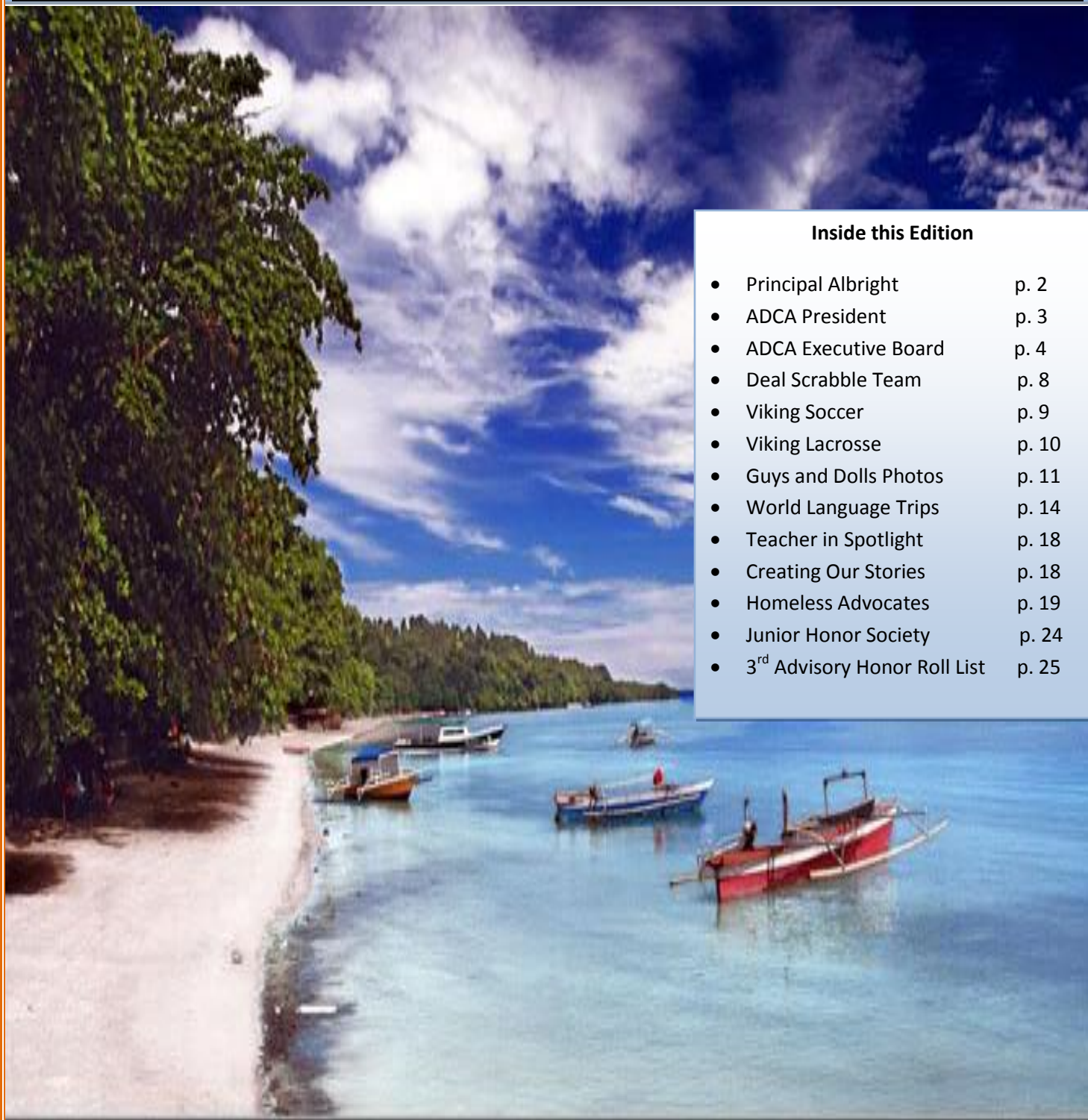
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From Principal Albright

What another fantastic school year! On behalf of the Alice Deal Community Association, (ADCA) I thank you for being the

greatest group of parents, teachers, staff and supporting community of all!!!

