in North East Ohio, USA. In 1991 the tradition commenced of holding field trips during the convention to seek out local birds. Over the years these trips have taken place the day immediately after the international convention in order not to interfere with any of the scheduled events of the convention. With the aid of local leaders, such trips customarily locate about fifty local species. Between 20 to 30 Rotarians and spouses usually take part in these events.

The first lengthier trip occurred after the Singapore convention in 1999 and travelled through much of central Malaysia, for seven days.

In May of 2001, a fifteen-day trip was organized through Southern Africa, including Kruger National Park and much of Swaziland and Botswana. Much of the transportation and accommodation in Africa was through the assistance of local Rotarians.

The fellowship has financially assisted environmental projects in Bolivia, India, and South Africa.

English Newsletters are emailed to all members once or twice yearly. The publisher is Susan Leonard of Fishers, Indiana, U.S.A.. The full membership list is updated annually and sent to all members.

There are now over 150 members in 20 countries.

## Grant Management Seminar (GMS) Qualification

Only one Renewal GMS remains available for this year, April 11, 2015. It will take place during the second and third breakout periods of the District Training Assembly. See the [Foundation page](#) of the district website for GMS registration information.

Any Rotarian who has attended a full GMS in ANY prior year can attend the Renewal GMS.

Please accept my apologies for confusion regarding prior year attendance that arose from differing announcements in the past. One communication said full GMS attendance was required in the previous year, when it should have said ANY year.

In order to apply for a District Simplified Grant (by April 1st) or sponsor a global grant a club must have two members who have either attended a GMS during this Rotary year. Clubs under 20 members can utilize their Foundation Area Director (FAD) as the second member if that FAD has attended a GMS this year. Clubs must also submit a new [Memorandum of Understanding](#) and [District Addendum](#) signed by the current President and President-Elect.

### Member Profile - Daniel Kelley



Daniel Kelley is a transplant to District 7120. He was born in Indianapolis to two Social Workers who spent most weekends volunteering in some capacity. His parents' volunteerism introduced Daniel to the world of helping others and making a difference. When his mother passed away, his father, who was a retired USMC

lieutenant, raised Daniel and his brother.

Daniel went to college in Indiana and studied Criminal Justice and Psychology. After school, he moved back to Indianapolis and applied to the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department. While going through the seven-month hiring process, a teammate from his college football team called with a job offer. Dan accepted the job offer and this started Dan's career in Finance. Early companies that he worked for were Union Federal Bank of Indianapolis, Charles Schwab, PNC Investments, and JP Morgan Securities.

During the trips to visit his father-in-law (David Hannan, MD and 2014-2015 President of the Newark Rotary Club), in Newark, New York, Daniel was often invited to lunch at the Newark Rotary Club meetings. During one of these club meeting attendance, something stuck with Daniel. That was the meeting when the program was from a Home Hospice. Daniel was very moved as he had seen both his mother and father deal with hospice and saw the great value in such programs. At that moment, he knew that he believed in the ideals of Rotary. When he and his wife and family moved to the area, in less than a year, Daniel was inducted in the Canandaigua Rotary Club.

While being a part of Rotary for a relatively short time, Daniel was recruited as a member of the District Membership Development Committee due to his passion for helping others. Daniel has been elected to the Board of Directors of his Rotary Club. Daniel feels that Rotary allows him the opportunity to fulfill his goals in life - to help others in the community where he lives and works - - whether it be volunteering at the annual Pier Festival, Camp Onseyawa, the Ziti Dinner or attending the District Conference (Vermont), he enjoys the friends and fellowship that he experiences from joining Rotary.

## Former Co-president of the Geneva Interact Club part of “Team Oscar”

Six young people appeared on the Academy Awards to hand the Oscar statuettes to the presenters. One of the six "Team Oscar" winners was Kelly FitzGerald from Geneva. She won a contest with thousands of entries with a short 60-second video. She is highlighted on the front page of the Finger Lakes Times. Kelly FitzGerald was co-President of the Interact Club (with Betty Peng) in 2012-13, and it was her idea to hold the first St. Valentine's Day cake/cookie/pie auction.

“I am looking forward to meeting a lot of people in the business, learning how they’ve gotten to where they are now and what their job is like,” FitzGerald said recently from Wake Forest University in North Carolina, where she is a sophomore majoring in communications. “I am really excited about this opportunity.”

Team Oscar, now in its third year, is open to U.S. citizens between the ages of 18 and 30. Aspiring filmmakers, through the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences’ Facebook page, submitted a creative 60-second video on the subject “The best piece of advice I’ve ever received.”

