

Strengthening Delaware's Quality Early Childhood System

Quality Early Learning is Important

- **The most rapid period of development in human life happens in first five years.** What happens in children's early years sets the foundation for all the years that follow.
- **Early experiences shape our brain wiring and impact how our biological systems develop.**
The early years predict later school and career success and impact life-long health.
- **Over 40% of Delaware children, birth to five years old, are from low-income families and are at risk to the achievement gap** appearing as early as nine months old.
- **Adverse experiences during the early years of life, such as chronic poverty or abuse, can disrupt normal developmental processes,** setting the stage for diabetes, cardiovascular disease, obesity and other chronic illnesses later in life.
- High quality early learning yields *substantial benefits* for low-income children
 - Improving early literacy, language and math skills to **close the achievement gap**
 - **Increasing high school graduation** by 30%
 - **Increasing college attendance** by 50%
- Economists estimate a **10% return on investments** in high quality early education – in reduced health care, special education, incarceration costs, and increased productivity and tax revenues

Reaching Delaware's At-Risk Children as Early as Possible

- **Reaching children with high needs:** 58% (8,730) of Delaware children with high needs are enrolled in highly rated Stars programs, up from 5% in 2011
- **Improving quality:** Over 75% of center-based early learning programs and over 22% of family-based early learning programs are voluntarily participating in Delaware Stars
- **Identifying needs early:** Nearly 28,000 Delaware children have received screenings to identify developmental challenges and hundreds of families have been linked to needed services
- **Supporting the workforce:** More than 1,600 low-paid early childhood professionals working in Stars programs have earned salary supplements to support their continued education and retain them in their classrooms so that young children have stable, highly-qualified teachers

More is Needed

- **Only 38% of Delaware's children are reading proficient at the end of fourth grade*.** We must:
 - **Continue to invest in,** implement, and evaluate **research-based strategies** to improve early learning experiences that **raise outcomes for young children**
 - **Build strong connections** and transitions between **early childhood and K-3**
 - **Align early childhood programs,** policies, and funding for more responsive, effective, and efficient services for children and families
