## "Tools for Change" Letter to the Editor:

As we celebrated the birthday of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. just a few short weeks ago, I am reminded that he once remarked that "all men are caught up in an inescapable network of mutuality." It is not often that in our separate, but inescapably linked, communities there is a program that has been bringing together high school students from three local high schools, Blind Brook, Port Chester, and Rye Neck for the past five years and now would like to include students from Rye City High School. That program is Tools ForChange(<http://www.tools4changeseminar.com/>). The League of Women Voters of Rye, Rye Brook and Port Chester has been a program sponsor from its beginning, and I am writing

this letter as a member of the League's Board of Directors.

The program focuses teenagers from diverse backgrounds to conduct research, analyze and solve community problems. Dr. William Tobin from Duke University teaches the seminar. As Dr. Tobin has written, "tools grows young people who not only possess disciplined analytical and interpretive skills, as well as empathy and wisdom, but can bring these traits to bear on local challenges that have national and global dimensions. The focus of Tools is not to transmit knowledge, but instead to teach a style for engaging the world so that new and existing knowledge and data can be productively organized, analyzed and used." The program is multi-faceted and has been bringing together students and teachers, parents, and school board members from Port Chester, Rye Neck, and Blind Brook. Dr. Tobin is anxious to have students from Rye City to join the seminar that is beginning this month. Funding for the program is through a public-private partnership. Public donors have included the Town of Rye, Building Community Bridges/One World and, this year, the County of Westchester. Funding is always difficult and the public's help is encouraged and needed if this worthwhile program is to continue. An on-line fund raising campaign through the crowd sourcing website: IncitED has recently been completed, but donations can still be made through the League of Women Voters Educational Foundation, a tax deductible 501(c)3

## LOCAL STUDENT CHOSEN TO ATTEND "STUDENTS INSIDE ALBANY" PROGRAM

Macguire (Mac) Killian, a 9th grader from Rye High School, has been chosen to attend this year's Students Inside Albany program sponsored by the League of Women Voters of New York State Education Foundation. This thirteenth annual Students Inside Albany program will take place from May 18-21, and will bring approximately 60 students from across the state to Albany to get a first-hand education about their state government. The program is designed to increase high school students' awareness of their responsibility in representative government and provide information

about the tools necessary for meeting that responsibility.

While at the conference, students will join their peers in a hands-on learning experience about how state government works. Students will participate in a series of interactive lectures on topics such as the state budget process, the role of lobbyists in the legislative process, citizen rights to access government information, the role of media in politics, and the move to reform state government. While in Albany, the students will have an opportunity to tour the state's Capitol. The highlight for most students is the opportunity to shadow their Senator and their Assembly member for afternoon attending sessions on the Chamber floor.

In his application essay, Mac commented, "If I understand the legislative process, I would be better able to contribute to helping my community and state in dealing with these issues. I would like to meet other kids around New York to share ideas and opinions and what they think the issues facing our state are."

Vote 18 is a fun, fast-paced interactive game taught at high

## Student Civic Achievement Award

The League of Women Voters of Rye, Rye Brook and Port Chester has recently established a Student Civic Achievement Award to be given annually to one high school junior who lives in and attends a high school in the City of Rye, Villages of Rye Brook and Port Chester, or Rye Neck, in recognition of the student's overall contributions to his or her school and community in the areas of civic engagement, advocacy, leadership or voter education.

The criteria for the Student Civic Achievement Award are:

\* Proven civic engagement, such as participation and volunteering in school and community organizations, committees and boards; and/or

\* Demonstrated advocacy for various causes, such as political, economic, education, civil, environmental or quality of life issues; and/or

\* Proven leadership roles in school and community organizations, committees and boards; and/or

\* Demonstrated interest in voter education.

Students eligible for the award will participate at a high level in numerous activities. In doing so, they will have proven to be exemplary leaders and excellent role models for their peers. The recipient of the Student Civic Leadership Award will be selected by a three person subcommittee of the LWV Board members based on the content of the application and by an interview, if deemed necessary by the subcommittee members. The recipient will receive a \$250.00 monetary award.

The LWV has distributed to each local high school an application form to be completed by a student who wishes to apply for the Student Civic Achievement Award. The deadline for submission of the application is March 31, 2014. Each student must submit a reference and the guidance counselor or a school administrator must sign off on the application. The award recipient will be notified in May 2014 and will be presented with the Award at the June LWV Annual Meeting.

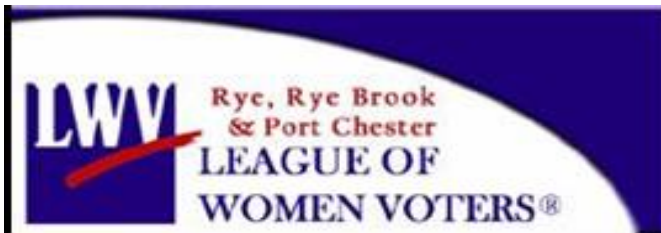
