While much of the national public focus has been on Title IX in the higher education context, Title IX's prohibition on sex discrimination in education applies to K-12 institutions as well. This means that K-12 institutions must take action to prevent, investigate, and remedy sexual harassment that impacts their educational community—even harassment that occurs off school property. The kinds of bullying behavior common among K-12 students—cyberbullying, spreading rumors related to sexual activity, sexual assault, and sexting—may fall within Title IX's definition of sexual harassment and may therefore require school response. This presentation will explain what Title IX requires of schools with respect to the content of their sexual harassment policy, investigative procedures, and the manner in which schools must address sexual harassment if they have found it to have occurred in their community.
