It becomes embedded in the curriculum design so that students' efforts in their communities are informed by classroom studies, neighborhood investigations and engagement over time. Economic Vitality

The DoRight Leadership Corps

DoRight Leadershp Corps (DLC) is a YOUTH ACTION NETWORK and interdisciplinary curricular program for middle and high school students. The DLC integrates core academics with community-based project work in entrepreneurship, 21st century skills and sustainability through three action departments: DoRight Enterprises, Legislative Action and Public Relations. Scott Beall, founder of the DLC, has been a participant in and presenter at CELF's Manhattanville Summer Institute in EfS.

<u>Sustainable Economics: The Triple Bottom Line</u> from Shelburne Farms', a CELF educational partner, Sustainable Economics is an integrated, project-based unit of study through which economics becomes a living concept for students. Building deep understanding of social, economic, and environmental impacts of every day



decisions, students work with local businesses and community members to research and develop a business model with positive impact on their community while reaching their financial goals.

Environmental Integrity

Billion Oysters project

BOP is an ecosystem restoration and education project aimed at restoring one billion live oysters to New York Harbor and engaging hundreds of thousands of school children through restoration based STEM education programs. Amy Goods, a participant in CELF's NYC project and a teacher at MS 447 in Brooklyn connected her students' study of water quality to the Billion Oysters Project.

Social Equity
