What Does the New Fireworks Law Mean for Georgia Retailers?

A Brief Overview of the Important Considerations for Georgia Retailers regarding HB 110, allowing fireworks in Georgia.

The law creates a new category of allowable fireworks, called 'consumer fireworks'. The definition of consumer fireworks is: any small fireworks device containing restricted amounts of pyrotechnic composition, designed primarily to produce visible or audible effects by combustion and also include Roman candles (*References a number of federal and other national standards.*).

There shall be a 5% Consumer Fireworks excise tax on each item sold.

Age Restrictions

- Individuals age 18 and over may use, possess, provide transport and store consumer fireworks
- Individuals age 16 or 17 (in a retail setting) may sell at retail location or possess/ transport/ etc if he/she is serving as an assistant to a licensed distributor or a nonprofit group (501c3) benefiting from the distributor

Permanent Store Sales

- Retailers may sell consumer fireworks in a permanent store if: the store is in compliance with the NFPA 1124 requirements for a permanent store, and if the retailer is selling fireworks from a licensed distributor
- The initial license fee is \$5,000 with an annual fee of \$1,000 (the \$5,000 fee covers an entire chain of stores)
- Licensure requires the holder to maintain public liability and product liability insurance with a minimum coverage of \$2 mil

Temporary Stand Sales

- Retailers may sell fireworks in a temporary store if: the store is in compliance
 with the NFPA 1124 requirements for a permanent store, if it is within 1,000 ft of
 a fire hydrant (limited exceptions) and is selling a licensed distributor's fireworks
- A retail chain may not operate any more than two temporary stands at a time for each store in the chain, and said stand must be located in the same county as the store (there is a limited exception)
- License fee is \$500 for a 90 day term
- Sales from stands shall accrue to the benefit of a nonprofit group, who shall directly participate in the operating of the stand