As of May 19, 2015 at the ADCA General Meeting, not only did we have attendance of over 55 parents, our guest speaker, Gregory Smith, delivered valuable information on internet safety. 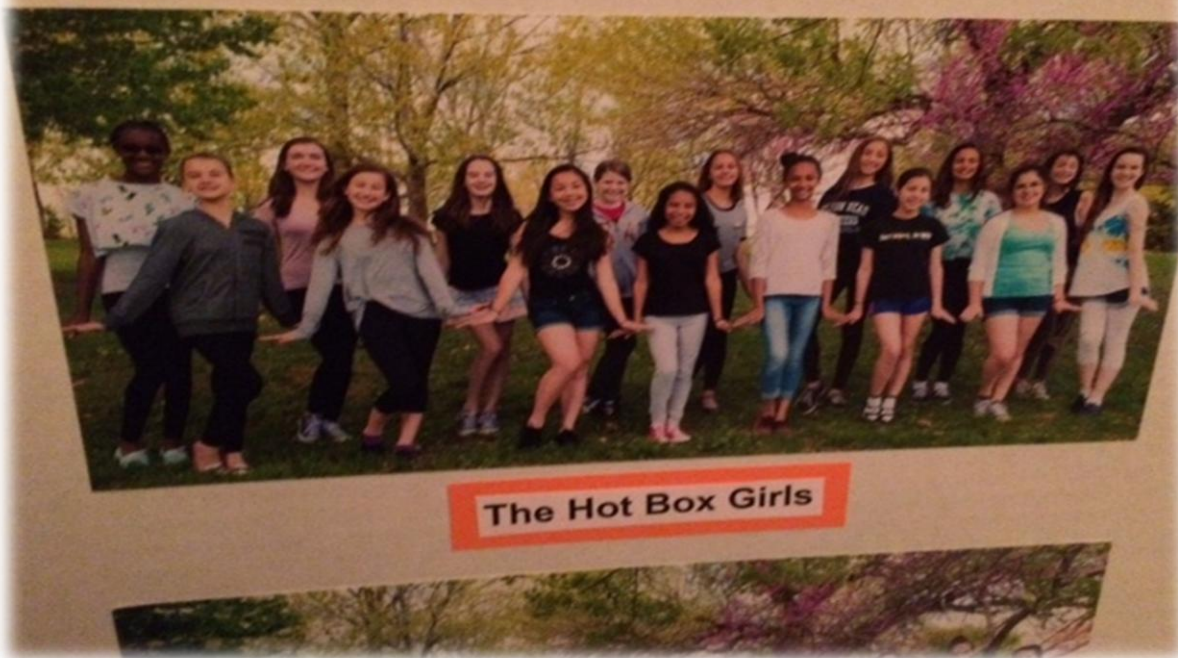
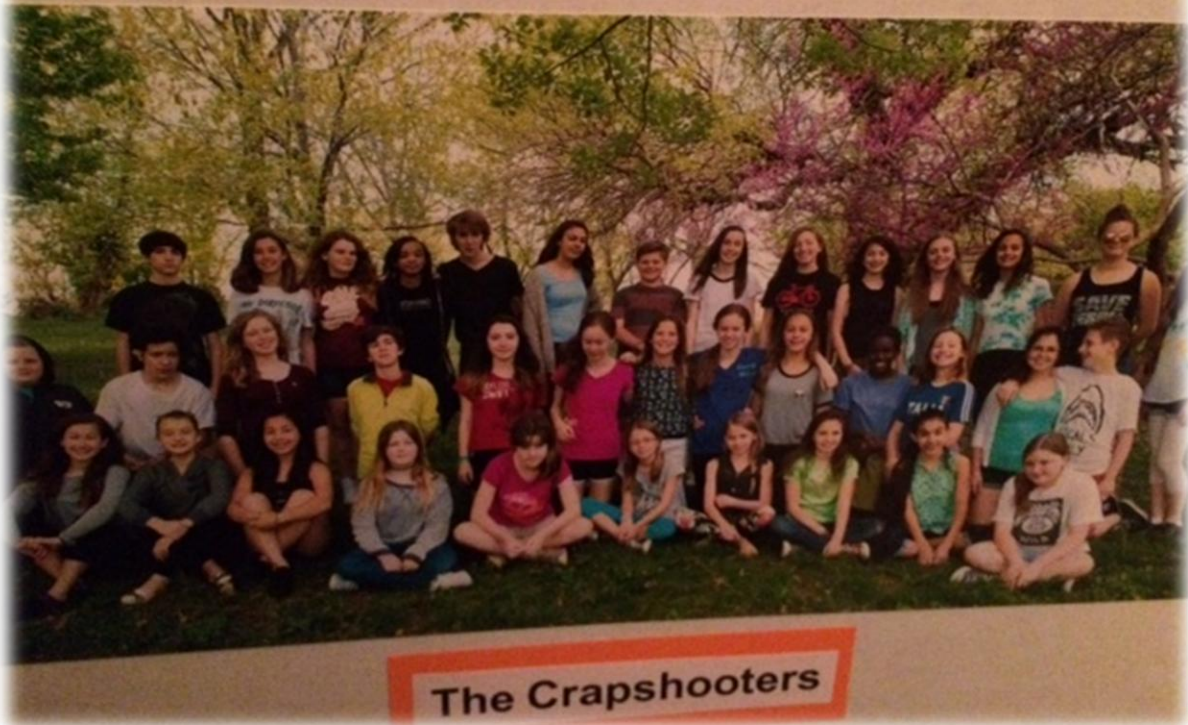

World Language Trips

Each year, Deal Middle School language students have the opportunity to travel to a country where the language they are studying is spoken. The ADCA provides many scholarships for this purpose. This year approximately 88 students went to Costa Rica, 66 went to France, and 26 went to China. These are trips of a lifetime and something rising 6th and 7th grades should seriously consider.

