We use this framework to help students identify and develop their strengths and find their "angle"




An angular student demonstrates depth or excellence in one or two areas on the wheel



How Does Summer Fit In?






Pursue Intellectual Interests

On-Campus Programs

There are many benefits to living on campus



- Demystifies the academic and residential university experience
- Time management
- Cooperative living experience
- Fields of study exploration
- Multi-cultural experience
- Demonstrated Interest

On-Campus Programs

Not all programs are equal

Requires Separate Application/Highly Select

- Programs developed, staffed, and operated directly by the college
- Classes taught by college faculty, adjuncts
- Often feeder for top school: LBW @ Penn, Global Scholars @ Yale,
 Film program @ NYU or USC

Requires Separate Application/Moderately Select

- Gives good sense of college life or potential field of interest
- Helps with writing the why academic interest essay
- Can help gain admission, but experience more important:
 Environmental Science @ Marist, Global Scholars @ American

Not Select/Space and Facility Rentals

- Private organizations use college facilities
- Organizations develop and offer their own curriculum using their own faculty
- Explo, Summerfuel



Experiential Programs

Can provide opportunities for **Community Service** and/or **Leadership** development

- Cultural/Language Immersion: Sol Abroad, EF Summer Camp, Overland, Where There Be Dragons, Putney
- Teen Tours: Rein tours, Rustic Pathways, BBYO Passport
- Wilderness & Adventure: Bold Earth,
 NOLS, Outward Bound
- Community Service: Overland, VISIONS Service Adventures, TCNJ Bonner Community Scholars

But you don't need to go on a service trip in order to do service... There are lots of opportunities right in your own backyard!



Summer Programs

It is important to carefully evaluate a program before you commit

- Tour and visit if you can
- Talk with students (& parents) who have done the program—What was their experience?
- Attend a fair for face-to-face interactions with programs
- Ask questions

How much supervision is there?

What is typical makeup of group e.g. gender/age?

What is background of instructors?

Can I speak with some former participants?

Work Experience

A summer job can be just as valuable or more so than programs or travel

- Any type of work/job has value
- Demonstrate the characteristics that schools are looking for
 - Commitment
 - Longevity
 - Hard work
 - Diligence
 - Leadership
 - Advancement
 - Accomplishment
 - Entrepreneurship
- If possible, explore your career interest





Summer Experiences

Benefits – some less tangible but still valuable



Create stories for college essays and interviews

- Take advantage of the few opportunities of extended time where you can accomplish something or explore what you love



Case Study: Summer Integration into App


Adam


Case Study: Summer Integration Into App

Trey: Artistic Entrepreneurial Gymnast




Case Study: Summer Integration Into App