Winners were selected by Oscar producers Craig Zadan and Neil Meron, the Academy and Tatum, who is Team Oscar spokesperson. The other members of Team Oscar were Chris Carmona of Bell, CA; Justin Craig of Ballston Spa, NY; Justin Floyd of Compton, CA; Rhianna Shaheen of Virginia Beach, VA.; and Patrick Walker of Atlanta, GA.

“Now in its third year, our Team Oscar program has become a real tradition for the Academy. We love giving these incredibly talented young filmmakers the experience of what it’s like to be on the Oscars stage, and making sure that everyone on that stage is connected to the future of film,” Zadan and Meron said.

“I’m so impressed by the creativity, passion and hard work that went into this year’s Team Oscar submissions,” Tatum said during a recent episode of “Jimmy Kimmel Live,” when he announced the winners. “It was difficult to pick just six winners, but I’ll be proud to share the Oscars stage with these

talented, young filmmakers in a few weeks.”

United Airlines, the official airline sponsor of the Academy Awards and of the Oscars telecast, flew the winners to Los Angeles to participate in Team Oscar. Joining FitzGerald in Hollywood was her parents, Tim and Christine, and older sister Lauren.

Kelly said she watched the episode when Tatum announced the winners, but wasn’t paying close attention until her name was called. “I didn’t think I would win, but I watched anyway and was only half-listening. When I heard him say my name I was really confused,” she said. “So I called my Mom to see if she heard, and she said she fell asleep. I was thrilled when I found out I actually won.”

FitzGerald’s video, titled “Sharing a Smile,” is based on the premise “If you see someone without a smile, give them one of yours.” Her video, much of which was shot in Geneva, depicts a paper smile being shared across the miles by several people.

In addition to their appearance on the Oscar telecast, Team Oscar winners saw the renowned collections at the Academy’s Margaret Herrick Library, toured motion picture studios and participated in meet-and-greets with filmmakers at Oscar Week events.

FitzGerald said while she hasn’t defined her career goal at this point, it could be one of several things. One of her favorite hobbies is photography. “I would say anything creative is what I want to do,” she said. “I’ve always told my parents that I wanted to live in California. So maybe I can do an internship out there and this will open some doors for me.”

Additional projects earmarked for these funds have been Czech Republic Rotary for flood relief, Tsunami relief fund in Sri Lanka, donations for school supplies for an orphanage in Zimbabwe, and funds to American Red Cross for treating measles.

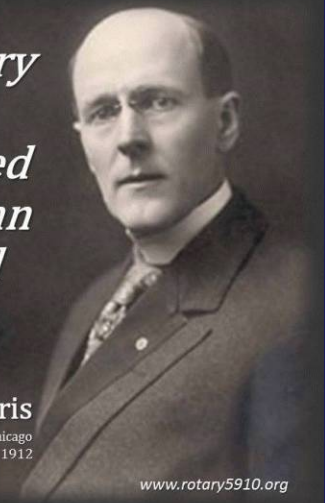

## Bath Interactors Pay It Forward

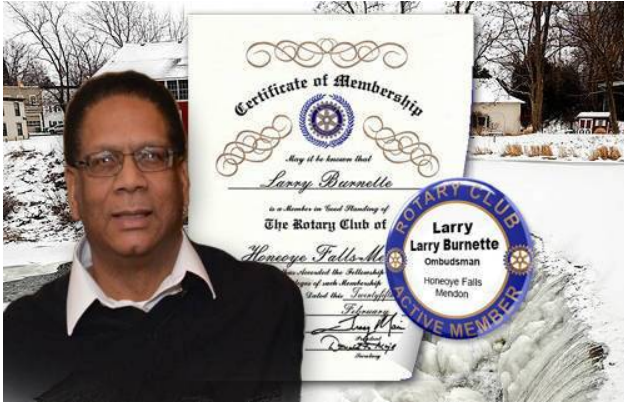

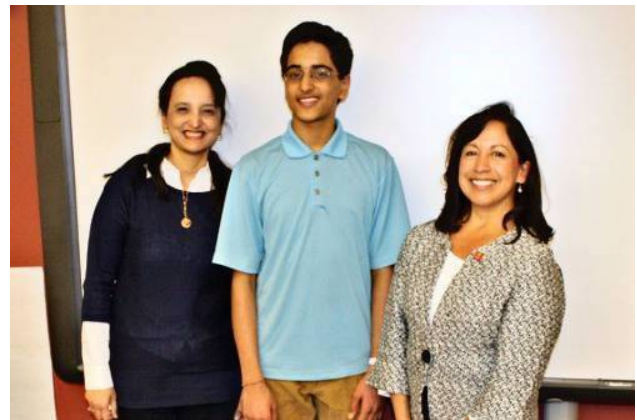