Here is a short entry from the Costa Rica trip blog:

At approximately 9000 ft of elevation, Volcan Poás was hidden in clouds and our view was mostly of the inside of these clouds. I've seen remarkable pictures of the vista over the active volcano, but we were forced to use our imaginations on this visit. That said, the short hike gave us a chance to see a wide variety of local fauna and our drive in to the national park offered several glimpses of Costa Rica's landscape.



After the volcano, our students patiently awaited the arrival of the new bus by playing soccer, dancing, and sharing their favorite pictures from the day. Tonight our group is staying in two hotels in La Fortuna, which sits in the shadow of Costa Rica's best known volcano: Arenal.

Paris by Land, Water and Air!

The day began with a hearty Parisian breakfast to energize us for a busy, exciting day. After boarding the bus, we toured various areas of Paris, seeing the Avenue des Champs-Élysées and Napoleon's Tomb. Some historians question whether Napoleon Bonaparte is actually buried in the Eglise du Dome Church at the Hotel des Invalides. The most wonderful stop on the bus tour was at a scenic view of the Eiffel Tower. Students took many beautiful pictures at this stop. Make sure you ask to see these wonderful pictures!

After seeing Paris by land, students had free time to explore the musée du Louvre. Next up was Paris by water! Students took a boat tour by water on the Seine River. Before boarding the boat, some students purchased locks and left their mark on the Love Lock Bridge. On the boat, we passed under many of the 37 bridges that cross the Seine River and saw all the beautiful sites and people sitting along the river.

Our final tour of Paris was 56 stories in the air from the observation deck of Montparnasse Tower at night. Students were able to see the Eiffel Tower light show at 9:00 pm, which was breathtaking.

**Creating Our Stories: Eighth Grade Partnership
with the Smithsonian American Art Museum**

Deal's partnership with the Smithsonian American Art Museum is called "Creating Our Stories." The objective is for students to look closely at art and write about it creatively, with the end product being a collection of published works by the students. It is generously funded by the Hearst Foundation at the museum and is a partnership that has been going on with Deal for about ten years.



English and History teachers choose the 8-9 artworks that will be studied, the museum visits the classroom in advance to share how to look at artworks and to get the students excited, we go to the museum for a field trip and see the artworks in person and then the students return to school and write about one of the artworks that was most interesting/intriguing to them.

After the writing has gone through the editing process and a final clean copy is submitted, the students complete their writing with an illustration relevant to what they wrote about. All of the writing is then published in a book and each student receives a copy of that book. The artwork on the covers is submitted by students who are interested in doing so. All cover art is submitted to the museum and the museum chooses who will be displayed! It's exciting to see because even the teachers don't know whose art will be on the cover until the day of the reception!



The project culminates with several students from each team reading their works at the museum. Then a lovely reception is held in the atrium of the museum.

Sixth Grade Homeless Advocates!!!!

On Wednesday, June 3 approximately 100 sixth grade students and 10 teachers participated in the #Heart4theHomeless rally at Freedom Plaza. A dedicated group of student-activists decided to plan this event as part of an awareness campaign after learning about a recent study published by the National Coalition for the Homeless (NCH) documenting how a huge majority of homeless people in DC experienced discrimination from private business, medical/social services, and law enforcement.

Working with NCH and the People for Fairness Coalition, they decide to host a rally and march around the Wilson Building - where the DC Council and Mayor's Office are located. Students helped to apply for permits from the National Park Service and MPD, reached out to DC council members and the Mayor's Office, and prepared speeches, chants, posters, and banners.



Everything came together when students donned their #Heart4thehomeless blue t-shirts and arrived by metro to Freedom Plaza. Amidst a dense crowd hoisting signs reading "Equal under the law" and "They're homeless, they're human", students Nico Foxley and Kenneth Wong delivered opening remarks, along with David Pirtle of NCH and Councilwoman Elissa Silverman. Shortly thereafter Team Seoul student Leila Warner introduced Albert

Townsend, a formerly-homeless advocate who launched the students on their march. A police escort closed down the streets as students cheered and chanted while proudly displaying their signs and slogans. We drew the attention of Councilwoman Anita Bonds who was introduced by Team Baku student Maddie Vassalo as she met us on the steps of the Wilson Building to say a few words in support of our cause. She even came out as willing to support legislation to include "housing status" as a protected category under already existing DC anti-discrimination law. The students look forward to tracking the progress of such a bill as it is proposed and voted on by the DC Council.



The rally concluded back in freedom plaza with remarks from Kristy Greenwalt, adviser to Mayor

Bowser on issues relating to homelessness and the director for housing policy of the Interagency Council on Homelessness. Team Seoul's Ally Han presented Ms. Greenwalt with an event t-shirt as a thank you and 6th grader Wyatt McCrary offered the closing remarks. Students walked out of Freedom Plaza with a certain lightness and positive energy in their step as some of the youngest civil rights activists in the country.
