Sam Houston and the Texas Revolution

Objectives:

4th Grade: The student will understand the importance of the Texas Revolution, the Republic of Texas, and the annexation of Texas to the United States. The student is expected to:

-Identify leaders important to the founding of Texas as a republic and state, including José Antonio Navarro, **Sam Houston**, Mirabeau Lamar, and Anson Jones.

Introduction:

Sam Houston was named Major General of the Texas Army on November 12, 1835. After the battle of the Alamo, it was Houston that moved the remaining rebel Army eastward which set off the Runaway Scrape. It was also Houston who met General Santa Anna and the Mexican Army on the banks of the San Jacinto River, near the present-day city of Houston, Texas.

Time and time again, throughout the Texas Revolution, Sam Houston's name pops up. This is not by coincidence. He is a key player in the Independence of Texas. He may have only fought in one battle, but his influence is seen throughout the six month revolution and in the nearly 10 years of independence that followed.
