Happiness comes when we see the new Expanded Services Program at O'Connell led by its Director, Susan Rinaldi, who was a teacher in the Options program, and another PVI graduate, Mary Desmarais, serving as a teacher. This program should grow to enroll 6-8 students next year.

Happiness comes in the form of the housing accomplishments we have made by creating a community in Fairfax City totaling eleven homes purchased or rented by families. Thirty two of our special young adults reside on their own with nightly supervision. All of this did not happen just by accident. It has taken place because the founding families and those that followed believed very strongly about what we were doing to create better lives for those we support.

This year, Porto and PCI are embarking on a renewed effort to increase the number of special education programs in Diocesan schools. We will make available more homes in the community and, most importantly, increase employment opportunities. To proceed with this new phase, we need to up our membership rolls by getting more people involved. We just can't sit still and reap the benefits of the happiness created by those that preceded us.
